Forward Framework: A Weekly Devotional

Introduction Activity (for Groups):

Each person has a post-it note on their mask with the name of a well known famous person. Then each person will need to ask the group questions to help them to figure out who the famous person is on their mask

God Encounters:

Journal, Think about, or discuss with your group how you have encountered God in your life this week.

Real Talk: This is a time to be authentic, with yourself and others. Share how you're doing with God personally and pray for one another.

Sermon Summary:

The author of the book of Acts, Luke, is someone we may relate to. Luke was a doctor -- someone who studied and learned and used all that knowledge to help people. He was a Gentile -- an outsider who came to believe in Jesus through the testimony of others. Something in Luke's life prompted him to write an account of the Gospel (the book of Luke) and follow that story through to the life of the early church (the book of Acts). At some point in Luke's life, he connected with the apostle Paul and travelled with Paul for quite some time.

There's an important section in Acts Chapter 16. Up to this point, Luke has been narrating to us what's been happening: they (the church) did something. He (Paul) preached the Gospel. Other people are called to serve. In Acts 16, we see the language Luke uses change from talking about other people spreading the Gospel and being called by God to Luke himself working alongside other Christians to spread the Good News. Luke doesn't make a production of it; there's no conversion story or self-referential narrative. Luke just switches his story from the objective -- about them -- to the subjective -- about us. In the shift of a few words, with no fanfare or overt acknowledgement, we see Luke become a minister of the Gospel and a participant with, rather than observer of, the early church.

Sometimes it's so easy to sit in pews, to watch a YouTube video, to check a box, that we forget we are called to activity. We observe the work of spreading the gospel and remark on its holiness and goodness, but we refrain from participating in it. Maybe we're scared or busy or we just don't know how. Whatever the reason, we know God has called us to more. The inadvertent pastor, Luke, shows us how God has called us to participation in His kingdom. As our church continues learning about the early church and leaning into Biblical community, may we lean deeply into whatever God has called us to.

Read: Acts 16: 1-10 What stands out to you?

Discuss:

Who is the Author?

Why did paul want to circumsize Timothy?

Who WAS Luke? What did he become?

What do you think changed for Luke?

How did you know you were part of the journey instead of just observing it? If you don't think you are part of the journey, why not?
