

Return to the LORD your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love; and he relents over disaster." Joel 2:12—13 (ESV)

#### What will you give up for Lent this year?



Lent begins on Ash Wednesday. This year, it falls on March 2nd.

On this day, many Christians have their pastors or priests place a sign of the cross on their foreheads with ashes. The words used traditionally to accompany this gesture are "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return" (based on Genesis 3:19) or "Repent and believe in the Gospel" (based on Mark 1:15).

In case you ever wondered, the ashes are usually prepared by burning palm leaves from the previous year's Palm Sunday celebrations.

When observing Lent, many would decide what they will be giving up. Some will pick a habit, food, or hobby that they enjoy enough, and it will be significantly

missed throughout the period of Lent.

Before we talk about what you will be giving up for Lent this year, let's think about why we observe Lent in the first place?

"Early in the Church's history, the major events in Christ's life were observed with special observances, such as His birth, baptism, death, resurrection and ascension.

As these observances developed, a period of time was set aside prior to the major events of Jesus' birth and resurrection as a time of preparation.

During Lent, the Church's worship assumes a more penitential character. The color for the season is purple, a color often associated with penitence."

"The word 'Alleluia' is usually omitted. By not using the alleluia — a joyful expression meaning 'Praise the Lord' — until Easter, the Lenten season is clearly set apart as a distinct time from the rest of the year." (Quoted from LCMS Website)

With this understanding of Lent, let us then think about what you will give up for Lent, or is it okay not to give up anything for the season?

St. Paul says in Colossians 2:16 –17, "Therefore let no one pass judgment on you in questions of food and drink, or with regard to a festival or a new moon or a Sabbath. These are a shadow of the things to come, but the substance belongs to Christ."

"Giving something up for Lent" is entirely a matter of Christian freedom. It would be wrong for the church to make some sort of "law" requiring its members to "give something up for Lent," since the Scriptures themselves do not require this.

On the other hand, if a brother or sister in Christ wants to give something up for Lent as a way of remembering and personalizing the great sacrifice that Christ made on the cross for our sins, then that Christian is certainly free to do so — as long as he or she does not

"judge" or "look down on" other Christians who do not choose to do this.



In other words, the

purpose of giving something up is not to make yourself feel better, or more spiritual than others. It is to make a substantial shift in your typical day-to-day. Then, the yearning for what has been given up works as a reminder to turn to God and recognize how He truly meets all needs.

If you do choose to give up something for Lent, whether it is chocolates, soda, TV time, or even coffee, make sure you replace them with something that will draw you closer to God. Spending more time with God, like praying and studying the Word of God, would be excellent substitutes.

Applying what St. Paul said in Colossians 2:17 to what we are talking here: Giving something up for Lent is "a shadow of the things to come, but the substance belongs to Christ."

#### Prayer:

Dear heavenly Father, through Baptism You have made us Your own children. During this Lenten time, cleanse our hearts that we might be truly sorry for our sinful nature. Send Your Spirit to us that we may learn of Your intent for our lives. Make us more generous in our showing of Your love to others. For the sake of our dear Savior we ask these things. Amen.



The finality of death is gone when one remembers the promise of eternal life through Christ. St. Paul reassures the persecuted church in Thessalonica with these

words: "For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have fallen asleep. For this we declare to you by a word from the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will not precede those who have fallen asleep... Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord

in the air, and so we will always be with the Lord (1 Thessalonians 4:14-15,17)." There is such comfort In short and, perhaps, better in those words! remembered is when Jesus states "I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live, and everyone who lives and believes in me shall never die (John 11:25 -26)."

Our time on earth may seem long and hard, but as we continue to grow in our faith, we can continually be comforted by God's Word. The church year cycles again and again and each year things change. Death can



make this change, but also new life, transitions, and relationships can create change in one's life. The church year remains the same, although you may learn new things in it as you grow.

This March we walk into the time of the church year called Lent. This forty-day period is about our need to be saved from our sins and its consequence (Romans 6:23). Sin creates a separation from God. Without a Savior, death becomes final. It's a somber time of reflection of what God has done for us, by giving up His Son for us (John 3:16). As we remain in this life, through its joys and hardships we can remember what Paul wrote to the church in Philippi: "But our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we await a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ, who will transform our lowly body to be like his glorious body (Philippians 3:20)."
