SERMON SUMMARY:

In 2 Corinthians, we hear about Paul's struggle with a thorn in his side. He doesn't say what it is, but he says that it's constantly annoying and frustrating him, distracting from his work, and making his life really hard. The thorn is a metaphor, probably for a recurrent sin in Paul's life. Paul pleaded with God to take this thorn from him, but God responds by leaving the thorn where it is. God tells Paul that "grace is sufficient" and God's power is made perfect in Paul's weakness.

It's hard to imagine what that means -- how does a human weakness make God's power perfect? Isn't God's power already perfect? See, we remember Paul as a missionary. We don't even know what his thorn was, we just know that it grieved Paul. Maybe it was an addiction, or a toxic relationship or lustful thoughts. But we don't remember Paul the addict or Paul the codependent or Paul the womanizer. We remember Paul the missionary, Paul the disciple of Christ, Paul the redeemed and repentant, Paul the beloved. God's power is made perfect in Paul's weakness because God's power transformed Paul into a man of God, even as Paul struggled with his thorn. God's power is what kept the thorn from defining Paul. God's power overcame the power of that thorny sin in Paul's life.

God's power is working in our lives, too. Just like He overcame Paul's sin, He's overcoming our sin, even when we succumb to it. Our redemption is not just one and done, but ongoing in our lives. God has saved us from our own thorns and is still saving us; our struggles are perfecting God's power and His grace remains sufficient for us. And as we bask in God's grace and revel in the redemption and as we are moved to repentance, we are called to live differently than the world. Our world defines people by their failures and mistakes. Our God defines people by the content of their hearts -- the hidden things that only He knows. When we see our brothers and sisters succumbing to their thorns, we're called to remind them of their true identity as forgiven and loved children of God. When someone believes a sin is hopeless because they keep giving in over and over, we're called to remind them that the power of God is working in their struggle, turning their weakness into God's strength. Where most only see thorns, we're called to see roses.
