

THE IMPOSSIBLE IS POSSIBLE - ADAPTING OR THE KINGDOM

his year put us all in an impossible situation. On March 14, 2020 I was leading a team rehearsal for Sunday morning, March 15. Every now and then, when Wednesday rehearsals were not possible, we would hold a rehearsal on a Saturday morning. These tend to be very relaxed rehearsals, and we generally have a great time when our schedules are free (like on a Saturday morning). March 14th was one of those days. But in the middle of rehearsal, I got called out to the fover for a leadership team phone call which changed the rest of the year for Englewood Christian Church. It was during this phone call, the announcement was made to cancel "tomorrow's" service. Little did we know, we wouldn't return to in-person services for quite some time.

The following weeks were grueling and difficult, but together the ECC staff pooled our resources, got some help and found a way to adapt a church service to the "big screen" (also known as Facebook). I remember distinctly those first two weeks after we finally figured out how to pre-record services and stream them to Facebook, and each milestone after that as we learned more about online streaming and what we were capable of doing. We spent a lot of time adapting our schedules, resources, time and character over the rest of the year as God shaped our church into a strange conglomerate of digital community we had never experienced first-hand.

Adapting is hard. Adapting to a new reality is really hard. Adapting to a constantly changing reality is even harder. This year has been full of difficult circumstances. I don't know about you, but I still experience some hesitancy when a new plan is put in place because I have gotten so used to expecting change due to a new procedure, precaution or safety measure. It's hard to adapt in an environment which changes so quickly. So maybe today you need to confront this question: what do you need to change about your ability to adapt? And more importantly, can you adapt when God asks you to?

"WITH GOD ALL THINGS ARE POSSIBLE"

I would pose to you the key to adapting to a new or difficult circumstance lies in Matthew 19:26: "With God all things are possible."

We have all heard this phrase before. In fact, this may be a phrase you have been holding on to this year. Often, this verse gets generalized into a "catch phrase" and is applied to every circumstance. It gets overused and loses its intended meaning over time. I want to remind you, when Jesus said this, His meaning may have been different than what we have come to understand. So I want to ask you, when Jesus said, "With God all things are possible," did he mean all things we ask for, expect or plan for? Or did he mean something else?

In the passage (Matt. 19:16-26), Jesus asks a rich man to give up all his possessions, surrender them to the poor, then to go and follow Him. After this interaction, Jesus explained to His disciples how hard it was for the rich to be a part of the Kingdom of God. Now, maybe you're not rich, but there's something bigger going on here which everyone, rich or poor, can learn a lesson from: Jesus asked the rich man to give up something important to him. He asked the man to do something a) he did not expect, and b) he was uncomfortable with. And all this for the purpose of prioritizing the Kingdom. Now, I can't relate to a rich man, but I can identify with the struggle to willingly change and sacrifice my own wants and needs in order to obey God when He asks me to do something. And God asked me to do that a lot this year.

So, I want to encourage you to do this: every time you say, "With God all things are possible," remember it means a little more than God being able to do anything. We already know this is true. Rather, in this passage it means I can do anything God asks of me because He gives me the strength to do it. Go back to the task Jesus gave to the rich man: it was never an impossible decision for him to do as Jesus asked. The only thing standing in between this man and the Kingdom of God was himself. I believe what Matthew communicated here is that no choice to follow God is an impossible choice; in fact, it is more than possible. So, next time God puts you in a situation where you need to adapt your life in favor of the Kingdom, know it is never impossible. If God asks you to help someone, it is possible. If God asks you to be patient with Him in a difficult time, it is possible. If God convicts you to be flexible, adapt and overcome, it is possible. If God asks you to surrender everything that's valuable to you in order to further the Kingdom, it is possible because nothing is impossible with God.

PATIENCE IN THE UNKNOWN

In the ther we love them or hate them, calendars and schedules are a necessary tool for keeping our lives in order. Everyone has to use them to some degree. For example, we use a calendar for keeping track of constants like birthdays and anniversaries, as well as less predictable things like work schedules and soccer games. They are tools which help us, but they have the ability to hurt us as well. Have you ever gotten so wrapped up in the anticipation of an event, it overwhelmed you? We can build up excitement during the "counting down" period, but we can also let it make us more anxious as the day approaches. For me personally, this manifests itself the most when I'm trying to fall asleep. I have so much difficulty shutting off my brain. I have this annoying habit of looking at the clock and calculating how much sleep I could potentially get before my alarm goes off. My mind just won't stop asking why I'm not asleep yet. The worst is if I wake up at any point in the night. I constantly have to talk myself out of checking the time because I know if it's within two hours of that alarm, I'm not going back to sleep. I can try all kinds of tricks, but I can't change the knowledge of my rest time coming to an end. I'm impatient with my body which just won't relax, allowing time to slip away (time I could be blissfully sleeping, I might add).

When I was looking back at the last year, I chuckled at just how much we didn't know then. In the beginning, we were given these timelines which seemed so believable at the time. We started with two weeks to "flatten the curve." My kids got an extra week of spring break, and church was going to be online for at most a month. But then as time went on, our end dates kept being pushed back. Our kids switched to virtual school for the entire school year, summer camps were canceled, and those rescheduled concerts were nixed completely. At some point during the year,

our "when we get back to normal" statements turned into proclamations of "our new normal." Focusing on the finish line was what helped keep us going, but I found myself feeling more and more defeated when those dates passed and new ones took their place. Eventually I had to take a similar approach to my calendar, as I do my alarm clock. I stopped looking at the dates altogether. I focused more on being in the moment and learned how to be more patient with God's timing. Even though I still don't know when this will all be over, the one thing I can be sure of is God surely does. I don't have to have the day circled in the calendar to know it is coming.

Last month in Children's Church, the kids learned about Simeon and how he showed extreme patience in waiting for the Lord. He was promised he would not die before seeing the Messiah. In Luke 2 we read he was righteous and devout, but we don't read anything about how long he actually waited to meet Jesus. It could have been days, or it could have been years; we just don't know. More important than the amount of time he waited was the faith he displayed by having the patience to do so. It's easy to finish a race when you can see the finish line, but it's much harder when you don't know how many miles you have to run. A year ago it was hard to keep myself going, but I've also grown so much more than I could have anticipated. When you reflect on this last year, have you found yourself being more patient in God's presence? Are you able to "be still before the Lord and wait patiently for Him," as we're advised to do in Psalm 37:7, or are you struggling to get through each day while counting down the hours you still have left to go? If you're struggling with the latter, stop looking at the clock or calendar. We can never change the passage of time, but we can change our attitude about it.

he year was 2020. The day was Saturday, March 14. It started just like any other day. My kids ran into my room and woke Julie and me up at 7:30am. We laid in bed for a while until we were ready to get up and take on the kids and the day. We got out of bed, got ready for the day, and ate breakfast together. Because it was a Saturday and I didn't have to go into the office, we decided it would be a great day to clean the house. The girls tackled their rooms, Julie tackled the living room and kitchen, and I tackled our bedroom and bathrooms.

So, there we were, cleaning away, when I got a text from Charles Moseley around 11:00am, asking if I could join a conference call with the other elders, deacons, and ministerial staff to discuss the plans for Sunday service because this thing called the Coronavirus, or COVID-19, had just been declared a pandemic. After being on the call for 45 minutes, it was decided Sunday School would be canceled, Friendship Time (remember that?) would not happen, communion would be done differently, but church service was still happening, which meant I was still preaching because Pete was on vacation.

That night my family and I went over to our friends, the Toppings' house, to hang out, play games, and eat dinner together. We were about to sit down to eat when I was asked to join another conference call with the same people. Fast forward to one year later on March 14, 2021. On this day the people of ECC were meeting together for service, but it looked different than the Sunday before COVID-19. Masks

were being worn, Friendship Time and Sunday School were still not happening, and prefilled communion cups were being used, but we were able to meet together.

The logistics of, not only Sunday Service, but being together in general has changed this year. There in the beginning, Zoom was a widely popular tool people used. Their stock went through the roof. Still Zoom is used for meetings or seeing people face-to-face. Friends and family are quarantining because they don't want to take any chances, and the only way to see them is through video messaging or outside. I remember in the beginning weeks of social distancing, we decided to get together with the Toppings again. However, when they came over, we sat outside, ate dinner, played games six feet apart, and James and I watched a dirt track racing PPV on a TV we set up outside. We wanted to hang out together, but the logistics of that had changed. Whenever you go out into public now, it is strongly recommended masks be worn. The logistics of going grocery shopping, going out to eat, or going out in general has changed. Whether you are for or against the logistics of it all changing, the truth is, no matter what has happened so far or will happen in the future, God is still in control and still ruler over all.

New International - Ireland





oming out of our very own church, → Christian Arnold and his wife Elisabeth (along with their son Caspian) are Kingdom partners we support through our Faith Promise giving. They are working with New International toward their ultimate goal of

moving to Ireland to work in the ripe harvest fields of that country as soon as they can. Here is a brief Q & A with them about some recent updates:

- 1. Work status: Any updates on your departure dates and/ or reasons for delay right now? We are finishing raising the last 23% of our monthly support needed for moving to Ireland. The Republic of Ireland's visa department is closed because of the lockdown and will consider reopening again in the first few weeks of April. Once the offices have reopened, and we are 90% funded, we will be able submit our application to relocate overseas.
- 2. Training updates: What's the latest training and advancements you have made towards your work? At the beginning of this year, we completed our month-long crosscultural training in North Carolina. It was the last major pre-field task that will set us up for success in long-term ministry. At the end of training, Christian was able to take a few additional courses to become a certified trauma healing facilitator.
- 3. Prayer needs: What can we specifically pray for during the month of April? Pray for Ireland to open their borders quickly so we can transition over as smoothly and safely as possible. Pray for endurance to finish raising the last 23% of monthly support, and for ministry partners who will pray for our work.

Clean or Dirty? – During the month of April, our Immerse: Beginnings reading journey takes us through the second half of Leviticus and all of the book of Numbers.
