### President's Message

### Revised Lee District Park Plan To Be Discussed on March 28

On Wednesday, March 15, the Fairfax County Park Authority staff outlined its revised master plan for Lee District Park at a public meeting at Mark Twain Middle School. That same day, the Rose Hill Civic Association received a reply to its letter of December 7, 2005.

The revised plan, RHCA's letter, and the reply will be available at the Rose Hill Civic Association meeting on Tuesday, March 28, at 7pm in the community room of the John Marshall Library. It should be noted that the revised plan is more intense than what originally proposed and was the subject of the RHCA letter.

The new plan proposes three lighted baseball/softball fields and three lighted separate rectangular fields suitable for football, softball, and other sports. The previous plan called for multi-use fields with baseball/softball being overlaid on football/soccer fields. There were fewer fields and fewer lights.

As you may recall, RHCA's concerns about the previous plan centered around glare from the lights and traffic through our community. The answer was to light more fields and advise us that traffic should not be a problem. The Department of Recreation and Community Services advised the Park Authority that its information indicates only 25 cars per field per hour. By their count, we can expect 150 more cars per hour when the fields are in use.

RHCA respectfully disputes those figures, particularly for tournaments and other special events. On the one hand, we are trying to reduce traffic and speeding in Rose Hill. On the other, it appears the new park plan will add more traffic.

The Park staff reports that technology has lessened the likelihood that glare will be a problem for neighboring properties. We'd like to know more about such a large concentration of lights in a small area.

The new plan proposes rest room facilities in the family recreation area near the intersection of Rose Hill Drive and Telegraph Road. We wholeheartedly support that addition. The new plan also improves the trail system in the park and pledges the Park Authority to work with the County and State to upgrade access to the park. RHCA proposed just such a system in its December letter.

It should be noted that the Park Authority ultimately will have to gain a favorable ruling from the Planning Commission that the new master plan

meets the location, character, and extent criteria of the comprehensive plan. At this point, I believe the proposal fails in that it changes the character of Lee District Park from a district park to a county-wide facility and the extended uses are more intense than the plan envisions. Lee District Park can only be reached by driving through a community and those communities should not be overburdened with traffic.

Finally, redevelopment of the park will be contingent on the sale of future park bonds, state or federal funds, contributions, or a combination of all of them. At this point, no funding program is contemplated. Park bond funds are repaid by the County through its annual budget.

Come to the March 28 RHCA meeting to learn more about this proposal and help develop the RHCA response.

### **Development Update**

Wale Ayodeji, the County's Chief Geotechnical Engineer, reports that the site plan and soils report for Rose Hill Reserve have been sent back to the owner's engineers for more information and calculations needed in order to prove their conclusion that the property can safely be developed. This action came after a site visit on February 23 by Mr. Ayodeji and his staff, members of the Geotechnical Review Board, myself, and Jeff McKay from Supervisor Kauffman's office. The site visit gave us a chance to show the County and the Board members specific areas of concern which include development near steep slopes and water runoff. Hopefully, the one area of concern about the width of the buffer near a house on Carriage Drive has been resolved by down-sizing a cul de sac as part of the new development. The County geotechnical review folks are going the extra mile to make sure RHCA's questions are answered and the adjacent property owners are protected.

One other note: it appears we will soon be dealing with a development proposal for the property on the hillside between Driftwood Drive and Telegraph Road and bordered by the homes on the north side of Climbhill Road. Residents report drilling rigs have been busy on the site, a sure indication that development is planned. The property is zoned R-3, the same as the rest of Rose Hill, and has marine clay deposits. This may involve by-right development under the existing zoning. However, RHCA will insist that the rules involving development on marine clay are strictly enforced. As always, our goal is to make sure adjacent properties, and the potential new neighbors, are protected.

### **It's the Law!**

Rose Hill residents are reminded of several county laws that are designed to help us keep our community looking good. And, we are serving notice that RHCA will insist those laws be enforced by the County. They involve trash piles in the yard, abandoned,

unlicensed, or inoperable cars on private property that are visible from any adjoining property, parking on the grass strip between the sidewalk and street on Rose Hill Drive, and cleaning up after you dog. The latter is of particular concern because of the potential health problems. If you walk your dog, clean up after any deposits they leave along the way. I do, and you can, too! And, although it's not against the law, please be considerate of what your neighbors have to look at and pick up those pesky, free newspapers. When they sit and accumulate, not only do they rot, but they make your home look vacant and appealing to would-be thieves.

As the days get longer, more children are going to be playing outside. Parents are reminded to caution them from playing in the street and to look both ways before crossing the street. Drivers are reminded to keep a keen eye out for our community 'dears,' paying particular attention to the spaces between parked cars. RHCA is working with the County in an effort to slow down

the traffic that passes through our community.

### **Blight Update**

Thanks to strong action by the Health Department, the house at 4612 Roundhill Road has a new roof! Also, the Blight Abatement people report they have seen signed contracts for the installation of new windows and other maintenance items. RHCA will continue to monitor the property (with the help of the neighbors) and report any delays in promised work or other problems. And, believe it or not, a landscape company recently showed up to cut the grass and clean up the outside. We hope this wasn't a one-time effort. It took a long time and a visit from the sheriff to get some action from the absentee owner. Thanks to the Health Department, we hopefully are on the road to getting this property back to the point where it doesn't embarrass those who live nearby. Just shows how effective a community organization can be when it unites behind a problem.

We lived in Huntington in a duplex rental home in 1954. One of our neighbors told us that a housing development was being constructed off Franconia Road, so we took a ride up that way and found that two houses had been constructed—one was a model and the other was being used for the office. We were so please to find that \$25 would get us on the list that day and be used as a portion of the settlement fees. We were taken for a Jeep ride down a really bumpy country road to see the spot we had chosen on their map.

They had extra options to choose from. We wanted a corner lot, parquet floors, and a washing machine in the kitchen which added a few hundred dollars to the basic price of \$13,500. Thinking back now, that

was about the best decision we made. It doesn't seem possible that a house could be bought for such a small amount of money, especially considering prices now. Even cars cost more than that now.

Our house was completed in December 1954, and we moved in January 1, 1955—the 15th family to move into Rose Hill. The shopping center was opened soon after; Rose Hill School and the Library followed. Everything we needed was close by.

We've always appreciated the convenience of living in this area. Our neighbors are great and thoughtful and, needless to say, we've enjoyed being Rose Hill residents.
