We desire to be a church family that lives *On Mission*. As we have studied this quarter in the Wednesday night seminar, living *On Mission* includes both dedicated study and intentionally sharing the Gospel with others. Our sincere desire is that this guide will help you grow in your personal relationship with the Lord, increase your understanding of the Word, and help you confidently share the Gospel with others.

This 8-week booklet includes the following:

primary types of Psalms. The reading plan is listed on the first page of the guide, and the weekly readings are on the first page of each week's activities.

Memory Work: Having the Word in our hearts is important to God. This is the motivation for our weekly memory verse. Each week there is a verse to write on your heart for the Lord.

Daily Reflection Questions: These questions are intended to enrich each day's reading. After you finish the selected passage, consider the 3 questions to help you reflect on that day's reading. There is a space in the guide for you to record your thoughts.

Personal Bible Study: The personal Bible allows for further consideration of the scripture. This portion of the guide is designed to help deepen your understanding and make a personal application of the text.

Family Discussion Guide: Bible reading plans aren't only for adults. Reading with your children helps them develop a love for God and to value His word. These questions will help you start conversations that help your children apply spiritual principles to their young lives.

Spiritual Development Activities: These exercises will help you put into practice the principles from each week's readings.

Inviting someone to participate in this summer's reading plan is an accessible way to begin sharing the Gospel with others. The guide contains questions about the readings to help you enter into spiritual conversations. There is a place in the guide for you to make notes about your conversations.

Questions to discuss:

- Did you read anything this week that was familiar? What? Where had you come across it before?
- What part of this week's reading was most meaningful to you? Why? Did anything speak directly to some part of your life right now?
- Did anything from the reading encourage, inspire, challenge, or convict you? Which verses or passages? What have they motivated you to do or consider?
- Did you see yourself in any of these Psalms? Can you identify with the speaker? How?
- What did you learn about God from this week's readings?
- Of all of the things God did include in scripture and could have included in scripture, why this? What do you think He wants us to learn from these passages?
- Are there spiritual truths in these passages that contradict the message the world wants people to believe? What? Which message – scripture or secular – is easier for you to accept?
- What is the benefit of applying the spiritual principles of these passages to our lives?

When it comes to studying the Book of Psalms there are many approaches and those approaches vary widely. The same is true when it comes to dividing the Psalms into categories or types. Truly, there are as many ways to divide and classify the Psalms as there are people to divide and classify them. Regardless of how the Psalms are classified or divided, each is an outpouring of emotion to the Lord.

We have chosen to study the Psalms in 7 categories that many scholars generally agree on. For week 8, we have selected Psalms that no study of the book could ignore. Each type is unique in the way the authors pour out their hearts to the Lord, and each type has something to teach 21st century disciples. The following is a brief description of the types of Psalms we'll read over the next 40 days:

Week 1: Psalms of Praise

Psalms of Praise seek to magnify God's name. They primarily express admiration for His virtues and character.

Week 2: Psalms of Lament

Psalms of Lament are cries for help and deliverance in times of despair. These can be communal and ask for deliverance for Israel as a group or individual.

Week 3: Psalms of Thanksgiving

Psalms of Thanksgiving express gratitude for the things God has done and provided.

Week 4: Psalms of Imprecation

Imprecatory Psalms ask God to judge the enemies of His people and often ask God to pour out His vengeance on them. These Psalms are appeals to God's divine wrath.

Week 5: Psalms of Wisdom

Psalms of Wisdom contain practical advice for righteous living, and instructions for living in God's will.

Week 6: Psalms of Enthronement

Psalms of Enthronement and Royalty celebrate God as the sovereign ruler over all creation. Often, God's provision and mercy are the subject.

Week 7: Psalms of Ascent

The Psalms of Ascent were songs sung by Jews as they travelled to Jerusalem for feasts and festivals. These songs praise God for His continuous faithfulness and goodness.

Week 8: Psalms We Love

These are the Psalms we know by heart. They give us comfort and provide the anchors for our soul. These are some of the most accessible portions of scripture.

Week 1: Psalms of Praise Personal Bible Study

Day 1: Psalm 8

Research the difference between the Hebrew words *LORD* and *Lord* used in verse 1. How are these words distinct? How does the unique meaning of each word deepen the meaning?

Day 2: Psalm 6

David opens this Psalm stating *praise awaits* God. What does David's awaiting praise reveal about his attitude toward God? What does this reveal about how David views his circumstances? Read 1Thessalonians 5:18. In what ways does this scripture call modern disciples to adopt David's attitude?

Day 3: Psalm 98

Psalm 98 begins with the call to sing a new song to the Lord. What *old song* have you been singing? What does your *old song* focus on? How can focusing on praise and thanksgiving to God help you sing a *new song*?

Day 4: Psalm 145

Notice David's *I will* statements and action verbs in verses 1-7. What 6 things is David resolved to do? What do these statements teach us about David's priorities, commitment to worship, and desire to make God known to others? What *I will* statements define your spiritual commitment? What action verbs describe your spiritual life? How can 21st century believers adopt David's resolute determination and implement it in a practical way?

Day 5: Psalm 150

The word *praise* is used 13 times in these 6 verses, and each time is the Hebrew word *hallu*. Of the 6 Hebrew words translated praise in English, *hallu* conveys the idea of *boastful shouting*. What does verse 2 tell us to *boastfully shout* about? How can you *boastfully shout* about God's power and greatness in your personal life? Who should you *boastfully shout* your praises to, and why is it important?

What does praise mean? Why do people receive praise? Why does God deserve to be praise?

Day 2: Psalm 65

What can you praise God for? What good things can you see that God has made and God has done?

Day 6: Psalm 3

David wrote this Psalm in the middle of a crisis, but he doesn't believe he is defeated. Why not? When you face a crisis, can you share David's confidence? Why or why not? How did Jesus' work on the cross and in the tomb ensure you the same confidence David had? Read Hebrews 2:14-15 and Revelation 20:10.

Day 7: Psalm 13

What is David really asking when he cries out *How long*? In the absence of a divine response on *our time*, what do most people usually do in a crisis? Read 1 Peter 5:7. What is one reason God *does not* want us to handle problems on our own? What is the connection between faith, patience, and casting our anxiety on God?

Day 8: Psalm 55

David is hurt because of a friend's betrayal. What does David's honesty to God reveal about his relationship with the Lord? Are you as honest with God about your feelings? What does this Psalm teach about the kinds of problems we can take to God? Read Hebrews 2:16-17. Why should Jesus followers feel an even greater freedom to share our pain with God?

Day 9: Psalm 130

What is the writer *lamenting* in this Psalm? Does sin cause you to *lament*? Why would God's ability and willingness to forgive inspire fear? Read 1 Peter 1: 17-21. How does Peter connect God's forgiveness with hope and fear?

Day 10: Psalm 142

David wrote this Psalm while hiding from Saul. While David's words are literally true, they are spiritually true for us. How? How does David's honesty before the Lord inspire his faith and reassure him of God's faithfulness? What does David's honesty teach us?

Day 6: The Invocation or Address to God

An invocation is purposely asking God to be present. Psalms of Lament often begin with a cry to the Lord. This invites God close to listen to your heart. Where do you see *invocation* in Psalm 3?

Day 7: The Lament or Problem

The lament is the problem causing the speaker trouble or upset. In the Lament, the speaker talks to God about his problem. What is the lament in Psalm 13?

Day 8: The Request for Help from the Lord

After telling God the problem, the speaker will request the Lord's help solving it. This shows faith in God. What does the speaker ask God to do in Psalm 55?

Day 9: The Expression of Trust in the Lord

After the speaker has asked for help, he often expresses confidence that God will intervene. This is another way of showing faith. What verses contain expressions of trust in Psalm 130?

Day 10: Declaration of Praise

Psalms of Lament often end with the writer praising God for all that He has been, all He is, and all He will be in the future. Where is the declaration of praise is Psalm 142?

Week 2: Psalms of Lament Spiritual Growth Activity

Reflect on what you have learned reading the Psalms of Lament. Has this study encouraged you to open your heart to God in new or more complete ways?

Is there a situation or idea that is causing you grief, pain, anxiety, or one you feel is beyond your control? *1 Peter 5:7* gives God's children permission to unburden ourselves by coming to Him and expressing our distress. God wants to be present in our pain.

Try a writing a Psalm of Lament. Including all 5 elements: the invocation, lament, request, expression of trust, and praise.

Community Conversation Notes:

Day 11: Psalm 30

Psalm 30 was traditionally sung on the Feast of First Fruits. This is the day Christ was resurrected from the dead. Read Psalm 30 in light of this observation. What stands out to you? Why is this a special Psalm of Thanksgiving?

Day 12: Psalm 95

This Psalm centers on worship. How are verses 1-5 similar to verses 6-7. How are they different? How is our worship lacking if we approach worship with only one of these attitudes?

Day 13: Psalm 100

Reflect on verse 3. To what degree do you live like you belong to God and not to yourself? It's not until Jesus finishes His work that we know the cost of becoming His: 1 Corinthians 7:23. To what extend does your lack of thankfulness for the price Jesus paid influence your perspective that you can live for yourself?

Day 14: Psalm 107

Consider verses 4, 10, 17, and 23. What kinds of trouble were these groups of people in? Consider verses 6, 13, 19, and 28. What was God's response to each group? According to verses 8, 15, 21, and 31, how should these groups of people respond to God's deliverance? What has God redeemed you from? What wonderful deeds has God done for you? How should you respond?

Day 15: Psalm 136

For this Psalmist, everything that God has done is a display of His enduring love. How is the cross the ultimate display of God's enduring love? Do you fully believe that God's love endures forever—for you personally? How would your life change in a practical way if you fully believed this truth about God?

Day 11: Psalm 30

David had some difficulties in his life. Every time David asked God for help, God always did. Why is it important to thank God for His help? What has God helped you do? What can you ask God to help you with in the future?

Day 12: Psalm 95

How does God want us to sing to Him? Why is it important to sing with joy? Does singing with joy mean we can only sing happy songs?

Day 13: Psalm 100

At the temple, the gate opened onto the court, the court was the first place people entered, and anyone could come into the temple court. What attitude does God want us to come to Him with if we are enter His gates with thanksgiving and His courts with praise?

Day 14: Psalm 107

This writer says give *thanks to the Lord for He is good*. What good things does this writer mention? What good things has God done for you?

Day 15: Psalm 136

What is the number 1 reason to give thanks to God? How did God show His great love us? See Romans 5:8.

Week 3: Psalms of Thanksgiving Spiritual Formation Activity

Each day this week, reflect on the following questions:

- What has God provided for me physically?
- What has God provided for me materially?
- What has God provided for me spiritually?
- What has God provided for me circumstantially?

After you make the list, thank God for His provision in your life. If it's not your habit, this week, begin your prayers with thanksgiving.

Community Conversation Notes:

Day 16: Psalm 28

What attitude or spiritual condition is David writing about in this Psalm? How does God view hypocrisy? Read Matthew 23:1-32. What warning does Jesus give about hypocrisy? How can hypocrisy sneak into the lives of sincere Believers, and how can we guard against it?

Day 17: Psalm 35

Is David asking for God's permission to take revenge on those who've wronged him or for God to exact His holy justice? How do you know? Are we ever given permission to take revenge on others? See Romans 12:19. What is the correct course of action when we have been wronged? Matthew 5: 43-48 and 18:15-17. How does this Psalm serve as an example of how a human struggle can be worship?

Day 18: Psalm 59

Saul had sent men to watch David's house in order to kill him when David wrote this Psalm. Why is David more confident in God than in his enemies? How did Jesus experience false accusations and betrayal? Having known both, how does the cross give 21st century disciples even confidence that God is our fortress and our shield?

Day 19: Psalm 79

Asaph most likely wrote this psalm after Babylon had invaded and leveled Jerusalem. He was afraid Israel's spiritual identity would be destroyed. How is this plea to God understandable in light of the circumstances that inspired it? What about now? Read this Psalm with the 21st century church in mind. How do Asaph's words apply to the church today? Can you pray this Psalm or part of it for the church in the 21st century?

Day 20: Psalm 109

What evidence in this Psalm supports David's claims that the person he is writing about is doing harm? Read Micah 6:8. How does this verse justify David's feelings toward the wrongdoer? Just because David asks for these imprecations, does it mean God will oblige? What does this show about our ability to share our hearts with God?

Week 4: Psalms of Imprecation Family Discussion Guide

Day 16: Psalm 28

What does it mean when we say God is just? Why is God the only one who can be perfectly just? Read Deuteronomy 32:4 and Job 34:12.

Day 17: Psalm 35

When people try to stop us from worshipping God or doing what God says is right, what should we do?

Day 18: Psalm 59

What is an enemy? How can we recognize an enemy of God? Who is our true enemy? Read Ephesians 6:12.

Day 19: Psalm 79

How do you think it makes God feel when leaders of other countries try to hurt Christians or keep them from worshipping? What should believers do when that happens?

Day 20: Psalm 109

When someone hurts us, is it ok to hurt them back? Read Romans 12:17

Week 4: Psalms of Imprecation Spiritual Formation Activity

Imprecatory Psalms are hard to read. Remember that they are never directed at an individual and always directed at a group that actively opposes God. Imprecations are actually calls for God's justice to be met out on His enemies. Often they call for God to fulfill a promise that His enemies will be defeated. These are not requests for personal retribution.

Consider the following New Testament examples of Imprecation: Luke 10:10-16, 1 Corinthians 16: 21-22, Galatians 1:8, 2 Thessalonians 1:6-10.

While it may seem harsh, there is room in Christian prayer for imprecation. Consider writing an imprecation for one or all of the following:

- The Enemy and his agents
- Governments that oppose or prevent Christian work
- All enemies of God

Day 21: Psalm 1

What blessing does this Psalm pronounce? How can you discern the difference in evil and godly counsel? See Psalm 119:11 and 2 Timothy 4:3-4. In what practical way does being rooted in the word help believers yield fruit and prosper?

Day 22: Psalm 25

What is kind of attitude is necessary if we are to learn from the Lord and understand His ways? Refer to verse 4-5, 8-10, 12, and 21. If we adopt a posture of humility before the Lord, what is the result? When we hope (also wait in Hebrew) in the Lord, what does it produce in our lives? See verse 3 and 21.

Day 23: Psalm 34

Psalm 34 praises God for His deliverance, but nowhere does it promise the righteous person a trouble-free life. What assurances about God does the Psalm offer those who are suffering?

Day 24: Psalm 37

Among other things, Psalm 37 offers advice to avoid fretting or worry. Read verses 1-8. What strategies do verses 3, 4, 5, 7, and 8 offer to combat fretting?

Day 25: Psalm 112

Here the Psalmist directly connects generosity with our fear or reverence for the Lord. How are the 2 connected? Why is generosity a requirement for God's people? How does a stingy or even greedy heart endanger our faith?

Day 21: Psalm 1

What is ungodly or wicked counsel? Why should believers avoid it? Where can you find godly counsel?

Day 22: Psalm 25

David writes that he puts his trust in the Lord. What does it mean to trust God? What makes God trustworthy?

Day 23: Psalm 34

When David says to fear the Lord, does David mean we are supposed to be afraid of God? What does it mean to fear the Lord?

Day 24: Psalm 37

What are things the wicked do according to this Psalm? What are things the righteous do? Which does God reward?

Day 25: Psalm 112

What does it mean to delight in God's commands? How does this writer describe the person who does delight in obeying God? Do you delight in obeying God?

- Did anything from this week encourage, inspire, challenge or convict you? Which passages? What have they motivated you to do?

Community Conversation Notes:

Week 6: Psalms of Enthronement Personal Bible Study

Day 26: Psalm 24

Read verse 1. David makes this declaration before he begins a discussion of holy living. How does verse 1 inform a believer's approach to holy living? How does 1 Peter 1:13-16 further support David's perspective?

Day 27: Psalm 48

This Psalm speaks to God's protection, provision, and help for Jerusalem, and praises Him for His continued presence. How does the church function as a modern day Jerusalem? What spiritual applications can you make for the church when you view her as the 21st century Jerusalem?

Day 28: Psalm 93

Read verse 5. Why is it essential to the character of God that His *statutes stand firm*? See Numbers 23:19, Titus 1:2, Hebrews 13:8, and Psalms18:30. How could our faith increase if we lived as if we truly believed God's statutes were unchangeable?

Day 29: Psalm 97

Read verse 7. In ancient Israel, it was easy to identify the false gods people worshipped because they had physical idols. What false gods and idols do people worship today? How easy is it to recognize them in our own lives, in the lives of others, or in our culture? Refer back to Psalm 24:1. How is worshipping anything other than Jehovah worshipping a false god? How can we become aware of idol worship in our own lives?

Day 30: Psalm 99

God's holiness has been a theme throughout this week's Psalms. While God desires relationship with us, He is more than just our friend. How should God's holiness affect the way we view Him? How should His holiness affect the way we approach Him in prayer? What about the way we speak about Him to others?

Read verse 1. How do you take care of your things? Would you view your belongings differently if you thought God was just letting you use them?

Day 27: Psalm 48

Why is it important to know about the history of God's people? Are we part of the story of God's people? How?

Day 28: Psalm 93

We call earthy kings and queens *Your Majesty*. What does majesty mean? How is God majestic?

Day 29: Psalm 97

What does it mean to reign over something? How does God reign over the earth? How long will God reign? Why should the earth be glad?

Day 30: Psalm 99

Read verses 2-3. Do all the nations in the world praise and worship God? What can you do to help your part of the world praise and worship God?

Week 7: Psalms of Ascent Personal Bible Study

Day 31: Psalm 121

When you experience difficulty or trouble, where do you *expect* your help to come from: God, yourself, others? How would believing God watches over you change your expectation in a practical way? In a spiritual way?

Day 32: Psalm 122

David connects travelling to Jerusalem to worship. How can 21st century disciples read this Psalm as a symbol for corporate worship? Why is a desire for peace the natural outgrowth of a love for worship?

Day 33: Psalm 125

According to verse 1, what is it that gives stability to our lives? What does authentic trust in the Lord require of modern disciples? What evidence in your life proves your trust in God?

Day 34: Psalm 127

This Psalm begins by inviting God into our work then ends by discussing the blessing of children. How are structures, cities, and children all *built*? Why is it equally important to invite God into the construction of a *house* and a *home*?

Day 35: Psalm 131

This Psalm speaks to contentment. Why would contentment have been on the minds of those travelling to Jerusalem to worship? Why does God desire that we be content? See 1 Timothy 6:6-12. What is the connection between pride and a lack of contentment?

Week 7: Psalms of Ascent Family Discussion Guide

Day 31: Psalm 121

What does it mean to *watch over* something or someone? How do you feel knowing God is watching over you?

Day 32: Psalm 122

What does it mean to go to the house of the Lord? Is that something you do? Why was David glad to go?

Day 33: Psalm 125

What does trust mean? What does it mean to trust God? How can you show God you trust Him?

Day 34: Psalm 127

Is it important to ask God to help you with everything you do? Why?

Day 35: Psalm 131

What does being content mean? Why is that important to God?

Community Conversation Notes:

Day 36: Psalm 46

Read verse 10. Why is stillness necessary to know that God is God? Why is stillness a requirement if we are going to allow God to be our refuge, strength, and help? How is a lack of stillness dangerous to our faith?

Day 37: Psalm 51

This Psalm is ultimately about repentance. What is the difference between an apology and true repentance? Why is repentance essential for righteousness? What is the connection between repentance and humility? Which do you do more of: apologize or repent? What practical steps can you take to increase repentance?

Day 38: Psalm 84

What deep spiritual desire does this Psalm express? Read Matthew 5:6. What spiritual desire does Jesus call disciples to? What is the connection between spiritual appetite and the ability to experience God's blessings?

Day 39: Psalm 118

Psalm 118 is often included in the group of *Messianic Psalms*, or Psalms that foretell the coming of Jesus. What verses in this Psalm point to Christ? Compare Psalm 118:22 to Matthew 21:42, Mark 12: 10-12, Luke 20:17, and 1 Peter 2:4-7. How do these point to God's preplanning for Jesus and His work? How does all of this help reinforce that God's love endures forever?

Day 40: Psalm 23

In 23:1 God uses His personal name. What is it? Read Exodus 3: 13-15 to further identify the Psalm 23 shepherd. Note all of the things Shepherd Yahweh does for His sheep in Psalm 23. Now Read John 10:7-18. How does Jesus describe himself? What do these passages tell you about the way God and Jesus *want* to lead you? As sheep, why do we resist being led if our shepherds are good and only want our good?

Day 36: Psalm 46

What are you afraid of? How does it make you feel to know that God doesn't want you to be afraid? How can you let God calm your fears?

Day 37: Psalm 51

How do you know when someone is truly sorry for what they did? How can we show God we are truly sorry for our sins?

Day 38: Psalm 84

What do you think it will be like to be in the presence of God? What does verse 4 say? Are you excited to be with God one day?

Day 39: Psalm 118

Who should you trust more: people or God? Who should you turn to for truth: people or God?

Day 40: Psalm 23

Sheep only listen to their shepherd. Sheep will not follow the shepherd of another flock because they don't recognize his voice. According to Psalm 23, who is our shepherd? How can we recognize His voice so we can follow Him?
