Pre-Primary

Week One : Genesis 1:31; 2:8-3:24

God creates the world and puts Adam and Eve in a garden, but they do not go God's way.

In the Morning this week when you go into your child's room, say,

“Good morning! Who's ready to wake up and go God's way?”

Week Two : Jonah 1:1-3:10

Jonah learns the hard way that he should go God's way when he is swallowed by a huge fish.

As you drive or take a walk, tell your child which way you need to go in order to get where you're going. Ask your child what would happen if you went the wrong way. (You would not get where you need to go.) Talk about how God's way is perfect. That means God's way is never ever wrong. God's way will always be the best way and will get us where God wants us to go.

Week Three : 2 Kings 5:1-14

Naaman chooses to go God's way and dip in the river, even though it is hard to do.

This week as you cuddle with your child pray, “Dear God, Your way is always perfect. That means Your way will always be the right way. Help us to know what Your way is & then choose to go Your way. We love You. In Jesus' name, amen.”

Week Four : 2 Chronicles 34

King Josiah tells others to go God's way, even though he is young.

At a meal time this week, chat about how your child can maybe tell their friends about God's way. Maybe a child is being unkind to them & they can say , I am not going to be unkind to you because I follow God's way & God's way is to be kind.

Week Five : Judges 7:1-8

Gideon trusts that God's way is perfect, even though it does not make sense at the time.

At bath time this week, add a toy to the bath. Use a bath crayon to draw an arrow showing your child which way the toy can go. Wipe away the arrow & draw another one going the opposite direction. Change up the arrow a few times during bath time while your child plays with the toy, making it follow the arrow. Talk about how God tells us the right way to go, too, but it's up to us to choose to go God's way.
