Black History Moment: We honor those who served and those who gave the ultimate sacrifice. Someone’s father, mother, sister, brother, uncle, aunt, cousins and friends etc., My family has a proud and rich history of service in the military; me, great- grandfathers, great aunts, father, brothers, aunts, uncles, brother-in law, sister-in-law and nieces and nephews who are presently serving. I also have a nephew who serves in the military band. We honor all. In every war fought by or within the United States, (we) African Americans participated, including the Revolutionary War, the War of 1812, the Mexican American War, the Civil War, the Spanish American War, World War I & II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War, the Gulf War, the War in Afghanistan, and the Iraq War. The early years most African American units were largely relegated to support roles and did not see combat. We still played a notable role in America’s war effort. We served all over the world. There were 125,000 African Americans who were overseas in World War II, famous segregated units, such as the Tuskegee Airmen and 761st Tank Battalion and the lesser-known but equally distinguished 452nd Anti-Aircraft Artillery Battalion, proved their value in combat, there were protests which lead to desegregation of all U.S. armed forces by order of President Harry S. Truman on July 26, 1948 via Executive Order 9981 integrating the military and mandating equality of treatment and opportunity. It also made it illegal, per military law, to make a racist remark. This was not complete for several years, and all-black Army units persisted well into the Korean War. The last all-black unit was not disbanded until 1954. Listed below are some 1sts and some names you might recognize. Our service history proudly continues. Apr. 1776, The first black American to fight in the Marines was John Martin, the slave of a Delaware man recruited in April 1776 without his owner’s permission. Benjamin O. Davis, Jr. served as commander of the Tuskegee Airmen during the war. He later went on to become the first African American general in the US Air Force. His father, Benjamin O. Davis, Sr., had been the first African American brigadier general in the Army (1940). In 1943, Joseph C. Jenkins became the first African American commissioned officer in the US Coast Guard. He was joined first by Clarence Samuels on Aug. 31, 1943 and then by Harvey C. Russell Jr. in Feb. 1944. In March 1944, the Golden Thirteen became the Navy’s first African American commissioned officers. Samuel L. Gravely, Jr. became a commissioned officer the same year; he would later be the first African American to command a US warship, and the first to be an admiral. The first African American woman sworn into the Navy Nurse Corps was Phyllis Mae Dailey. She was the first of only four African American women to serve as a Navy nurse during World War II. On January 13, 1997 the Medal of Honor was awarded to 7 African American servicemen who had served in World War II. The only living recipient was First Lieutenant Vernon Baker. The posthumous recipients were: Major Charles L. Thomas, 1st Lieutenant John R. Fox, Staff Sgt. Ruben Rivers, Staff Sgt. Edward A. Carter, Jr. Carter also has a Military Sealift Command vessel was named after him, PFC Willy F. James, Jr., Private George Watson. In 1989, Army General Colin Powell was the 1st African American appointed to the position of Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. In 2007 General William E. “Kip” Ward became commander of the new US Africa Command, Ronald L. Green, former Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps, is African American. In 2009, Barack Obama, President of the US made him ex officio the first African American Commander-in-Chief of the US Armed Forces. In 2020, Charles Q. Brown Jr. became the 1st African American Chief of Staff of the Air Force. On Jan. 22, 2021, Lloyd Austin a former United States Army four-star general is the first African American to serve as the US Secretary of Defense. We, African American men, and women served, and we continue to serve. **God bless them ALL! We thank you ALL for your service!**

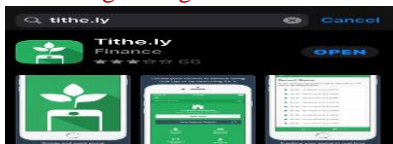
