GODOFIEHLS AND VALLEYS God isn't just with us when

we're on top of the world, nor is He just with us when we are in a low place ...

od of the hills and valleys has been popularized through song in recent years; if you listen to Christian radio then you will likely know the songs. But the expression God of the hills and the valleys originates in the Old Testament. In 1 Kings 20, the king of Aram, Ben-Hadad, is attacking the city of Samaria in Israel. He demands that Israel surrender everything to him; its wealth, wives, and even children. The king of Israel at that time, King Ahab, agrees to the terms, but when Ben-Hadad expands the conditions of surrender to include anything that the enemy touches they will keep, King Ahab flatly refuses. His refusal to comply aggravates King Ben-Hadad, who sends King Ahab a threatening remark. He says that if Israel does not comply then he will annihilate the city so methodically that there will not be enough dust for each of his soldiers to take a handful home.

As the enemy is getting ready to attack Israel, an unnamed prophet approaches King Ahab with a message from God, "thus says the Lord: Have you seen all this great multitude? Behold, I will deliver it into your hand today, and you shall know that I am the Lord" (1 Kings 20:13). This supernatural act on God's part was directed at King Ahab, because it was King Ahab who enjoyed worshipping other gods rather than the one true God. True to God's promise, the enemy is driven 👧 back, and the siege is brought to an end.

When King Ben-Hadad questions his men as to why they lost a battle that was clearly in their favor to win, they replied, "their gods are gods of the hills...they were stronger than we; but if we fight against them in the plain, surely we will be stronger than they" (1 Kings 20:23). Because Samaria was in the hill country of Israel, the enemy mistakenly believed that the God of Israel is only the god of the hills and nowhere else. It was common for ancient nations to perceive their gods as having a specific territory or sphere of power on earth. Baal, the god that King Ahab enjoyed worshipping, was the god of fertility and weather. There were other gods for the forests, crops, mountains, seas, rivers, etc. The idea that one God was supreme over all the earth was a truth that many ancient nations did not believe. Well, this ancient nation of Aram (Syria) is radically educated that their theology is completely wrong.

After being driven back the first time, the enemy comes back at Israel with a new strategy. They begin to regroup and focus the battle on the lower plains and valleys. Once again, this unnamed prophet comes to King Ahab with a message, "...thus says the Lord: 'Because the Syrians have said, "The Lord is the God of the hills, but He is not God of the valleys," therefore I will deliver this great multitude into your hand, and you shall know that I am the LORD." The enemy quickly discovers that the one true God knows no

boundaries. God gave Israel victory both in the hills of Samaria and in the valleys of Aphek low place; He is also God of the plains. to show that He is sovereign over all the earth. However, did you notice that not only does God demonstrate to the enemy that He is sovereign, but He also demonstrates to King Ahab and all Israel that He is sovereign?

Figuratively speaking, the hills represent our high points in our lives, mountaintop experiences, times when we've seen God move in miraculous ways. Clearly, Scripture also notes the importance of mountains: Moses received the law on Mt. Sinai; Elijah defeated the prophets of Baal on Mount Carmel; Jesus' most glorious moment of transfiguration took place on a mountaintop; and Jesus even ascended into heaven from the Mount of Olives. Mountaintop experiences are landmarks and milestones in our lives as they were in the lives of many of God's people, but valleys are also commonplace in the lives of God's people. We all know what the valleys represent. They represent the low times in our lives, the hard times, the struggles and challenges that we face. But it's in these lowest points of our lives that God is still with us. Psalm 23:4 says, "yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, you are with me." Not only is God the God of the valley, but He is also the God who goes with you through the valley.

God isn't just with us when we're on top of the

world, nor is He just with us when we are in a

Author Richard Foster said it best, "The discovery of God lies in the daily and routine, not in the spectacular and the heroic. If we cannot find God in the routines of home and shop, then we will not find Him at all." The fact of the matter is that God is just as interested in the plains of our lives as He is in the hills or valleys. King Ahab and all of Israel needed to be reminded that the one true God is the God of the hills and valleys... and the plains. Sometimes we need to be reminded of this truth too - God is not just walking with us during the high points and low points of life; He is walking beside us every step of the way.

otherhood is a tough job even in the best of times. And even the strongest of moms find that they grow weary as the days turn into weeks in this worldwide pandemic. Certainly, many are feeling very worn down and barely hanging on. There is a simple truth we should practice to overcome: Let go of what fails and support one another in love.

A few weeks ago, our family took a hiking trip and deep into the woods we found a very large boulder blanketed with moss except for one little sapling near the top. Of course, our first instinct was to find a way to climb to the top. The slippery moss and steep facing made the ascent to the top quite a challenge. Close to the top of the boulder was this small sapling that obviously had fallen from a larger tree, taken root in the shallow soil and had begun to grow. At first, in our efforts to reach the top we inevitably grabbed that little tree. But because of the lack of strong roots, we found out quickly that that was the wrong thing to hold for climbing. After learning the hard way, we searched for another way to get to the top. We found that if each of us took a turn standing under the other and supporting the other's foot it gave the strength needed to crest the top. One by one each of us made it to the top with the support of the others. Letting go of the little tree that offered no help, we supported each other and right there in those woods God laid out a simple truth: let go of the things that do not last and bear the weight of each other through love.

Peter writes about this truth in his first book.

1 Peter 1:22-25

²² Having purified your souls by your obedience to the truth for a sincere brotherly love, love one another earnestly from a pure heart,

²³ since you have been born again, not of perishable seed but of imperishable, through the living and abiding word of God;

²⁴ for "All flesh is like grass and all its glory like the flower of grass. The grass withers, and the flower falls,

²⁵ but the word of the Lord remains forever."

Temporal things will fail. What we hold on to must be things that are rooted in God. His Word, His redemption, His love, His promises, and more. If what is in our hands does not fall into those categories, then we should let it go. There is peace that comes in the letting go, like the relaxation of a muscle releasing a long-held tight grip. So often our strength is wasted in holding on to what cannot hold us. The things rooted in God will never give way; they last forever and are deeper than any earthly roots. This passage in 1 Peter also talks about brotherly love. It is in this way that we support each other. Every day we should offer support through love to each other. The only way my family could reach the top of that rock was through supporting one another. None of us could have accomplished that climb alone. Imagine the outcome if we had refused to help one another or if we had criticized each other's ascent. Peter says to love one another "earnestly." That means to love intensely or fervently. When it was my turn to ascend the rock, I can say my family supported me "intensely" and we all had a good laugh.

Are you weary? Ask for loving support from other believers, and be a support for others as well. Then, holding onto Him, we will get through this together.

IN MEMORY OF A TRUE DIFFERENCE MAKER

Don McMellon was the pastor of Lewis Memorial from Aug. 1969 - June 1, 1977. Reverend McMellon or Preacher, as he was called by the congregation, was

a true servant of the Lord and of the Word. Being a pastor was not a job to him but rather a privilege that he cherished. During his years at LMBC he performed all three of his children's wedding ceremonies, two of his grandchildren's, and many who still attend Lewis today. He knew the importance of the youth to the church and made a point not only to be involved with them himself but to begin a children's ministry - which to this day



his children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren have taken part. It is clear from talking to those who knew him that he had an impact on his family, on the church, on the stranger on the street, and in doctor's offices and businesses throughout the community. He was unashamed of the Gospel and never in too big of a hurry to stop and share it wherever the Lord led; and, as a true servant of the Lord, he was excited about that impact. Shortly after he learned he was terminally ill he made the statement that he was ready to go, and said one of the first things he was going to do when he got to heaven was walk up and down the streets looking for those he had led to the Lord. He truly was a difference maker.

to do that than to ask God to teach us to be thankful, even in this situation?



'hile Covid-19 has affected our world from travel to meetings - to schools and gatherings, thankfully, it has not affected technology. Perhaps, it has even enhanced it and made us appreciate it even more. With its help many have had the ability to work from home, allowing them to keep their jobs and financial support. It also gives us a safe way to stay in touch with our friends and family and is allowing our children, from pre-school to college and beyond, the opportunity to learn at home. As a church we certainly have learned to value it as a method for our congregation and even life groups to meet and stay connected in spite of the pandemic restrictions. It has also been a method and blessing for our missionaries - both in keeping us posted on their safety and concerns and in connecting with us for prayer support. We have received video updates, invitations to meet with them via zoom and of course the standard emails - all of which make us even more thankful for technology in these unprecedented times.

As you can imagine, most if not all of our missionaries have been affected in some way by the Coronavirus. Because many write from secured locations or out of concern for the things they share we have chosen to not share specific names and locations but to give you an overall view of how they are being affected. Despite the fact that each of the letters represented a different country, each one different from the next and many vastly different from our own - the videos, letters, and emails all held similarities to what we are dealing with here such as empty store shelves, quarantines, restrictions on gatherings, and the cancelation of events including church services and school. However, they also spoke of things we haven't faced such as evacuations, closed borders, and the

possibilities of not being able to get back to their home when the shutdowns first occurred. While some have been able to use social media to keep in touch with those they minister to and with, others wrote of difficulties with online platforms which means the spread of the Gospel has been greatly hindered, if not stopped altogether. This concern was by far the overwhelming concern represented in each of the letters. Like us, they sought prayer for safety and healing for those infected with the virus and those gravely affected by the shut-down but their greatest pleas were for the lost, each of them looking for ways and opportunities to be "salt and light" in such a time as this.

Specific Requests ...

- Pray for good health and that if I contract the virus that my body would be able to fight it off successfully.
- Pray that I would grow closer to the Lord during this time of forced rest.
- Pray for new ways to minister during this challenging time.
- Please lift up Kathy and Ella with their asthma.
- We want to glorify God in the way we respond to Covid-19.
- Please be in prayer for us that God would guard us despite the evil happenings in our country. About 50 people were killed by mob justice indiscriminately and some schools were gassed by chemicals for unknown reasons.
- My dear friend is battling the virus and his wife is now showing symptoms.
- Pray that the appeal for our work permit would be accepted.


