Please join in singing the refrain of hymn # 244 during the message. The oldest Christmas carol written in North America is believed to be 'Twas in the Moon of Wintertime. Jesuit missionary Jean de Brebeuf wrote the carol, somewhere around 1643, while at Sainte-Marie among the Hurons. He wrote the carol for early Catholic converts within the Huron Confederacy to explain the Christmas story with characters they could better understand. In 1926, J. E. Middleton translated the hymn into English, which is based on the music of the French-Canadian melody Jesous Ahatonhia.

As we sing in the dim light of Christmas Eve, the retelling of the Christmas story brings hope and healing to those who struggle with the darkness of grief. There are so many memories and strong feelings surrounding our celebration of Christmas, it is important to allow people to express grief at this time of year. Lighting candles in the darkness is a powerful symbol of the power of faith, hope and love to call us out of the darkness and into his wonderful light.
