President's Message

RHCA to Hear Healthplex Update

It has been several years since we have been updated on the health care available at the Inova Healthplex on Walker Lane in Franconia, so that is the agenda item for our February 22 meeting at 7 p.m. in the community room of the John Marshall library. It also is American Heart Month, so we'll hear about that subject before we enjoy a menu of healthy snacks prepared by Vice President Linda Nichols.

Heart Disease is the leading cause of death in the United States and is a major cause of disability. The most common form is coronary heart disease which often appears as a heart attack. Every 25 seconds, an American will have a coronary event and about one will die every minute. Taking steps to prevent and control factors that put you at risk will reduce the chance of coronary heart disease. Knowing the symptoms can make the difference between life and death.

Most heart attacks involve chest discomfort in the center of the chest that lasts for more than a few minutes. It can disappear and then come back. Symptoms include pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain. Symptoms also can include pain or discomfort or pain in none or both arms, back, neck or stomach as well as shortness of

breath, breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness.

Exercise and a healthy diet are the best weapons against heart disease. Reduce saturated or trans fat in your diet. Limit your intake of salt, sugar and cholesterol. Check the ingredients listed on the package, can or bag before you make a choice as to which brand to buy.

Here in Rose Hill, help is only minutes away if you think you are having a heart-related incident. And the Healthplex is only a short distance for advanced care if the emergency personnel need to transport you there. If you call or someone calls 911, try to let the operator know you are having a heart-related incident so the Advanced Life Support System ambulance can be dispatched. Seconds can make a major difference in saving your life.

The Healthplex is a growing facility serving our community. Expansion is ongoing, including a new parking deck to handle the large volume of those receiving care at the busy location. Come to the February 22 meeting to learn more about the facility. And sample some of Linda's healthy choices of snacks.

2011 Membership

Our 2011 membership drive continues this month. Check out the list on page 4. If your name isn't there, fill out the form and send it, along with your check made out to RHCA to P.O. Box 10891, Franconia, VA 22310. The dues and contributions pay for the printing of *The Rambler* nine times a year, fund the Rose Hill Beauty program, pay the rent on the post office box and provide funds for small contributions to worthwhile community charities. RHCA also provides snacks for meetings in an effort

to spur attendance. Separate contributions pay for the maintenance of the flower bed at our entrance sign at Rose Hill Drive and Franconia Road. The flowers are changed several times a year to fit the season. The cost of printing The Rambler is RHCA's biggest expenditure. As of this writing, we have a little more than 100 homes signed up. There are 700 homes in Rose Hill, so we have plenty of opportunities to attract new members. Unlike a Homeowners' Association with mandatory dues, RHCA is a volunteer organization with NO personnel expenses. In addition to the Rambler delivery staff, we have a large number of volunteers who watch over our community on a regular basis, keeping an eye out for criminal activity, street lights that are out, unkempt and overcrowded properties and most importantly, checking on their neighbors when needed. If you would like to help, contact one of the officers. By all means, support your community by becoming a member.

Development Update

The amount of dirt being moved in and out of the Rose Hill Reserve site defies description. Each house site must be built on stable soil that does not contain marine clay. Therefore, the unstable soil is being removed and new soil is being provided. All of that means more truck traffic on Rose Hill Drive than we thought we were bargaining for. Due to complaints by nearby residents, the County has increased its vigilance of the efforts to keep the road free of mud and rocks. On another front, plans and talks are progressing on the effort to stabilize the slide on the hillside on private property between May Boulevard and Split Rock Road. Only time will tell if the effort will be successful. Which leads us to the proposed development of 12 houses on the Kindercare property on May Boulevard. The preliminary plan is being evaluated by the County. Should it be approved, the owner will move on to the site plan stage where soils will become a major issue. RHCA is interested in preserving the century-old silos on the site. If the current plan is approved, the issue is moot because the silos eventually disappear. The plan calls for the dismantling of the silos and the area where they once rose will be part of two lots. And everyone will wonder why the street across May Boulevard is named Silo Road! It has been suggested that the silos be preserved as a part of an entrance feature that would continue Silo Road into the property. In

order for that to happen, the owner would have to revamp his plan to a cluster arrangement. We'll see what sort of feeling for history he has! The property is zoned for houses and we aren't contesting that fact. We would, however, like to see the last remaining example of Franconia's agricultural history preserved. The silos were part of a large farm where cows grazed in serenity until our community was built. The old manor house was burned down in the 1960s and we don't want to see the same mistake made twice. We'll have an update and a suggestion at the February 22 meeting.

Police Report

There have been a couple of important recent victories for the good guys. First, police have arrested four men and charged them with being responsible for a string of robberies from vehicles, particularly Global Positioning Systems, in the Franconia area. One of those arrested is from Franconia, two from Springfield and the fourth from Alexandria. One is a juvenile. The arrests came as a result of a tip received by detectives at the Franconia Station. The vehicle break-ins occurred between midnight and 3 a.m. The four would look for unlocked vehicles with visible valuables or check the windshields for suction cup marks in the hope they would find GPS devices. In addition to charges of larceny, one of the four was charged with possession of stolen property with the intent to sell. In the other case, police recovered a vehicle that had been carjacked from a woman in the Kingstowne Shopping Center. The vehicle turned up in Groveton. It was spotted by the department's specially equipped cruiser that scans parked autos looking for those that have been reported stolen. The car cruises slowly down the street, scans license plates and checks via computer to see if any are reported stolen. In this case, the car was returned to the owner after it has been checked for fingerprints, clues and stolen property. Unfortunately, the carjacker is still at large.

As the budget for the upcoming year unfolds, RHCA will be lobbying for additional patrol officers to help keep Rose Hill and other communities safe. We will be looking for ways to save money within the existing police budget and other county and school budgets so the funds can be used to hire additional patrol officers. The Franconia station covers 50 square miles, all the

way from Alexandria to Lorton, and there does not appear to be enough officers on patrol at any one time to constitute a deterrent for would-be criminals. At the last two RHCA meetings, members have overwhelmingly supported public safety as the No. 1 budget priority. Support also is high for code enforcement personnel to help maintain community value by penalizing those who allow their property to become trashed or overcrowded.

Spring is On the Way

Two days after our February 22 RHCA meeting, major league baseball teams will begin the spring exhibition season in Florida and Arizona. Can spring be far behind? The Washington Nationals begin the exhibition season February 28 against the New York Mets. A month later, they begin the regular season with a home game against the Atlanta Braves. It appears the Nationals have made great improvements since last season, so hope springs eternal, to coin a phrase. They haven't lost a game yet! And, don't forget that Daylight Savings Time starts this year on Sunday, March 13. We'll all have a little extra daylight to work in the yard and get ready for the Rose Hill beauty contest that honors those who keep their properties in tip-top shape. Remember, only RHCA members receive the coveted signs for display in their yard. If you need any plants, seed, fertilizer, mulch, tools, etc., you might consider stopping by Nalls Produce on Beulah Street. This family-owned local business is celebrating its 50th anniversary! Ask owner Cary Nalls about the changes he has seen since he started the business in 1961.

Local History

The Franconia Museum is sponsoring two events this spring in connection with the sesquicentennial of the start of the Civil War. The sixth Both Sides Tour will follow the route of Union and Confederate forces to Manassas for the first major battle of the war 150 years ago come August. It will start at the site of Fort Lyon, now the Huntington Metro Station, where Union forces gathered before marching up what is now Franconia Road toward Manassas. The day starts with coffee and doughnuts at the Franconia Museum in the government center, 6121 Franconia Road. Board a bus for a day of touring, lunch and reports on the war's first battle.

She's been on all of them! And on May 14-15, the Museum will sponsor a program called Franconia in the Civil War at Lee District Park. Presentations will include information about Union encampments, Confederate raids, famous houses, churches and farm life in Franconia from 1861-1865. There will be music, reenactors of both combatants and personalities during that time. The program is from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday, May 14 and 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Sunday, May 15. A full schedule of events will be printed in the April Rambler.

A sample of the type information one will hear as part of the Franconia in the Civil War program comes from the diary of Anne S. Froebel of Wilton Hill, a large house and farm near the intersection of what is now Franconia Road and Telegraph Road. An entry in July 1861 reports that "Miss Emily Davis came down to day to tell us of the violence and robbery that has been perpetrated at Rose Hill within the last few days". Miss Davis, a neighbor, said Union forces had "searched and plundered the house from garret to cellar. Then they went out and hitched up the wagons, carts and everything they could find, killed the hogs, sheep and poultry and filled everything with it and went off with a drove of horses, mules and cows". Miss Davis was a neighbor of Rose Hill, a manor house on the hill at the end of what is now May Boulevard with a surrounding large farm.
