#### **Are You Ready to Serve Survivors of Distaster?**

Brian Wagner doesn't just talk "disaster response," he's lived it, not only for himself but for his wife and his two then-elementary age children. They lived for just over a year in McDowell County, W. Va., which is one of the poorest counties in the United States, has the highest drug addiction and overdose rates in West Virginia, and has the highest levels of poverty in the state.



His focus was and continues to be on building relationships and connections with the West Virginia residents for Brian Wagner Hope Force Interna-

tional. But Hope Force's mission is much, bigger -- to deploy its 2,500 trained reservists from around the country and world to disaster areas within 24-48 hours.

Brian does that too. He is part of the nonprofit organization's assessment team, so he is first on the ground at disasters.

He has recently returned to his Edmond home from Hurricane Delta-ravaged Lake Charles, La., which had been hit by Hurricane Laura less than two months previous. In Laura, they tarped roofs for 115

"Every tarp was hit by 100 mph winds in Delta, and our tarps after Laura all stayed on. We provide what's going to last," he said. Providing "what lasts" is larger than material help. They provide the love of Jesus.

That's one reason why Hope Force International is our church's newest mission partner -- to bring Christ to the World. The church has committed 5 percent of its mission budget to the ministry: \$6000 in 2020 and \$14,000 in 2021.

But it's not just a financial partneship. Brian will be working with FPCE to form and train several "Reservist" emergency response teams. He will be working with our staff to organize summer mission opportunities for families and students to West Virginia and has offered his services to preach occasionally from our pulpit.

He has served Hope Force since 2009, as a trained Reservist and a staff member. No one involved in Hope Force is paid. All raise their own support.

"The majority of our Reservists areretired. Because Hope Force is very intentional about coming alongside with hope, our primary pathway in is to come along side and grieve beside the victims," he said. "Anyone who is breathing can show the love of Jesus. Some Reservists can only pick up a little trash, but all of them can enter into a life of someone who has experienced disaster and reveal to them the love of Jesus, by simply sitting with someone had having coffee and a conversation."

The two-and-a-half-day Reservist training focuses on the grief and trauma cycle, personal wholeness, and healthy team dynamics. (www.hopeforce.org). Hope Force's approach is to bring compassion in action.

"A natural disaster causes you to lose your breath, as in trauma and grief. We provide emotional and spiritual care, in flood events, mucking out a house of mud and mold, or in wind events, tarping. FEMA actually uses us as an example. Our hope is to help people 'catch their breath again."

Due to its small size and its abilityto mobilize quickly, Hope Force can provide "intel" and relationships on the ground when the larger organizations, such as 15-year partners Salvation Army and Samaritan's Purse, come on the scene.

Hope Force International has stay-

ing power. In 1993, Hope Force was founded by Jack and Cherie Minton, with Jack stepping out from Executive Director of Operations for Mercy Ships, a massive organization which sends hospital ships filled with volunteer professionals who provide surgeries to people in need. Jack and Cherie remain at the helm of the organization.

Brian has a long relationship with our church. Twenty years ago he was hired as our Middle Director before heading off to seminary. Ten years ago, he was recruited back to be our Director of Emerging Generations and Community Response, which he served for five years. He served as Family Life Pastor from 2016-2020 in Connecticut.

In January, he made the leap to fulltime with Hope Force, moving back to centrally located Edmond, where he can serve in a moment's notice the Plains states region - tornado alley. This is in addition to his role as director of Hope Force West Virginia.

Through his West Virginia connections, he can bring in teams during the summer. The volunteers weatherize homes so they remain stay dry and safe as the majority of homes are jeopardized because of lack of care and systemic poverty. In the summers, from his former McDowell County home, he is able to connect the larger service organizations to the area "to help them fall in love with the people and county as we have."

"For me, in disaster relief, you really see the presence of God at work. The reason I engaged with it in West Virginia and here is you see God at work in the midst of heartache. My goal is to get as close to Him in the midst of that and be used by Him for His glory. I view myself as an instrument in the Redeemer's hand. I am willing to follow God into the mess to be used by Him to serve others."
