

Gratitude and Compassion



"Remember those who are in prison, as though you were in prison with them; those who are being tortured, as though you yourselves were being tortured."

Hebrews 13:3

Like most of you, I was shocked by the images I saw on television that have been taking place in Afghanistan. Americans being stranded and, in some cases, beaten by the Taliban. The explosion that killed 13 Americans. Afghan citizens, leaving everything they had behind and running with only a bag of their possessions, desperately trying to flee the country. A mother handing her baby over a barbed wire fence to a US soldier so her child could have a better life. And unbelievably, individuals, some of whom lost their lives, trying to grab a hold of airplanes that were taking off in order to escape.

Obviously, the situation in Afghanistan is a big ball of yarn, which has a long history and is quite complicated. I have no answers, nor is it my intention to discuss or debate the political elements behind what has, and what is taking place. Yet, I am moved by what I'm seeing.

As I read through the Gospel of Mark, and process what is taking place on the ground in Afghanistan, I find my heart wavering between two primary emotions. One, is gratitude. The fact that I live in the United States of America with freedom, liberty, and opportunities that many in the world will never have. Even though our nation has its flaws, and is going through a very tumultuous time with a variety of tense and divisive social issues, I am once again reminded of how thankful I am to live in this great nation. We are truly blessed to live in the land of the free and the home of the brave. And to have so many people willing to risk their lives in order to protect our freedom.

Beyond gratitude, the second emotion that rises up inside of me is compassion. A deep sense of empathy and sadness for the Afghan people who are trapped in such a horrific situation. This past week I've had interactions with two close friends who have direct connections to Afghanistan. One has a church that supports missionaries and Christian families that live within the country. He told me that one of the primary prayer requests that the Afghan Christians were sharing was for strength and courage to maintain their testimony and to die with dignity if necessary. The other friend I have works for a global Christian ministry that focuses on refugees around the globe. He shared with me how dire the situation is, and how ministries like his, are preparing for a wave of refugees that they are incapable of fully serving.

As I said earlier, I don't have any answers. But what I do know, is that watching the events in Afghanistan is good opportunity for me to offer a prayer of gratitude for the life I have in America. It's also a good reminder that God calls us to a life of compassion. Not just for myself and those close to me, but for all people. God so loved the world that he sent his one and only Son (John 3:16). Therefore, as followers of Christ, we are called to empathize, care, and serve all people, everywhere, in the name of Jesus (Matthew 25:35-40).

Life is a constant string of ever-changing details. Most of you know the feelings of deciding to stop doing the big details that you've done most your life. But as Fred Rogers ("Mr. Rogers") wrote, "Often when you think you're at the end of something, you're at the beginning of something else." An ending is a new beginning. That is as true for you as it is for me. God will abundantly provide new leadership for worship, music, and media, which will mark a new beginning of moving ahead into God's bright future for this marvelous congregation.

I'm not done yet. We have much ministry to accomplish between now and the first of the year.



KINCAID'S HOPE - by Grace Greene



Beth Kincaid is suddenly laid off from the job she had for the last ten years and she's sad, angry, and confused. Where does she go from here? Maude Henry, who raised both Beth and her brother as small children after a car accident killed their parents, lived in Preston and she may be her only hope for the time being. Maude had always been her refuge, a calming influence in times of trouble, so Beth packs and hits the road.

Upon her arrival, she is met with the news of Maude's sudden death happening just weeks before, leaving her house and belongings to Beth. Now she has a house but no job, no friends, nobody. The future looks like an ocean of uncertain waves circling about her with no shore in sight.

Sometime in the night she hears strange sounds, nothing like she has been accustomed to in the city and creeping to the window, she sees strangers walking through the back yard. What is she supposed to do when there was no security guard? Grabbing an afghan on the sofa she bravely waits for dawn to investigate.


The first thing she sees across the river is someone who looks vaguely familiar as he walks down the pier, although she hadn't been in Preston for more than a decade. She decides to locate the sheriff's office reporting the trespassers from the previous night. She also hopes to find some answers to questions about her former guardian at the same time, and to decide what to do about her inheritance. She'd saved a little money, but it wouldn't go far.

Meanwhile, a "high-roller" company had been approaching Preston secretly as a possible location for a Disneyland-type giant amusement park. Beth is now the owner of some property in question as well as extensive acreage which had belonged to her grandfather.

This makes good summer reading, and as a bonus, is in large print in our own church library.

Finding God when the World's on Fire

Strength and Faith for Dangerous Times By Charles Swindoll

Charles Swindoll wrote this book in 2016 when all the world was learning of the ISIS terrorists and their destroying ways. Swindoll likens ISIS (and our personal troubles) to a forest fire. It can start out small and grow to an out-of-control conflagration. Swindoll brings to our attention the comfort found

in the Psalms. When David wrote Psalm 11, he was in danger of losing his life. David claimed refuge in the Lord. He remembers God is on the throne in heaven. Psalms 46 and 91 are also sighted for their comforting words.

Fighting a forest fire requires planning and decisive action. The same true for fighting ISIS or any "terror" that we might face. (Think disease, family squabbles, business down turns.) Dr. Swindoll says know your enemy. Peter's letters point clearly to the enemy, Satan himself. Our culture is currently designed to draw us away from God and our refuge instead of pointing us to Him.

"My task is to equip you, point you to the truth, and prepare you for what is ahead in the struggle" says Charles Swindoll. He wrote this book to counter our current culture.

In his little book of only 105 pages Swindoll show us how not to succumb to the enemy. It is a quick read that deserves a re-read for its everlasting truths.

A reception will follow in Hoover Hall with a meal.



Just Jesus: The Gospel According to Mark Pastor Jim Powell

On Wednesday, September 29th, Pastor Jim will be conducting a Bible Study here at the church on the History and Context of the book of Mark. This series will look at a number of themes that help us to better understand the Gospel and complement the present sermon series. The Bible Study will be at 1 pm, here at Palm West. We are still unsure if it will be in the Sanctuary or Hoover Hall, but our intention is to be able to record the lessons and make them available online for those who can not attend.

History and Context in Mark's Gospel A Bible Study led by Pastor Jim

History and Context in Mark's Gospel

Understanding the Author

The history and background on Mark the author and the audience he was writing to.

Persecution is a theme for a reason (8:34-38; 10:28-30; 13:9-13). Opposition (2:6; 3:6; 6:4; 8:11; 10:12; 12:13; 14:1,55; 15:11; 15:31-32)

Is it okay to Paraphrase?

Mark often references the OT, but rarely does he quote a verse exactly. He often mixes various verses into a single quotation. 1:11 (Is 42:1; Ps 2:7). 1:2-3 (Mal 3:1; Ex 23:20; Is 40:3). 11:1-11 (Zac 9:9; Ps 118:25-26). 11:17 (Is 56:7; Jer 7:11). 12:1-12 (Is 5:1-2; Ps 118:22-23). 14:62 (Dan 7:13; Ps 110:1).

On Uncleanliness and Blood

The issue of uncleanliness was a big one for 1st century Jews. This deeper context of this helps highlight a shocking story in Mark 5.

Was Jesus being Rude

Mark 7 tells a story of an encounter between Jesus and a foreign woman. The story troubles some due to the harshness of Jesus. But a better historical understanding reveals that Jesus wasn't nearly as rude as we may think.

On Following

A common theme in Mark is to talk about the way, path, or Road. Understanding the OT brings deeper meaning to these verses and this theme. 1:2-3; 2:23; 6:8; 8:3,27; 9:33-34; 10:17,32,46-52; 11:8; 12:14.

What's the Big Deal

Jesus was once asked a simple question about taxes. His answer was simple. But understanding the context makes the true brilliance of his answer come alive.

On this Rock

In Chapter 8, Peter declares Jesus the Messiah. This confession was a watershed moment. But the context over this occurred brings even more significance and questions to what was said.

The Passover

It's easy for Christians to celebrate communion without fully understanding the context of the Last Supper. A better understanding the Passover feast brings deeper meaning to communion.

Repetition and Redundancy

The theme of 3's. Rhythms of writing and sharing stories in order to make them more memorable. Mark's main concern was to remember the stories pointing to Jesus. Over emphasis on details can sometimes cause us to miss the main thing.



End of Life Matters Fannalou Guggisberg

If you haven't already attended the End of Life Matters seminar, keep reading to find out why you should come.

As a chaplain/pastor, I've dealt with many families who were grieving the death of a loved one. For the first two or three weeks, they are usually experiencing shock and numbness. I myself have experienced this reality when I've lost family members. Numbness and shock are a natural response God gave us to protect our physical bodies from feeling the full force of the loss. Something akin to a fog engulfs us and prevents us from functioning normally. Time moves in slow motion. Many of us have trouble focusing or thinking clearly during this period. Individuals experience loss in unique ways, but this is a general response I've seen and felt time and again.

Because it's difficult for grieving persons to concentrate and/or even make decisions when they've lost a loved one, having in hand documents that were prepared ahead of time is immensely helpful. I'm talking about such things as wills, directions to physicians (a.k.a. "living wills" and durable medical powers of attorney), prepaid funeral plans, and funeral instructions so your family and loved ones know your full wishes after you are gone.

Writing down your wishes in advance saves your loved ones from the burden and stress of guessing what you wanted, or trying to remember what you verbally told them maybe years before. Complete instructions also help them locate all necessary records and information kept in your house and safe deposit box. All at a time when they may not be functioning normally due to grief. This is a real gift you can prepare and leave for them.

We call our seminar "End of Life Matters" because your end of life matters. Please give serious thought to signing up for this coming session. Couples are encouraged to come together, and singles, who also need to leave written instructions to be followed, should attend as well.

You will receive a comprehensive overview of all that's involved and each participant gets a planning document to take and complete. If you attended an earlier session, you don't need to come to this one, but please do finish filling out your planning document if you haven't already done so.

The next session is scheduled for Wednesday, September 29 at 1:30 pm in the Hoover Hall classroom. Led by Rev. Fannalou Guggisberg. If you wish to sign up contact the church office.

The leaders told the families they couldn't live in their village unless they renounced their "Jesus religion."

When the families refused to do so, village leaders loaded them and their belongings onto a truck, drove them out of the village and abandoned them on a plot of empty farmland. Authorities then destroyed the believers' homes.

Voice of the Martyrs helped the families find new housing and supported them with living expenses as they began to rebuild
