

We Come in Peace



One of the more significant theme's around the birth of Jesus was that of peace. It was proclaimed by Isaiah the prophet when he predicted the future Messiah by calling him the Prince of Peace. When Jesus was born the angels proclaimed "peace on earth." Even today during the Christmas season we see cards, decorations, lights, and banners that proclaim the message of peace.

The theme of peace though is much larger than just Christmas and birth of Jesus. There are several hundred verses in the Bible that address this issue. Peace between people and groups. Peace between man and God. Peace within and around us. Yet, for as much as the Bible talks about the importance of peace, especially for Christians, it seems it is desperately lacking not only in the world but also in the church.

In 2013 I traveled to Africa for a summit with church leaders from around the globe. One day I was visiting with a leading minister from the country of South Sudan. Sudan Christians had been ravished from persecution from the Muslims in the north for several decades, but in 2011 they gained their independence, and South Sudan became their own country under Christian leadership and separated from the Islamic power base they had endured previously. As I talked to this church leader about the persecution he and other Christians faced, I then asked him the question, "I'm sure it's much better now isn't it?" The Pastor shook his head no, and said that nothing had really changed. I asked him to explain and he started to tell me about how once the Christians obtained their independence they began to fight for power among themselves. Tribes. Denominations. Geographical locations. They all began to fight for control of the country and as a result they began to turn on each other with the fervor and violence they had previously endured from the Muslims.

Everywhere we turn is seems there is a lack of peace. Watch the evening news and its story after story of people turning on each other in some of the most depressing and unbelievable of ways. Therefore, this Christmas season I'm going to do a series on the theme of peace. I'm be speaking about everything from what biblical peace really is, to the difference between being a peace-maker and a peace-keeper. I'll talk about having peace of heart and peace with God. Hopefully as a result, the peace that Jesus came to bring will be a little more real to us and in us.

Holidays: Do you really enjoy them?

It might surprise you to know that not everyone loves the holidays.

There are those whose routine is severely interrupted, and they cannot wait for the days to return to normal. Though they may not say, "Bah, humbug," they survive best in the routine of life. Others have religious scruples about holidays, such as the Puri-

tans did so many years ago. They are concerned with connections and origin, as well as commercialization. Yet others are sad during holidays because of losses and loneliness, like the widowed, or someone whose family lives in far away places. Some realize that this may be the last holiday period they or their loved one will experience, and they wish it were not such a reminder that beloved family and friends will no longer be together.

It is important to ask yourself, "Do I really enjoy the holidays?" And if not, how can I make the best of them?

First, realize that God didn't require the holidays we celebrate. All this is man's concoction. Nowhere in the Bible do we find the words, "Thou shalt celebrate the birth of Christ every December 25". So, we don't have to feel that a choice not to celebrate as everyone else does is a failure to love God. It simply isn't so.

Second, if you are a person who loves routine or being busy, determine a good goal for your personal growth as a believer and work out a plan to tackle your goal during the holidays. You'll accomplish something and that's important for many of us. For instance, you may wish to read through a book of the Bible several times during the holiday period. Or you could discipline yourself to write email messages of encouragement to several friends you haven't communicated with on that level for some time. Encouragement is good for any season. Don't just bemoan the days; employ them.

Third, determine not to let your absence from loved ones or even your bias against the holiday time to affect your demeanor toward others. Rather, think through how you can do just the opposite. Overcome the dread of this holiday period with a new level of interest in others. It's not about gifts, but love. The free time during holiday periods, if you have some, can afford you more opportunity to share that love. Rise above the doldrums.

Fourth, simplify. Some families decide not to give gifts at Christmas, or to give gifts that help others. A great resource is World Vision International, Charity Gift Catalog | Gifts That Give Back | World Vision, or Food For The Hungry, Clean Water - Give the Gift of Life - Food for the Hungry (fh.org). The big deal is getting together with friends and/or family. Reach out to neighbors, friends, and church family to have a low stress potluck for Christmas. Have a great meal, play some games together, and generally have a beautiful day of stress-free fun. Who can beat that?

Or, if you are required to do some gift buying, think of ways to make it simple. I know that it is thoughtful to buy "just the right gift," but realize that what you think is just the right often gets taken back to the store or shows up in next year's garage sale. In certain (though not all) situations, cash in the envelope is OK. Don't forget that you can stipulate its use, such as saying that it must be used for a getaway or a meal together, or you can even say, "Here's \$50 to give to someone in need," or even, "Here's \$30 that must be used to take grandmother on a date!" This won't always work, but it does sometimes. Or, you might say, "My gift to everyone this year is to take us all to get ice cream at ______." Give an experience. Or some of you may find giving those family heirlooms away each year is an excellent choice. After all, you want them to go to the family. You might get the store to frame up copies of an early photograph or document to give out. Simplify and tone down expectations.

Finally, remember that it isn't so much the things you do as it is the person you are that is important. Whether you want to see this holiday period coming, or wish it weren't, you have a special opportunity ahead. If your contacts are reduced only to the person at the fast-food counter or that sometimes ungrateful extended family, or the stragglers left at the apartment complex, leave them a powerful image of a man or woman who loves Christ and overcomes difficulties and who isn't bitter or demanding. That's the best gift in anybody's book.

December 2nd Book: A Redbird Christmas, Fannie Flagg


With the same incomparable style and warm, inviting voice that have made her beloved by millions of readers far and wide, *New York Times* bestselling author Fannie Flagg has written an enchanting Christmas story of faith and hope for all ages that is sure to become a classic.

January 6th Book: Stuck in the Present, Dave Moore



Amidst uncertain times in the United States and Canada, Village Missionaries are working hard to proclaim the Gospel. With a focus on the unity of believers, they continue to boldly proclaim the truth both in person and through livestreaming and social media in small towns and rural areas. They are rejoicing as the Gospel reaches people that do not attend church, and some partner churches have seen

their influence spread far beyond their community. Village missionaries are finding creative ways to connect with the next generation and introduce them to Jesus. Through the financial and prayer support of Palm West Community Church, Village Missions currently partners with 230 mission churches. This past year VM has added one new church/field, 13 new missionaries and 5 interns. At the 2021 Fall Candidate School in November, VM had 7 missionary candidates attend. Five U.S regional Staff Conferences in 2021 ministered to, encouraged and taught over 600 missionaries, spouses and their children to remind them they are not alone as they minister in isolated areas.











Village Missions Purpose:

"Village Missions partners with small country churches to help them thrive. We place spiritually qualified missionary pastors, at the invitation of the congregation. These missionary pastors serve in a full-time capacity, preaching the Word and loving the people. Missions Operation Mobilization

Operation Mobilization or "OM" is an international missions organization which got its start in 1957 when George Verwer and a couple of college friends organized a summer outreach to Mexico. After graduating, George and his friends traveled

to Spain, sharing the Gospel and distributing literature. By 1963, George and his small team realized that God's plan was to mobilize His church to reach the nations. 2,000 Christians joined the summer outreach teams in Europe. At the same time, the first year-long teams moved into the Indian subcontinent and the Muslim world, committing themselves to reaching those who had never heard the Gospel.



In the mid 1960's, work began in Communist Eastern Europe with teams smuggling in Bibles and small printing presses. About the same time, teams began distributing literature in Iraq, Syria, Kuwait, Afghanistan & South Asia. In 1970 the OM Ships Ministry began, expanding OM's reach around the globe, with the ability to visit thousands of the world's port cities.

In 1989 over 7000 people joined the LOVE EUROPE Summer Outreach. Of that group, hundreds joined long-term and in 1991 OM began a focus on humanitarian relief, preaching a holistic gospel in response to the Gulf War. In 2007, OM celebrated 50 years of work and also appointed its first Asian International Director, Lawrence Tong. OM also adopted the current version of our mission statement: "We want to see vibrant communities of Jesus followers among the least reached."

By God's grace, OM now has 5,000+ workers, representing more than 100 nationalities, serving in the OM family of ministries in over 120 countries, bringing God's unchanging truth to literally millions every year.

Reaching the Muslim World has been one of OM's priorities since the 1960's and Palm West partners, with a couple on OM's Near East Team that is responsible for ministry in Lebanon, Syria, Iraq and Jordan.

"Despite the hardships some of these nations have and are facing, God has been powerfully at work and we are seeing fruit among the Muslim population that wouldn't have dreamed of it 20 years ago. The fruit amongst Syrian refugees has been particularly amazing and we pray we will seem similar in the other people groups we are working with as well. We are grateful for your prayers and partnership!" Note: Our missionaries live in a region of the world where persecution is real. Please pray for them and should you want details on their names and situation, please contact Connie Mutton, Missions Liaison.
