The "Hate the Sin; Love the Sinner" Mantra

Last weekend, Pastor Hubbard gave a wonderful message on "Loving God and Loving People." As he spoke, it triggered some thoughts that I have previously written on regarding the popular mantra, "Hate the sin, but love the sinner". Obviously, there is truth in this statement, and it is often a heartfelt expression of how we feel—or at least how we want to feel. But the past year years, I have tried to avoid using this phrase as much as possible for three reasons:



1. Love should be more evident by our actions than our words.

Most of us understand the biblical mandate to be a people of love. Jesus told us this is the greatest commandment, and He said that people would know we are His disciples by our love. But, let's be honest, it is not easy to practice love. It is easier to talk about it. That is why the apostle John said, "Let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth" (1 John 3:18). In the book of Galatians, the apostle Paul added, "The only thing that counts is faith expressing itself through love" (Galatians 5:6).

Oftentimes we want to express our faith in truth, zeal, passion, and boldness. There is a place for those things, of course, but our faith needs to be modeled in loving actions and words that have genuine grace and compassion behind them. Too often we talk about loving the sinner, but our actions contradict our words. People don't see the love or feel the love, only the frustration, anger, and disapproval in the tone of our voices. In contrast, Jesus rarely had to tell people He loved them, yet He had sinners flocking to Him because His love and compassion were evident. It was visible and tangible.

2. It sounds condescending.

Jesus once told a story about a Pharisee and tax collector who came to the temple to pray. The Pharisee looked up to heaven and said, "God, I thank you that I am not like other people—robbers, evildoers, adulterers—or even like this tax collector" (Luke 18:11). That Pharisee may have been sincere, but his words came across as arrogant and uncompassionate. Jesus said his words did not reflect the truth of God, and the tax collector—who prayed, "God, have mercy on me, a sinner"—was actually closer to God's heart than the Pharisee.

In our zeal to protect the truth, our attitude and tone can come across as condescending. Much like the Pharisees, who were blind to their blindness, we are unaware of how arrogant and judgmental our words often sound. When we say to people, "I hate the sin, but I love the sinner," our motive may be good, but we can look and sound more like a Pharisee than a Christ follower.

3. It's better to say, "I love the sinner, and I hate MY sin."

Jesus said that the one who has been forgiven much loves much and the one who has been forgiven little loves little (Luke 7:47). I think part of the reason many evangelical Christians are not defined by love is because we do not believe we have been forgiven much. We believe grace is necessary for salvation, and many of us remember the sins of our past that God has forgiven, but when it comes to our present state of brokenness, we are blind, callused, and in denial. We generalize and diminish the deeper sins of the heart, like pride, fear, unbelief, envy, greed, lust, and gossip, by saying things like, "I know I'm not perfect, but..."

When we are truly walking in an awareness of our sin, we realize how far from Jesus we are, even if we are living good, moral, devoted lives. This awareness makes us humble and compassionate toward those far from God because we aren't deceived into believing we are more righteous than we really are. However, when we have no awareness of our sin, we have little grace and patience for people who are living in blatant disobedience. Therefore, we need to spend more time searching our hearts and repenting of our own sin and less time trying to correct the world by telling them how wrong they are and how much we love them.

These are the reasons I am trying to avoid the mantra "Hate the sin; love the sinner" as much as possible. Instead, I want to walk in perpetual awareness of the state of my heart and my desperate need for Jesus, not only because of my past sins but also out of my present failures. I also hope to carry myself in such a way that my actions and the tone of my voice actually show the love of Jesus rather than just talking about it. For, while we must hold to the standards and convictions we believe represent God's will, if we did so with greater amounts of love and grace, we will be much better witnesses for Christ to a hurting and disobedient world.

Another Year Begins November 28

No, I'm not thinking of January first beginning the new year, but a more profound, spiritual calendar that can help us grow in our faith in Christ.

The "Christian Year," also known as the Church Calendar (not to be confused with the PWCC church calendar), is the historic cycle of celebrating the saving events of God in Jesus Christ by marking those particular events in which God's saving purposes were made known.

Throughout the course of the Church's history, this calendar developed into an confusing matrix of feasts and celebrations that eventually overshadowed the centrality of Christ and His saving work on the cross. By the late medieval period, every day of the year had been named after a saint. The sixteenth century Reformers discontinued the practice of observing the Christian year because of the Roman excesses, but in doing so lost many positive aspects. They threw the baby out with the bath water, so to speak.

Too often the Protestant Christian community is guilty of making a bigger deal of the Hallmark calendar (Mother's Day, Father's Day, and the host of national holidays) than of the Church Calendar. We Evangelicals do observe a simple and unadorned calendar that accents the major events of Christ - a Christian year similar to that of the early church. The major themes are: Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Holy Week, Resurrection Sunday, and Pentecost.

The Church Year traditionally concludes with "Christ the King" Sunday on November 21, also known as the Feast of Christ the King. Then the Church year begins anew with the first Sunday of Advent on November 28 (this year). So in this month we have the ending of one year and the beginning of another.

The four weeks of Advent (which starts the Christian calendar) is a time to contemplate the appearing of the promised Messiah and to personally prepare to live in the Light as He is in the Light (I John). It is a time to remember that the God who was faithful to fulfill His ancient promise to send the Redeemer of humankind's sin is the same God who is trustworthy with our future: Jesus came and He is coming again.

So, happy new year Church!



ANGELS, Dr. David Jeremiah

Book available in our church library

Angels, they perch atop our Christmas trees. We wear angel pins on our clothes. Statues are displayed in our gardens of

chubby winged cherubs. Are these the depictions of real angels? Dr. David Jeremiah makes clear what angels are, who they are and what we ought to know about them. He puts to rest the myths and misunderstandings about these servants of God.


A ringing bell does not signify an angel has earned his wings. In Scripture the two classes of angels known as cherubim and seraphim are the only ones mentioned to have wings. And yes, there are classes of angels. We have heard of cherubim and seraphim and the two famous angels Gabriel whose name means "Mighty One of God" and the archangel Michael. His name means "Who is Like God?"

They all are created beings just as you and I are created beings.

They were already there when human beings were created. (Colossians 1:16) Angels are ministering spirits sent to serve those who will inherit salvation. (Hebrews 1:14) How comforting to know God had everything in place before he put Adam and Eve in the garden.

Angels seems to be organized into different groups with different responsibilities and duties so that God's will is carried out. Dr. Jeremiah asks if it is true of angels, might it be true for us too? (think—different gifts)

Dr. Jeremiah tells us exactly where to find the scriptures that talk about angels—the only true source of information about the "substance of things not seen."





November 4 Book: John Newton, Catherine Swift

The amazing story of the "Old Converted Sea Captain" whose hymns are still loved today. John Newton (1725-1807) was a British sailor whose life of sin took him to the western coast of Africa, where he became a virtual slave before getting involved in the African slave trade. His dramatic conversion during a violent storm in the North Atlantic, however, did not end his involvement with slave trading. It would be six years before he gave up his career as a sea captain and went on to become an Anglican clergyman. Dissatisfied with the hymns of the day, Newton began writing his own, many autobiographical in nature, and is remembered for "Amazing Grace," "How Sweet the Name the Name of Jesus Sounds," and "Glorious Things of Thee Are Spoken", from a "wretched" prodigal son to a crusader against slavery.

THE HOPE BAG MINISTRY

We are often asked by new folks to PWCC: "What does the Hope Bag Ministry do?" In answer to that question, the following is a brief explanation:

The Ministry provides needed items to women and children who are at risk, either from abuse, human trafficking or other situations beyond their control Our mission is to provide each woman with a Bible, in which we insert the Salvation message. Only as a woman comes to know Christ and accept Him as her Lord and Savior can she truly understand how to become free from the abuse in her life, and the lives of her children.

The Hope Bags and beautiful quilts portray Jesus' love to each of the children. We have had children ask us if they can keep the bag and quilt as they have never experienced having something of their very own.

We currently serve the Phoenix Dream Center, Short Creek Dream Center, THRIVE, Neighborhood Ministries, Phoenix Rescue Mission and Changing Lives Center. If you are not familiar with any of these missions, please ask Claudia Smith, and she will be happy to share the information with you.

We collect year-round for the items to fill the bags. Each mission is visited to discuss the needs, and make certain each item in the bags are what is needed. All the items must be <u>NEW</u>. The recipients of the bags have been treated poorly for many years, and they feel they have no self-worth. Presenting the colorful handmade Hope Bags and quilts helps to instill in their heart and mind that they are worth having something new that is just special for them. When they arrive at a safe house with nothing but the clothes on their back and are given one of these bags and quilts, we reflect Jesus love to them.

Your gifts and donations and time given to make this mission possible are deposits you are making in our eternal home in Heaven. May God bless you for being so generous in touching the lives of those we may never meet, but who need our help and expression of love.

People who live in isolated parts of the world are being reached and changed by Christ's love through the ministry of Mission Aviation Fellowship. Since 1945, the vision of MAF has brought help, hope and healing through aviation. At Palm West 12% of giving goes towards missions and a percentage of those dollars are helping MAF ministers worldwide in 13 countries, especially in remote regions of Africa, Asia, Eurasia and Latin America. Hospitals and clinics can be difficult to get to if you live in places like the mountains of southern Africa but MAF can bring life-saving medical care. When COVID struck, MAF flew health workers to instruct local clinics on procedures and delivered protective and testing equipment. Disaster response and relief work reach isolated people suffering

after earthquakes, cyclones, or hurricanes. In addition, MAF keeps churches in isolated areas connected, supported and carries believers to remote villages to share the gospel.

Long range, MAF flights help build stronger communities, which in turn yields stronger kids and opportunities for a better life. Because of our giving, MAF flights create access to medical care, education, development pro-



jects, and the gospel for people who live cut-off from the rest of the world. Airplane fuel and maintenance expenses are a

large part of keeping this ministry flying, but worth it to help someone in need and share the love of Jesus Christ. Each day, in different time zones around the world, MAF serves as a tangible presence of God's compassion through service to the broken and the hurting.
