JUST PAST THE GATES

ometimes vacations have so much anticipation and build up there is no possible way for them to live up to what you hope they will be. Maybe it's the weather, or maybe the crowds, or maybe traffic or even hotel reservation difficulties — many of these can lead to things not always going as planned. And then sometimes you have the chance for a very unplanned, quick getaway and the results turn out better than you could have ever hoped for, and your memories of that time are more emblazoned in your mind than almost any other trip you've taken. Has that ever happened to you? Let me tell you about a time it happened to our family.

About ten years ago (I think), I was asked to perform a wedding for some former students from the ECC youth group. The wedding was for Seth and Katya (Rosario) Bowser. I was honored to lead the ceremony and even more excited by the fact it was going to be held at the wedding chapel at the Grand Floridian Resort at Walt Disney World. What a great place for a wedding — the background window opens up to a view of Cinderella's castle and provides a beautiful backdrop to the ceremony.

At that time, our daughter Rebekah was about three years old and our son Joel was just an infant. In order to be there for the rehearsal and the ceremony, housing arrangements were made at one of the Disney properties nearby. It was one of the "economical" sites — if I remember right, it was the All-Star Music resort — so nothing fancy or extravagant — just a room with two beds, a TV and a bathroom — and we were very grateful for it. Also, because of the scheduling, we knew we would have some free time to explore, but not enough to actually go into any of the Disney parks. Little did we know, none of that even mattered to our bright-eyed Disney-fied three-year-old.

Over the next 48 hours, we squeezed in a few times at the hotel pool, took a trip to the Downtown Disney shopping area, walked around the large shops overflowing with Disney attire and paraphernalia and even saw a character or two along the way. You'd have thought we had just experienced the greatest vacation in the history of vacations. Through the eyes of Rebekah, we had splashed in the most amazing swimming pool she had ever seen, we walked around the most engaging and entertaining shopping complex she had ever been to and we explored stores with more Disney related items than she could ever possibly imagine. Even the hotel rooms and bedcovers had Disney related themes which were the icing on the cake for her. It was an amazing weekend — oh yeah, the

– but it was an even more memorable
experience for Rebekah.

When we arrived home, I don't remember exactly what she said, but it was basically something like, "Wow! That was amazing! Can we go back to Disney World again? I had so much fun!!" Ironically, she never actually even set foot in one of the Disney parks. She had never walked through the gates of the park. She had not even experienced the least bit of the magic young children often encounter when going to a place like that, and yet she was still amazed. She had only experienced a slight glimpse into what many know as the "magic of Disney."

I think this might be similar to what the apostle John experienced when he writes of his visions of heaven in the book of Revelation. In the early chapters we get a description from John of the brief glimpse of heaven and those things he saw around the "throne of heaven." For the rest of the book, John describes his visions and writes them down just as he was instructed, but I can't help but think if what he did was one of the most difficult tasks ever given to any man. He was given a glimpse into eternity and yet was limited in his ability to describe it in our finite earthly terms. He was shown the glory and splendor of the throne room of God and all that was in it and had to use our limited vocabulary to summarize it. It probably felt like you or I trying to recreate Van Gogh's famous painting *Starry Night* using only finger paints!

Like my daughter's "Disney experience," we have experienced for ourselves small glimpses of heaven and short experiences of what we think eternity might be like, and even the thought of it can overwhelm us and move us to tears. We may have been moved by a particular worship experience, or maybe stopped and stood in awe at a moment of reflection amidst God's creation. Or maybe it was in the community of believers where you felt as if you were experiencing the love of God in those very moments. You know what the most exciting thing about all of that is? We haven't even begun to truly understand what eternity with our Lord, Savior and God will really be like.

Live each day looking for those glimpses of heaven – the glory of Creation, the blessings of fellowship, the joy of worship – knowing that you haven't even made it into the gates yet!!

It was quite a boring drive from Ocala, Florida to Dungannon, Virginia, and my family preferred to drive at night. There was essentially nothing to look at. Just miles and miles and miles of trees with the occasional rest stop. The exception to this was driving through downtown Atlanta. It was hands down my favorite part of the drive. It didn't matter how long I may have been asleep, or what other thing I would have been doing to occupy myself, I wanted to be informed when we were getting close. I anticipated that drive through the city lights, like I was going to Disney. I was in awe of that view. My face would be pressed up against the glass so I wouldn't miss one single skyscraper or even a second of the Atlanta Braves stadium. Throughout the years there were times when they forgot to wake me up, and to say I was disappointed was an understatement. It got to the point where I would do everything I could not to fall asleep. I didn't want to take the chance I'd miss it. My young, countrygirl heart was enamored with the buzz of the city, and as long as the power was on, those lights never let me down like other things might in my life.

As adult, I'm quite familiar with the fact that sometimes my expectations don't quite match up to the reality of things. It's something I'm sure we all can relate to. Maybe it's a vacation trip that didn't guite have the amount of bonding or relaxation we wanted. Instead of picnics by the pool, we got time outs in the hotel lobby (or worse, stitches in the ER). Maybe that dream job we got right after college had us wanting to run back to our childhood because adulting is hard and "people-ing" is even harder. As a spouse, I sometimes have expectations for those milestone days, only to be let down because my husband didn't know how to read my mind. When life gives us lemons instead of chocolate cake, how do you react? Do you sulk about it? Do you maybe whine a little? Maybe you get mad and plot passive aggressive revenge in your mind. Or maybe you're a much more gracious person than I am, and you respond with love and forgiveness.

God promises us many things, but giving us things exactly the way we want isn't one of them. There's no bigger example of this than the Israelites. When they were rescued from their life of slavery in Egypt, they had all kinds of expectations, and when that trip to the Promised Land didn't quite match up to the image in their mind, they were very human in their reactions. They doubted, they complained (aka, whined), they

came up with their own plans, and they were guite vocal about how they felt. They were like kids on a long car trip. "I'm bored." I'm hungry. Are we there yet? I don't wanna listen to NPR!" etcetera. Unbeknownst to them, God's plan was way bigger than anything they could imagine. So He gave them 40 years in the desert to learn some appreciation for what He brought them out of, and what He promised for their future. It's a hard lesson to learn. Instead of building up anticipation over what would come at the end, they built up expectations about the journey. I anticipated those lights in Atlanta as a child, but I never expected them to do more than bring me a temporary feeling of joy. I think we can all learn a lot from that early lesson in the Old Testament by spending less time building up expectations in our minds because God will show His Glory in ways we could never even imagine. Allow yourself to be disappointed, but shift your focus on anticipating the ways God will reveal His plan to you. Jeremiah 29:11 says this, "For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you a hope and a future." Step out in faith, and anticipate that hope instead of letting expectations block your view of the "skyline."

Giving-up Control

few years ago, Dad was gearing up to teach a Wednesday night class for a church and thought it would be really nice if he took us camping out there on the west coast. We had been camping plenty of times before with no major issues, but this time was a little different.

I'm sure those of you reading this have been through situations where you had absolutely no control over the moment, where things did **not** go according to plan, and when things really got out of hand...

This was one of those times.

We got the tent set up, the football was out, hot dogs cooked and eaten, and the reading chairs all ready. All was normal until we went to sleep and woke up to water EVERYWHERE. It was raining so hard the tent roof was sagging; our tent, pillows, blankets, shoes... *everything* was soaked. There was nothing to do at that moment except to get everything in the car and go anywhere but outside. So we gathered all of our things, got in the van and left. I can only imagine what the receptionist at the hotel thought when we arrived, clothes and bags soaked through, asking for a room.

We have never been camping again.

I was young at the time this happened, and I remember not knowing what to do. I was afraid because the wind and rain were so strong. I thought we were in real danger because we had no shelter except this little tent which caved under the weather.

We all know the story of Jonah. Jonah was a control guy. God

told him to go to Nineveh and get them to repent. Jonah didn't want to go, and tried to take control of the situation by heading in the opposite direction. Of course, that didn't stop God from turning Jonah right around by stirring up a storm which ended with Jonah in the belly of a giant fish. It was inside the fish Jonah prayed these words:

"When my life was ebbing away, I remembered you, Lord, and my prayer rose to you, to your holy temple. Those who cling to worthless idols turn away from God's love for them. But I, with shouts of grateful praise, will sacrifice to you. What I have vowed I will make good. I will say, 'Salvation comes from the Lord.'" (Jonah 2:7-9) Job says something similar:

"I know that you can do all things; no purpose of yours can be thwarted. You asked, 'Who is this that obscures my plans without knowledge? Surely I spoke of things I did not understand, things too wonderful for me to know."" (Job 42:1-3)

Sometimes, I catch myself praying for God to act in my life, but I want him to act on my time, in my way; however, this obscures God's plan (when I don't even know the extent of it in the first place). Of course, God's plan always comes through. God works on his time, in his own way. Do you catch yourself in this situation? Do you find yourself attempting to take control

of your life and trying to fasttrack God's plan for you? If so, I would encourage you to pray the words of Jonah or of Job. Relinquishing control to God is scary and will feel dangerous. Don't cave to the lie that you

are in control, but instead surrender your will and replace it with God's.



Other times, seeking God may feel like "finding snow." You know He is out there, but you just cannot see Him yet. During those times, you can trust He will never leave us or forsake us; we just need to earnestly seek.

In Matthew 7:7, Jesus says, "Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you."

One of the ways I've been seeking God lately is through a word study. It's been so eye-opening to look deeper into God's Word at the meaning of Hebrew and Greek words. For example, each of these actions in Matthew 7:7 are continual actions. In Greek, the word **ask** means to request, petition, or demand until the request is granted (aka: borderline nag). **Seek** means search for, desire, require, or demand until you find what you are looking for. **Knock** means to beat a door with a stick, to gain admittance, until the door is opened.

Seeking God is a continual action. Not something that we can do on occasion, but something that we are told to do as a lifestyle. We can rest assured that when we do seek Him, we will find Him because He is true to His word!

In case you are wondering, we always found snow because we didn't stop until we found it, and I'm so glad that we did! Keep seeking God because we all know, when you seek Him, you will find Him.


