Seize this opportunity

The second Sunday of October is a significant day in the life of a church. It is the opportunity to express heartfelt appreciation and gratitude to the pastor and his family. The pastor is called upon many times to be involved in the lives of people, both inside his congregation and community, often putting aside his own life in serving the needs of others.

I think we all understand pastoring is emotionally, spiritually, even physically, stressful, but over this past year it has been with increased intensity. In a recent seminar with Sam Chand, he quoted Lifeway Resource, saying that over the next 5 to 8 years, 480,000 ministers will leave the pulpit due to the impact from Covid fatigue. Therefore, I think special attention should be given this year to setting aside a time to give honor to those the Bible says honor is due. *"Let the elders who rule well be counted worthy of double honor, especially those who labor in the word and doctrine"* (1 Timothy 5:17 NKJV).

While acknowledging pastoring the people of God is hard work, it is a high calling for a reason. With all the negative stats we're hearing of people leaving the ministry, and understanding that leading the local church does take a toll, research done by Ed Stetzer and Chris Martin concludes most pastors feel rewarded in their work and love their jobs. Nearly 8 out of 10 pastors disagree with the statement that, "being in ministry has had a negative effect on my family."

I have included an article written by Bishop Tommy McGhee, from October of 2017, reminding us of the significance of the role of pastor and ways you can help your pastor.

Pastor Appreciation Day

Paul encouraged Timothy to “make full proof” of his ministry in II Timothy 4:5 KJV. With these words, this young minister was challenged to demonstrate the true characteristics of a person and pastor who is called by God, obedient and faithful to God. A pastor’s role is about being and doing. Pastors who fulfill the biblical role, as demonstrated by our Lord and instructed by the Apostle Paul, should be acknowledged and honored by the church. Scripture admonishes us to know those who labor among us and to honor them. 1 Thessalonians 5:12 NIV says, *“Now we ask you, brothers and sisters, to acknowledge those who work hard among you, who care for you in the Lord and who admonish you. Hold them in the highest regard in love because of their work.”* II Timothy 5:17 NIV says, *“The elders who direct the affairs of the church well are worthy of double honor, especially those whose work is preaching and teaching.”* As we approach “Pastor Appreciation Day,” I want you to consider the following acrostic for PASTOR.

P - **Preacher** - The preacher is to “**Exalt the Savior.**” Jesus said when we lift Him up, He will draw all men unto Him. Preaching is not about us, but about Him. He has been exalted and given a name that is above every name.

A - **Administrator** - An administrator has the responsibility to “**Establish the Structure.**” Paul told Titus, “The reason I left you in Crete was that you might put in order what was left unfinished.” A faithful pastor seeks to create a biblical structure so the church can stay on mission and to be obedient to our Lord.

S - **Shepherd** - The Shepherd should “**Encourage the Sheep.**” A loving shepherd will be faithful to feed and lead, to guard and guide the sheep under his care.

T - **Teacher** - As a Teacher, the pastor must “**Equip the Saints.**” Ephesians 4 challenges the pastors and teachers to “equip his people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up.”

O - **Overseer** - The Overseer must diligently and continually “**Examine the Spirits.**” Paul warned Timothy that in later times there would be “deceiving spirits” I Timothy 4:1 NIV. John the beloved also reminded the church to “not believe every spirit, but test the spirits to see whether they are from God, because many false prophets have gone out into the world.”

R - **Restorer** - The Restorer should “**Extend the Staff.**” Pastors are always looking for lost sheep. In Luke 15, Jesus shares how the shepherd is not satisfied to have most of the sheep at the end of the day. A faithful shepherd is like his master who came to seek and to save the lost. Our Shepherd loves His sheep and wants us to find them. The Shepherd/Pastor goes out into the night to rescue and restore those who have wandered away from the fold.

The work and burdens of these servants of God have never been greater. One of the greatest needs of pastors is for people who will join with him or her in the work of the ministry.

Hopefully, you are asking what you can do to help your pastor. Below are just a few ideas that would mean so much to your spiritual leader.

- **Pray for your pastor and family.** There is no doubt that ministers are the target of satanic attack.
- **Examine your expectations.** Far too often, people expect pastors to be everywhere and do everything for everyone. Let's make sure we are realistic in what we expect.
- **Find your place in ministry.** Many churches are suffering from the lack of willing persons to help lead in ministry. A church full of needy, immature Christians is a "field to work in" but a church with leaders who are equipped for ministry is a "force to work with."
- **Be the Christian you should be.** Keep growing in the Lord and maintain a consistent life and witness. It is always encouraging for a pastor to hear of the godly character of the people under his care.

Pastor Appreciation Day is simply a day set apart to give special honor to whom honor is due. Godly men and women who serve the Lord and His people in this special and sacred role are due to be honored. However, remember that every day is a good day to encourage and appreciate your pastor!

The American Spiritual Crisis

Only 31% of Americans attend church on a weekly basis (Pew Research Center 2019). This is down from 77% in 1937, when Gallop did the first survey.

Approximately 3,000 churches are closing a year. When population growth is used as the benchmark, 10,000 new churches are now needed to reach a sizable portion of the population.

George Barna, the researcher, declares that on more than 100 measurements, there is no appreciable difference in the values and behavior of so called Christians and non-believers, (The New Apostolic Epoch Doug Small).

Only 3 to 5% of Christians are in a "kingdom building" mode, according to Lyle Schaller.

The good news in all of this is that Jesus Christ is Lord over His church and His promise is that He will build His church. (Matthew 16:18) What is our role? These are defining times for us as believers. Our first priority is to draw near to God in personal repentance and devotion. Daily intercede for our nation's spiritual restoration and walk out your faith in personal evangelism. As a community of faith, we are called to these 5 action points:

- To **PRAY** for church planters and mother churches to be called to the harvest.
- To **GIVE** finances and church plant teams for the harvest.
- To **TRAIN** church planters to receive the harvest.
- To **PLANT** churches in the cities and counties in our conference region that do not have an IPHC congregation.
- To **SEND** finances and missionaries to reach new nations with the gospel.

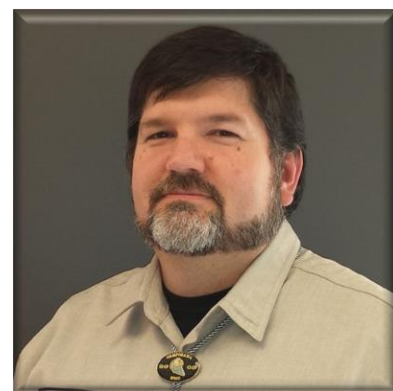
instrumental in helping Royal Rangers expand into Boys' Ministries.

BLESS YOUR HOUSE IN THE HEBREW YEAR 5782

Leviticus 23

Most people mark their calendars with important dates and appointments. However, we tend to forget about God's calendar. God's calendar should be the most important calendar for us to observe. After all, it was God who appointed these feast days!

"Speak unto the children of Israel, and say unto them, concerning the feasts of the Lord, which you shall proclaim to be holy convocations, even these are MY FEASTS" (Leviticus 23:2).

A NEW START FOR A NEW YEAR

Rosh Hashanah, which is the Jewish New Year, occurred during September 6 -8, 2021. We are encouraged to enter the year with repentant hearts, which allow us to be in right standing with God. This is the Jewish year 5782, and each letter has a significant meaning. Explanations begin with the 80's. We are in the decade of the PEY, 5780 -5789. In Hebrew language, PEY means "mouth."

Two lessons are suggested for this year.

- *Learn when to speak and when to stay silent. Silence is a powerful means of communication!
- *Use our mouths to speak 2 keys blessings over our houses this year!
- *REST, because it is also a Shemitah year! (Exodus 23:10, 11)
- *HEALING OVER our households.

NOW THE NUMBER 2

PEY, which refers to mouth, is used in Hebrew to describe the decade of the 80's. Now look at the number 2. The number 2 in Hebrew is the letter BET. This Hebrew letter symbolizes a HOUSE.

BUILD YOUR HOUSE ON THE ROCK

"Therefore whosoever hears these sayings of mine, and does them, I will liken him unto a wise man, which built his house upon a rock" (Matthew 7:24-29).

If we build our house upon the rock, instead of the sand, it will stand firm during intense storms!

As you pray over your house, you are building a firm foundation!

EXCEPT THE LORD BUILD THE HOUSE

“Except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it; except the Lord keep the city, the watchman wakes but in vain” (Psalm 127:1).

Invite The Lord into your life and into your house. Ask Him to help strengthen your house this year, and bring healing.

RAPHA – THE GOD WHO HEALS

Each Hebrew letter has a corresponding picture to convey a meaning.

The first letter of rapha is RESH. The picture associated with resh is HEAD.

The letter in the middle is PEY. MOUTH is the picture of this word.

The last letter is ALEPH. A sacrificial ox is the picture for this word.

Putting it all together, the meaning is clear and so encouraging!

“The more we meditate and talk about the sacrifice of Jesus Christ on the cross, the more we will invite His health into our households!” (Isaiah 53:4)
