To Clap or Not to Clap



Recently an issue has been brought up to Pastor Joe and myself by a few different people. The concern that some have asked about is whether it is appropriate to clap after special music, a choir song, etc. An overwhelming majority of people do it spontaneously and as an act of worship and/or of appreciation for someone using their talents to glorify God. Yet, there are some people who question this, or do not feel comfortable with it. While there is a lot that could be said about this, let me give you a few points of emphasis on why we allow this and why we are not going to prohibit it.

1. As Christians we have freedom in Christ. There is no singular approach to worship when it comes to modes and expressions. Some people prefer quiet and reverent environments. Other people prefer a more expressive and vibrant one. Psalm 46:10 says, *“Be still and know that I am God.”* Two verses later in Psalm 47:1 we read, *“Clap your hands, all you nations; shout to God with cries of joy.”* That’s right, one verse speaks about the importance of reverence and silence. Two verses later it speaks about the value of clapping and shouting. There is no singular mode or expression, even though everyone has their preferred methods.
2. When I came here three years ago people clapped after special music. There were even a couple of Sundays when some people clapped after the sermon. So, having people clap after special music, moving hymns, or choir numbers, is nothing new to our congregation. It’s been part of our church culture for over two decades. This is not a new phenomenon.
3. I understand that there is a legitimate concern in modern Christendom regarding a performance mentality in worship. Yet, ultimately, a performance mentality is an issue of the heart (1 Sam 16:7). King David danced before the Lord so passionately, his linen came up. His wife judged his behavior as being inappropriate and embarrassing. But David knew his heart and motivation was sincere, and that God was pleased even though his wife was appalled (2 Sam 14:23). If at any point, the Pastors and Leaders of PWCC sense a fleshly performing spirit is at work, we will address that. At this point though, there are no such concerns. People in the congregation have been moved by powerful songs and music that have been humbly and genuinely done. People in the sanctuary are choosing to respond to with an “Amen”, a raised hand, or by clapping. There is no arrogance, performance mentality, or fleshly reactions at work in our mind.

This question is nothing new to our pastoral staff, and we are unified and comfortable in our position of allowing people the freedom to express their worship and gratitude by raising their hands, saying “Amen”, or by clapping. And we are not going to prohibit it unless it becomes extreme, or we feel it is feeding a fleshly spirit of performing for self-glory rather than worshipping for God’s glory.

Ultimately, we can’t make everyone happy. Being a community church, we draw people from a variety of backgrounds with different preferences and expectations for worship. Yet this has been a part of our church culture for a couple of decades and we are going to continue to allow it as long as it is a sincere expression of thanksgiving and worship. If you don’t feel comfortable clapping, then please refrain, and do not feel pressured or guilty for not doing so. If you are moved to respond, then continue to do so with humility, gratitude, and moderation.

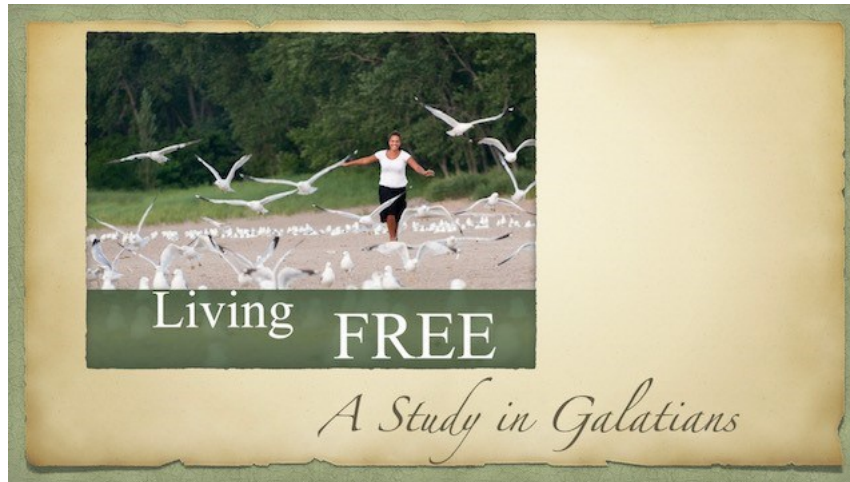

The Education Committee is now on our summer break. We will resume monthly meetings on August 29, 2022.

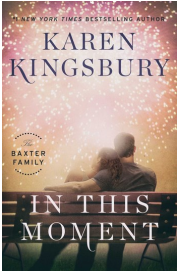

Hamilton High School in Southern Indiana has turned into a hot bed of chaos and crime with its students routinely being killed by gang violence, dealing and doing drugs, fighting, indulging in sexual promiscuity and unwanted pregnancy. The suicide rates have been climbing and the number of student dropouts has soared.

Principal Wendell Quinn has tried practically everything to combat the situation and the survival of the school itself is now at stake. As a Christian himself, he decides to introduce a voluntary after school Bible Study to be held in the school gymnasium.

When the word gets out, several parents are in an uproar citing division of church and state. Afraid her position as friend to Principal Quinn will be jeopardized, she ends their relationship and asks for a transfer to another school. Quinn's son, who is the star football quarterback, is distanced from some of the other players. In spite of all this, there is a remnant of students who have seen the benefits of the after-school study and are voicing their support of their principal who is now being sued.

Enter lawyer Luke Baxter who takes on the fight of his life by defending Principal Quinn against the public-school board.

This is an inspiring and relevant story about the nuances of religious freedom, the cost of the fight and how a group of determined people just might restore the meaning of faith in today's culture.

The beautiful quilts represent hundreds of hours of labor given in love. Think about the time in choosing the right colors and patterns for both the quilts and the Hope Bags. We are thankful that each of these women are using the gift and talent the Lord has given them to spread the love of Jesus to the people in the missions right here in our Valley. Many hours are given by the faithful folks who come to the meetings and then are willing to sort and count the 40,000+ items that will go into the bags. The Team Leaders, Rebecca Oaks, Inventory; Lucy Peek, Hope Bags and cords; Wilma Plett, Quilts; and George Shoop, Stock Coordination, work tirelessly to direct and help their teams succeed in their mission. We are already working toward our goal for 2023, as materials and yarn are being cut and selected. You play an important role in this ministry to the abused, homeless and human trafficked women and children that we serve through Phoenix Rescue Mission, Phoenix Dream Center, THRIVEAZ, Neighborhood Ministries, Changing Lives Center and Short Creek Dream Center.

United Indian Mission Aviation - by Sherry Burdick, Liaison

God has worked in some amazing ways through the ministry of UIMA (United Indian Mission Aviation) this past year. A faithful Christ follower for many years, Jose Lopez of the Huichol people in Mexico, desired to take the gospel message into un-evangelized villages in mountainous regions. For years he hiked into remote areas by himself to preach the Good News. Eventually UIM Aviation stepped in to fly this elderly man into these areas. A small community of believers began to form and this last fall eighteen Huichol new believers were baptized by Jose.

Medical and dental needs among indigenous peoples are often difficult to meet. Recently, UIMA flew seven plane trips from the Cora village to a center where a team of medical and dental volunteers provided forty people with medical help and many others got fillings or had decayed teeth pulled. Transportation by small plane made these treatments possible. Not only were physical needs being met, but the message of Jesus Christ and the Good News was shared with these people.

About 45 miles from the nearest airstrip is a village with no gospel witness. People in the village are reticent to towards outsiders. A group of missionary kids attending missionary school in Chihuahua decided to show kindness to these people. They created gift bags with coloring books, pencils, toothbrushes, socks, candy and other items for children. A pilot flew six of the students into the mountains where they were then trucked to the village. More than 150 village children gathered at a local school where they received the gift bags and joined in playing games with the teens. We pray that a relationship has been established and that now the villagers will be more receptive to the gospel.

Finally, we praise God for the safe return to Mexico of a plane known as 52Q that was successfully repaired after damage from a serious accident 8 years ago. Countless hours of dedicated repair work in Tucson prepared the plane for its safe return to carry on its mission back in Mexico.

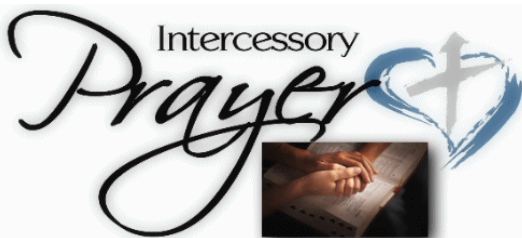
