


Maps

ong before the days of navigation systems installed in cars, or even TomTom or Garmin devices, I remember sitting in the front seat of our 1989 Dodge Caravan, navigating us through the AAA TripTik as we went on family road trips. It's actually something I'm grateful for, as I've found myself in the role of navigator many times over the years.

For example, between my junior and senior years of college, I went home to Ohio for the summer. This involved taking my

car, and a friend came along, so I wouldn't have to make the trip by myself. Even though it was my car and we were going to my home, I did not drive one single mile on that 1,255-mile journey. I navigated using an atlas and MapQuest print outs and I was deeiay, but I did not drive. A similar thing happened when I made the trip again several years later with a U-Haul. My brother flew down and drove me across the country before I moved to Romania. I think I only drove the truck between the rental place and my house, but he drove the entire way.

These days, I'm a little more willing to get behind the wheel,

though I much prefer to be in the passenger seat, looking at the map, finding rest stops and restaurants along the way. For me, it's about knowing where we're going and knowing what the plan is. If I'm driving, I really can't (or at least shouldn't) look at the map, find detours, search for destinations or anything else which takes my eyes off the road. So, when traffic gets weird or it's time to think about stopping for dinner and I'm at the wheel, everything feels a little bit out of my control. Maybe it's because I'm a visual learner; I need to see something to hear and understand. Anyone else need to put their glasses on before talking to someone? But it's probably more so about wanting to be in control of the situation.

Several years ago, there was a popular song "Jesus, Take the Wheel." For me, a more appropriate song title would be, "Jesus, Take the Map." Or in more prayerful words, *Jesus, take control and help me give up the need and/or desire to know all the things and control all the details.*


As I was thinking about this idea of navigation and letting God be in control of our journeys, I thought about the Apostle Paul. When we encounter Jesus, everything changes, and Paul

was no exception. He literally met Jesus on the road to Damascus. One moment he was navigating his own life and pursuing his own agenda of arresting those who belonged to the Way, and in the blink of an eye, everything changed. Though he was still headed to Damascus, his motive and even his specific destination altered.

This idea of allowing God to navigate his journey was a theme in Paul's life. In Acts 13 he and Barnabas were "sent on their way by the Holy Spirit." In Acts 16, they were "kept by the Holy Spirit" from going to Asia, and Paul had a vision leading him to Macedonia. In Acts 18, God told him to keep speaking, and "Paul"

stayed in Corinth for a year and a half." So much of what he did and where he went was dependent upon the daily leading and direction of the Holy Spirit. He didn't know in Damascus he would go to Ephesus or Rome or anywhere else in the world. He just knew Jesus was Lord, and that meant He was the one now calling the shots and leading the way.

God doesn't provide a map in our life of faith. He doesn't give us a TripTik, Mapquest, or any step-by-step instructions about where we're going, what we're doing, or how it will turn out. If He did, it wouldn't be faith. We have to give up control and trust Him to navigate our lives. We have to hand over our map, which will probably be discarded, and surrender to the journey He leads.

No matter who you are or what you do, bumps in the road are part of our lives. The bump may be small, and you can keep moving forward with no damage, or it may be huge and the damage could be catastrophic. Unfortunately, because of the sin of Adam and Eve, pain, heartache, frustration and so on was set in motion. We have to deal with these bumps in the road from time to time. Some people deal with more than others, and some bumps are bigger than others, but they do and will continue to happen. Pit Stop


y family took road trips about twice a year to see extended family. My parents worked (and still do) at Johnson University Florida, and on school breaks we would sometimes get multiple weeks for holidays like Christmas or long stretches of summer vacation. Since our breaks were longer, we would make a yearly habit of traveling up I-75 to see our extended family. To alleviate how many stops we'd need to take, more often than not, my parents would travel with us four kids overnight. It was easier overall because we would end up sleeping the whole time, which prevented all kinds of tense situations like fighting with each other over absolutely nothing or stopping several times to eat and go to the bathroom.

Even though we'd make overnight trips to avoid making unnecessary pit stops, there's some irony to the situation. In order to stay up all night to drive, my parents would have to resort to their favorite caffeinated drinks (Mountain Dew and coffee) to make it through the trip. Since both were caffeinated, guess who was making stops once an hour to take care of business? I'll give you a hint: it wasn't the kids!

Sometimes pit stops are necessary: the stops for caffeine to stay awake, the need for a potty break, stretching the legs, tire changes, filling up on gas. After necessary pit stops, you also have inconvenient pit stops and detours. One time, I-75 had a bridge burn down, and we had to take a detour on some country roads in Georgia to avoid a massive traffic jam. That same inconvenient pit stop turned into a scenic blessing as we drove through some beautiful peach orchards. The journey is important, and the destination is crucial, but the types of "stops" you make along the way can make or break your journey and how you get to your destination.

A man asked Jesus once, "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus told him two things: 1) "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind," and 2) "Love your neighbor as yourself." (Luke 10:25, 27)

Our destination is eternal life, and Jesus makes it clear, loving God and loving our neighbor is where we begin on that journey.



the eyes of the Jewish leaders had a flawed faith - make the

choice to love God by loving his neighbor.

The destination is crucial, but the steps we take to get there are so very important. When we take steps in our relationship with Jesus, it is required of us to include others in that journey. Avoiding people, viewing them as less-than, seeing their faith as flawed and not worthy of our attention, keeping our head down and walking away - these are not an option for us if we want the relationship with Jesus He wants from us. As we come out of our COVID season of isolation, let's not forget our purpose is two-fold: Devotion to God and loving actions, feelings and words toward our neighbors. That means engaging in community with them. That means having conversations with them. That means wanting to hear what they have to say and rejoicing over each step of each other's journey. The destination is crucial, but let's take the right steps to get there. If we need to change our thinking, let's make a necessary pit stop and make the right steps, so our journey of faith can be a light to our neighbors.





Never Travel Alone

Then I was in college, I planned a trip to see my dad. Since I didn't have a license, much less a car to get me there, I booked a flight from Jacksonville to Knoxville. This would have been overwhelming on a normal flight, but the odds were stacked against me. Three things made this trip insane. First my flight was late, and I had 15 minutes to get to my next gate. Then when we got off the plane, many of our gates were changed so we had to stand there and wait for them to direct us where to go. Then to top it off, I had the worst motion sickness ever. My only option was to sprint from one end of the Atlanta airport to the other, when all I wanted to do was to find the nearest bathroom to throw up. I was stressed out, scared and sick, and I would have given anything at that moment to have a friend

Have you ever found yourself in a similar situation? Maybe you were taking your first trip alone, or your first big solo project at work, or maybe even just a week of "single" parenting while your spouse is away. No matter what it is, there's always this pivotal moment where you quickly go from feeling like you're nailing it to thinking you are flat out failing. In Luke 22:54-62 we get to see Peter going through this exact same thing. After years of learning and travelling as a disciple with Jesus, he finds himself alone after Jesus is arrested and put on trial. This was his moment to stand up for his faith, yet when he's guestioned, he instead chose to deny Jesus three times. Even though Jesus had warned him the night before, Peter never believed he could betray his beliefs so easily. The seemingly effortless ability to stand up for his faith when he was among his fellow disciples quickly crumbled when he faced the challenge alone. You have to wonder what would have happened if he was accompanied by even one other disciple. I'm sure he wished he had the opportunity to go back and do it again, much like I wanted a do-over on my first flight, but we did learn from

those experiences that almost everything we do in life is better when we have someone to share it with.

From the very beginning of the Bible, God tells us we're not meant to go through life alone. After making Adam, He then made Eve to be his partner. The Bible is filled with similar accounts of these partnerships. Noah built the ark with his sons, Moses liberated the Israelites with the help of his brother Aaron, and Naomi's daughter-in-law Ruth refused to leave her



side after the death of their husbands. Those are just three of the many relationships we see play out. Ecclesiastes 4:9-12 even lists out the compounding benefits which come from partner work and the consequences of being alone. Verse 10 explains this perfectly, "If either of them falls down, one can help the other up, but pity anyone who falls and has no one to help them up." I didn't have someone there to help me up when I floundered in that airport. Did I make it to my destination? I did, barely, but I sure didn't enjoy the experience in the way I thought I would when I was still in the planning stage.

If you ever start questioning whether you can do something on your own or if you should seek out help, just think of all the benefits of working with others. In His infinite wisdom God created us to complement each other. Travelling with a partner means gaining extra knowledge when ours is lacking, lifting spirits when one of us needs encouragement, and extending our endurance when you find yourself wanting to quit. Seek out the people God puts in your life, because He put them there for a reason. Otherwise you might just find yourself lost and running in an airport, or worse yet, denying your faith when you need it the most.

ecently, my wife's grandmother, Helen Belew, passed away at the age of 94 years old. She was known as a loving and kind woman who never complained about anything in her life. She was also known for her love of family and her complete dedication to and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. She desired nothing more than to follow His will every day of her life. Most of all, she was known as a prayer warrior. During her 94 years she was witness to many of the historical events of the last century, including World War II, the Civil Rights movement and Space Race of the 60s, the fall of Communism in the 80s, countless global conflicts over the decades, seventeen different US Presidents, the incredible advancement of technology and so much more. She was also witness to many personal events of her own life which helped shape her and form her faith. She experienced love and marriage. She experienced heartbreak and divorce. She experienced the renewal of love found in a second husband who turned out to be the true love of her life. She experienced the joys of motherhood – raising six wonderful children, while also experiencing the grief of burying one's own young child. She experienced the celebration of marriages and the arrival of many grandchildren, great grandchildren and even great great grandchildren!! She also experienced the loneliness of her husband "graduating" to heaven before her, as well as two of her grown adult children preceding her in death. Helen Belew had quite a journey. More importantly, Helen Belew had a journey full of faith in which no matter the circumstance - life or death, grief or joy, she was never truly alone. Jesus was with her on this journey every step of the way.

Maybe her journey resembles different portions of your own. Maybe there are parts of it you hope to avoid or anticipate experiencing yourself. Or maybe you feel like your journey is nothing like hers. No matter. We are all on a journey - a long journey home. Our eternal home.

The apostle Paul wrote 2 Timothy late in his life. Some feel it may have been the last letter he wrote included in the canon of Scripture, written in 66 or 67 AD just prior to his death. These were some of the last words of a man who had traveled thousands of miles

to carry the message of the hope of the Gospel to likely millions of people. Second Corinthians 11 shares a list of the experiences and ups and downs in the life of this great man of faith. Some of his final thoughts remind us of the journey all of us are on. He makes mention of being near the end of his life and having "finished the race," and being ready to receive his reward. He was nearing the end of his journey and was ready to receive his reward - his eternal reward - home in heaven.

Isn't it funny how on long trips away from home, the trip going somewhere seems so long because we anticipate the unknown, while the trip coming home seems to go so much faster because we've seen it all before and we know what to expect when we arrive? On your long journey through life, my hope and prayer for you is for you to enjoy the journey - the ups and the downs, the joys and the sorrows, the moments you don't ever want to forget and the ones you wish you could erase from your mind. Let me remind you, it is indeed a long journey, but when you cross the finish line, my hope and prayer is that you finish the race as strong as when you started it and you hear your savior say, "Well done, good and faithful servant." I know Helen finished the race. She may have been physically weak, but she was spiritually strong, and because of that, I have hope of reunion with her in eternity at the end of my long journey home.

Summary of 2021-2022 Faith Promise Giving

he annual Faith Promise fiscal year runs from March 1 through Feb 28(29) of the following year. At the end of that time period, the annual report is made available to any of the ECC members who wish to receive a copy. You can find one digitally on the ECC website by clicking on the mission tab, then clicking on the "Annual Missions Report" button. Or you can find a copy on the ECC Friends page on Facebook. There are some printed copies available from the office if you would like to pick one up. Here are a few highlights from this past year of Faith Promise giving.

- The total amount of financial gifts given through our Faith Promise
 Mission program, including designated gifts, Faith Promise commitments,
 CWF, VBS and more was more than \$295,000 for the 2021-2022 Faith
 Promise fiscal year.
- There was a 55% increase in Faith Promise gifts over the previous fiscal year, an equivalent to more than \$85,000!
- Total gifts from our Special Projects fund reserved for emergency, critical
 or specific partner needs totaled more than \$58,000, which is above and
 beyond the regular monthly support we commit to our twenty-one various
 mission partners.

I am reminded of our Faith Promise Mission Conference theme from January of 2021 – "Whatever" and how God is able to accomplish whatever He wants, with whomever He wants, however He wants. Let's rejoice and celebrate this great act of faith on behalf of the ECC faith community by giving glory to God for all his provisions and blessings. And may we move even more forward in our faith by doing something "Bigger, Better, Greater and Stronger" this year!
