Life and Trails

Any off-road trip is cool, but the ones that give the most satisfaction and offer the most reward are the ones where you sweat, bleed, give things up, and continue to push on because of a promised reward you can't experience here at the trail head. It takes listening to

experienced drivers, reading manuals and maps, preparing your vehicle, learning what are good anchor points, and ultimately who goes on the trip with you.

This is also how it is living life. You must go find more experienced men and women who have gone the distance and sometimes traveled many trails in life. There are things to be learned from people who are on completely different trails than you plan to travel. Learning about Jesus, how He works, and who He is. These are all things that you can find out through ultimately reading the Bible (the "Jesus Manual") where He describes who He is, what the end of the trail holds for you when you get there, and what to expect along the way. Don't stray away even when the grass is greener and seems easier; it is always harder to get back to the trail after leaving it. After you have fought through the harder parts of the trail, made repairs, received some dents, and scratched up the truck you've been given, you're not going to give up now because some of the most glorious stories are the ones where the most broken and battered trucks make it to the end of the trail limping into view, but they made it.

Who is in your truck matters—it matters a lot. Like you're not comprehending how much it matters on a trail that is worth traveling. When you're bogged down in a foggy, cold, wet, miserable valley surrounded by negative options and you don't know what the next step is, the last thing you need is someone bragging about how "when they had this happen, they did it this way." You want someone who is reading the map, knows the manual, looks at the next part of the trail and asks, "is this the right way?," confirming you have previously looked at the map and considered experienced opinions. Someone who prays to Jesus that He will bless this trail and keep you both safe. That is an invaluable asset to your life because they will point out things on the map to watch out for that you never saw. They have different gifts and abilities, and sometimes they might have a louder Holy Spirit that they listen to saying, "wrong trail!

They make hard times and hopeless times better because, while you're freaking out, they are reading the Manual, looking at the map, looking at where you've been, getting advice from the driver of the passing King of Hammer truck (someone like Josh Mcpherson), and coming back to you and showing you where to go and what the next turn is and how fast you can "be back at it." Why I Believe The Bible

There are many different reasons as to why people don't believe the Bible, but truthfully, I think all their issues with Christianity, the Bible, and ultimately God, all come down to one central concept: "Why do bad things happen to good people?"

At least in my life, I have heard this question asked extensively, and it is a concept with which I have struggled with as well. Although it has been a persistent issue for me in the past, it is an issue that I have overcome by the way of God's revelation; and through that revelation, I have found that the answer to this question is a genuinely good reason to trust the Bible.

Most of the conversations I've had and heard regarding this topic start off the same way, but separate further on into two distinct conversations. One with the more philosophical person, and one with the more science-oriented person.

To start off with both, let's return to the question at hand: "Why do bad things happen to good people?" At first, this question can seem like an advantageous argument against the morality of God, but it is very much not so.

I reply with: "Well yes, bad things do happen, but you're making the assumption that people are good. The Bible says: 'for all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God' (Romans 3:23), so I don't think any of us are really worthy of being considered good."

"Yeah we all make mistakes, but that doesn't mean we're bad. I'm sure lots of people's good deeds outweigh their bad deeds."

"Not quite. As the prophet Isaiah stated: "We have all become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous deeds are like a polluted garment" (Isaiah 64:6). The Bible is pretty explicit about no man being righteous. I think the question you asked needs to be rephrased. If we're all bad then 'why do good things happen to bad people?' Have you ever had anything good happen in your life?"

"Well yeah, of course I've experienced good things in my life."

"Exactly. I don't think I've ever met anyone or heard of someone who has never experienced something good. Even the absence of negative circumstances can be viewed as good, turning the dull moments in life into something adequate; and if all mankind is incapable of doing good, why do you, as a sinful being, receive anything good in this life?

The only reliable answer to this is God's grace and mercy."

Now that all sounds good and everything, but none of any of this matters if God doesn't exist, because without God, the Bible is void of any meaning. This is also where the

two types of conversations diverge, so I will start with the philosophical conversation before the scientific.

"You're only using the Bible to explain your views. I don't believe in the Bible, so all your reasoning is pointless to me. Why should I believe in God?"

"Alright. Well earlier you asked the question: 'Why do bad things happen to good people?' When you ask me that question you are indicating that you believe an objective, universal, moral standard exists. The only way universal morals can exist is if one individual is the standard. So the person asking the question either simply doesn't want to admit to themselves that a higher power exists, or they're just a narcissist who thinks they are that standard. Are you a narcissist?"

"I could be."

"Have you ever made a mistake?"

"Well, yeah. Like I said, everyone makes mistakes."

"Very true. Not to be rude in any way, but if you are that standard, then you're a pretty terrible one because you've made mistakes; and for one to believe that they are the moral standard means that morality only exists within their lifespan. Not before they were born or after they die which is absurd and based on nothing but their self-centeredness, and

ironically self-centeredness is societally considered to be non virtuous, but you don't look like someone who would claim that responsibility."

"Yeah no, I am definitely not the moral standard."

"So then the standard must be a perfect being right?"

"I guess."

"Well since everyone makes mistakes, then no human being is capable of being that perfect standard; and since the animal kingdom is extremely inconsistent with how animals act, I don't think animals are the standard either. To me, some form of God seems like the only reasonable conclusion."

This argument might convince some, but the more scientifically inclined may not be so easily swayed by it. So to appease them let's switch over to the more "scientific" argument.

"You're only using the Bible to explain your views. I don't believe in the Bible, so all your reasoning is pointless to me. Why should I believe in God?"

"I mean you've probably heard this argument used a dozen times already, but I think the 2nd Law of Thermodynamics is a good reason to believe in a god. The universe is becoming increasingly more chaotic, which goes directly against the theory of evolution."

"That's not how Thermodynamics work. It only applies to a closed system. I bet you don't even know the other 3 Laws of Thermodynamics."

"Whether or not they are factual does not depend on my knowledge of them. So if the universe isn't a closed system then that means that the universe is infinite."

"Well I guess it has to be."

"Alright, so then that means you've got 4 possible conclusions to make about the beginning of the universe - (1) the Big Bang was a finite amount of gasses and material that spawned an infinite universe, (2) the Big Bang was an limitless amount of gasses that created an infinite universe, (3) the universe itself is infinite and has simply always existed, or (4) there is a higher power."

"Well I don't believe in a higher power so number 4 is out of the question. I don't think the universe has existed forever because there's no good evidence to support that, so that's also out of the question. I guess I'll have to go with one of the first two then, the two involving the Big Bang, but I don't know which one I'd choose over the other."

"Well personally I think the first two options are honestly just absurd. Specifically when the matter of an infinite universe is brought into the equation. The infinite universe coming from a non-infinite gas is very hard to believe, and an infinite mass of gas just always existing is even harder for me to believe. Do you really believe that an infinite cloud of gasses that has always existed is more plausible than an infinite and intelligent being?"

"Yeah I see what you're saying; and truthfully, I don't know the answer."

"Fair enough. As you said a second ago, the third option of the universe being infinite doesn't seem likely, and I agree. Although I do think it is the most reasonable of the atheist views; at least in my opinion. Scientifically, if matter cannot be destroyed, it's reasonable to follow that it cannot be truly created either; but as you said, this theory is still completely based on zero evidence, and as with the Big Bang theory, it really seems more faith based than science based because it cannot be observed. Honestly I can't see a reasonable way to explain the question of creation without a higher power, so I must conclude that a higher power exists."

These discussions have never outright convinced people that they're wrong or converted people to Christianity on the spot, but it does make them think. Whether or not my discussions with people ever changed someone's mind is unknown, but having these discussions with people is all we can really do.

So to finalize, the only way for this bizarre yet oddly organized world to make any sense is if a perfect God exists; and if a perfect God exists, then His word to us must also be perfect and truthful. That is why I believe the Bible.
