Ann McKeel Wood May 10, 1933-October 6, 2021

A TRIBUTE TO ANN McKEEL WOOD

Ann McKeel Wood, 88, was born in Williamstown, North Carolina. Her family later moved to Whiteville, North Carolina, where she attended school. Throughout her high school years, she received many awards and honors for her involvement in organizations and clubs. She was also known as the "star" of the basketball team, scoring the most points her senior year, as they won the state championship. Ann was raised in a "fine Christian home," as she wrote in 1970 while preparing to share her personal testimony at a women's conference. However, Ann viewed church attendance only as a formality. Popularity, good job, nice car, success and social standing were most important to her. Until one day, tragedy struck her life.

At the age of 19, her father was tragically killed in a car accident. Although her father served God faithfully for many years, he became entangled with the world and drifted away from his relationship with God. It was at this point his life was cut off. Ann began to realize there was a higher purpose for her life. She started to question all that had previously meant so much to her. About four weeks after the death of her father, Ann sat in church and listened as the call was given to those who would like to dedicate their lives to the Lord. She was the first to move down the aisle and, as she penned, "At that front pew, on September 28,1952, I Ann McKeel, surrendered my stubborn will and my life to the Lord Jesus Christ."

After praying about her future plans, in October 1953, Ann enrolled in Holmes Bible College, Greenville, South Carolina. Upon completing the three years of study, she graduated as valedictorian of her class. An added bonus to her years at Holmes was meeting the love of her life, Walter Lee. Although she always said, "I'll never marry a preacher," on August 12, 1956, she did just that, as they exchanged their vows and became husband and wife. On August 12, 2021, Ann and Walter Lee celebrated 65 years of marriage. Ann served faithfully alongside her husband as pastor's wife from 1956 until he retired in 2013. She had a true servant's heart and dedicated her life to the service of the Lord. Ann worked as church office secretary for ten years, taught teenage girls' Sunday School class, coached Bible Quiz, sang in the choir, and held the position of Appalachian Conference Women's Ministry president for several years. Serving in many capacities, Ann was known for always making others feel loved and cared for. She had the gift of encouragement, and in her humble and selfless way, she made a difference in the lives of those she knew. Whether it was taking time to visit or pray for someone, sending a card, making a meal, or giving a hug, when Ann reached out to those in need, it was never forgotten.

Next to her service for the Lord was her unconditional love for her family. Her most cherished role was that of mother, grandmother, and great-grandmother, which includes her four children, eight grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren, including baby Justin who she has now joined in heaven. Ann's greatest desire was to see her family know Christ and to follow God's plan for their lives.

Proverbs 31:31 summarizes this tribute to our beloved Ann. "Honor her for all that her hands have done, and let her works bring her praise at the city gate."

She introduced me to Gerry Aldridge, who became a member of the Women's Ministries board and one of my dearest friends in the ministry. Gerry was a part of New Life congregation and was W.M. Director at her church. Ann and Gerry were great resources to the conference W.M. board.

Even after I served my term in W.M., Ann kept up with me the last twelve years. I can hear her asking me now, "Tell me what's going on in your life now, Sister Wanda." In my secular job, I called Ann several times throughout the years and would ask her to pray for me about different situations. I knew I could always depend on her encouraging words and praying God's will in my life. She was so excited when I accepted the pastorate at Good News Ministries in Staunton, Virginia. Again, so encouraging that I continue in some area of ministry.

No doubt I will miss her, but I want to have her commitment, love and passion for ministry. She totally left her mark on me to run the race and bring as many with me as possible, with Jesus saying, "Well done thou good and faithful servant."

DO YOU HAVE A HEART FOR MISSIONS?

Have you ever thought about what it would be like to be on the mission field? Did you ever think that you would be someone God could call to minister to others? Well, you can, and He did. It may not be in the sense that you will be traveling overseas or to some remote island where you will never see your family or friends again. It may not be in a far-away land. It can be right in your own town; right in your own community; right in your own back yard — your home or church.

That's the way it was for Trinity Fellowship Church in St. Albans, WV, on Saturday, October 23, 2021. Pastor Tommy L. Vass, along with the Missions Board and church members, reached out to various ministry groups with an invitation to join them for a "Meet

'n Greet" Missions Conference. This outreach included individuals from three different areas of ministry - County Missions, State Missions, and World Missions. Each group is supported solely by donations from individuals and churches. Representing County Missions was Christ's Kitchen, a local kitchen and food pantry that provides food and clothing to the needy. State Missions was represented by LEAD Academy, a drug rehab facility in Beckley, WV, that reaches out to those struggling with drug addictions. Attending for World Missions were Van and Jane Bloss, IPHC missionaries who support India. Also attending, along with his wife, was Larry Meadors, IPHC Missions Director for the Appalachian Conference.

A wonderful time of fun and fellowship was had by all, as we socialized while enjoying the many delicious finger foods that were provided by the Ladies Ministries. Each group had tables spread with articles and brochures describing their ministry. We met Wayne, who was representing Christ's Kitchen, and quickly learned how we could support their ministry with canned goods or clothing. Representing LEAD Academy were Tonia and Stacey, who had their tables spread with shirts, cups, and various other articles that were created and designed by them to raise monies to support their cause. Oh, yes! Don't forget Van and Jane Bloss, who filled the evening with joyful attitudes filled with fun and laughter.

Following a wonderful evening on Saturday, each group was invited to return on Sunday morning to present the congregation with a short presentation describing their ministry in a little more detail. Stacey, from LEAD Academy, poured out her heart as she told her story of overcoming drug addiction to becoming the director of LEAD Academy. Alan Rezek, the Overseer of Christ's Kitchen, attended the morning service and told a little more about their program. Van and Jane Bloss followed up with information about their mission and what they do for the people in India. Following their presentations, the congregation was blessed to hear a beautiful, powerful message from IPHC Missions Director Larry Meadors.

Trinity Fellowship Church is a small church with approximately 35 attendees. This church is made up of everyday people who truly have a heart for missions. Earlier this year, the church gave \$18,000 to support Van and Jane Bloss in digging 14 wells in India. Again, on this spectacular Sunday morning, as the congregation listened to the speakers, their hearts were heavy for missions as proven when the church presented each of the ministries with a grand total of more than \$11,000 to help support County Missions, State Missions, and World Missions.

DO NOT DESPISE THE DAY OF SMALL BEGINNINGS

These words brought encouragement to Zerubbabel. He desired to build the temple. Yet, he faced a mountain of obstacles. Key people opposed his efforts. Resources were needed. Hope was fading. But the Spirit of God provided power to overcome all these obstructions. And he was given the promise that he would finish the temple, and it would benefit the nation!

"For who has despised the day of small things? For they shall rejoice, and shall see the plummet in the hand of Zerubbabel with those seven; they are the eyes of the Lord, which run to and fro through the whole earth."

I felt like Zerubbabel when my family first accepted this assignment. We wanted to work with those who suffered from poverty. And we found that the people truly appreciated all we did to help. In addition, the elders of the church were people of prayer. There was no mission program when we started. There was no real outreach. The Holy Spirit stirred my heart to begin to invest in missions. A Miracle of Missions could surely come to us!

START OF MISSION GIVING - We voted as a church to support one key missionary who was laboring with great success. So, each month, an offering for missions was received. It seemed like a "day of small beginnings." But in a few years, we would experience the Miracle of Missions.

CALL FROM THE CONFERENCE - Larry Meadors called me and said that our church, as well as a few other churches in poverty regions, were being considered by Hickory Grove IPHC in Bonneau, South Carolina. Dawn and Brad Morris are leaders of the church's missions work team. This year they could not go to foreign countries because of Covid-19.

I prayed that we would have favor. And the day came when Big 4 Church was indeed chosen. The insurance company for the church had decided to cancel the policy for Big Four P.H. because of needed repairs. However, when the company was informed about the missions work team, they reinstated the policy!

Kenny and I met this couple a few months before they came to the church. They wanted to look at the church and the region. They liked the church, and they liked West Virginia! They would come and provide finances for the repairs. Ten thousand dollars was what they offered, along with a team of hard-working, talented people.

THEY CAME - A picture is worth a thousand words. The pictures below show the team and many of the improvements. They worked long hours to repair the church. It was like a TV show that features restoration of old houses! They were always smiling. And they performed the Sunday service. It was a powerful service, and all were refreshed!

LOOK AT WHAT THEY DID

The basement floors were badly damaged from two major floods. They repaired and replaced the floors and painted the walls. A new sink, stove, and storm door were installed, along with new tables and chairs.

The women's bathroom was severely damaged due to termites and water damage. I did not think it could be saved. Yet, they replaced the flooring, wall studs, vanity and toilet, and dry-walled the entire bathroom and made it look brand new! The men's bathroom was also restored.



Vinyl siding was installed on the south end of the church, replacing damaged, outdated siding. Beautiful stained glass window film was installed on the sanctuary windows, and the church was thoroughly cleaned, upstairs and down.

The church members were so excited and thankful! We had a "Renovation Celebration" on October 24 to thank and recognize Hickory Grove IPHC for their sacrifices of time and finances.

WHAT ABOUT YOU?

Indeed, this was a Miracle of Missions. Big things can happen for your church also. Just start by planting seeds of financial offerings each month to missions!

COME WITH CONFIDENCE

I John 5:14,15

"And this is the confidence that we have in him, that, if we ask anything according to his will, he hears us. And if we know that he hear us, whatsoever we ask, we know that we have the petitions that we desired of him."

CONFIDENCE
