1.	Looking back at your notes from this week's teaching, was there anything that particularly caught your attention, challenged, or confused you?
2.	Why did the Jews who were accusing Jesus not want to go into the Praetorium where Pilate was? In what ways (given the events of this chapter) did their concern highlight their hypocrisy? In what ways can / are we as Christ-followers often guilty of hypocrisy?
3.	In verse 34, Jesus wanted to know if Pilate was asking a genuine question from his own mind/heart or if he was simply repeating what he had heard. In our present day of quick, predigested information at our fingertips, why is it important that we think through / consider a matter for ourselves and not be so quick to simply cling to and repeat what others (even others we might trust) are saying? (Read through some of the Scripture verses listed with point #5 for some Biblical input on this.)
4.	Jesus said "My kingdom is not of this world" (John 18:36). What does this mean, and what is the implication for us as Christ's followers? (See 1 Peter 2:11.) In what ways might we be more concerned and engaged with the kingdom(s) of this world than the Kingdom of God?
