LESSON OVERVIEW

Today the children will learn about Paul, and discover they too can spread God's Good News.

TODAY'S VIDEOS

Today's videos come from *What's In the Bible?* Volume 11. To purchase or learn more about this volume visit whatsinthebible.com.

VIDEO 1 / SMALL GROUP 1

The purpose of this time is to build relationships with the children. It's important for children to feel welcomed and connected before engaging in active learning. Usually this activity is a simple game that encourages interaction. Take time to say each child's name and how glad you are to see each person! (Use the Shepherding Guide to make notes of what the children say during this time. Ask follow up questions next time you see the child at church.)

VIDEO 2 / SMALL GROUP 2

The purpose of this time is to introduce the day's lesson and review the previous lesson. Because this is a Biblical literacy curriculum, this segment is important for helping children build a cohesive understanding of the entire Bible. The questions and games are designed to provide repetition and reinforcement for helping children understand the Bible.

VIDEO 3 / SMALL GROUP 3

The purpose of this time is to teach the main content of the day's lesson. New information and the key lesson can be found during these activities. Provide children adequate time to process the new information. Feel free to skip questions, add questions or tweak the activities so that children are able to fully grasp the new stories and concepts.

VIDEO 4 / SMALL GROUP 4

The purpose of this time is to review the day's lesson. A "Bible What's It? Game" is always provided which includes review questions. Following the review questions, take time to encourage reflection. Ask open-ended questions that encourage children to apply the lesson specifically to their context. Consider making this a quiet time, followed by quiet prayer.

What's In the Bible? gives you the freedom to customize your own curriculum. That means you have the ability to change, edit, remove or add anything you want to make this lesson a perfect fit for your children's ministry. VIDEO 1 / SMALL GROUP 1

PREPARATION

Supplies: Video 1, 1 Bubble Card (Per Child), 1 Picture Card (Per Child), Pencils (1 Per Child) and Shepherding Guide (1 Box Per Child)

Teacher Note: Each week, the children will be playing "Who Said It?" Encourage the children to think of a phrase they said during the week and write it on their Bubble Card.

If you took pictures of children during Week 1, use those pictures in place of the Picture Cards. If not, encourage the children to draw pictures of themselves on the Picture Cards.

Place all of the Picture Cards in a row on the floor while mixing up the Bubble Cards in a separate row. Encourage the children to match the Picture Card to the Bubble Card while guessing who said what this week.



PLAY: Video 1

Welcome the children!

SAY It's good to learn about our friends at church. Let's learn more about each other today by playing a game called "Who Said It?"

SAY First, draw a picture of yourself on the Picture Card. Then, I'll place your picture in a row on the floor.

SAY Think of some words you said to God this week. Maybe you prayed to Him, or sang a song to Him, or asked Him for help. If you didn't say any words to God this week, you can write one thing you'd like to say to Him right now. Write it on your Bubble Card. When you've finished writing, give your Bubble Card to me. Don't show or tell anyone what you wrote!

PLACE the Bubble Cards in a row next to the Picture Cards. Mix them up so the Bubble Cards aren't next to the correct Picture Cards.

ENCOURAGE the children to guess who said what! Match the Picture Card with the correct Bubble Card. Have fun guessing who said what!

ASK a follow up question to each child: *Tell me more about what you said to God. Did something happen that prompted you to say these words to God?*

SAY Thank you for sharing! Today we'll learn about Paul and his many trips!

VIDEO 2 / SMALL GROUP 2

PREPARATION

Supplies: Video 2, Bible, Scissors and Paul Revealed Print Piece

Teacher Note: Print the Paul Revealed Print Piece (**Important:** it is two sided) and cut/fold along lines. Please print as a 2-sided document, or print as 2 pages and tape or staple them back-to-back. As children answer questions about Paul, pull away the matching tab. Eventually, Paul's picture will be revealed as all the tabs are pulled away.

ACTIVITY

PLAY: Video 2

SAY Paul was a man made for the job God had for him. Let's play a game called Paul Revealed, where we will review some of the characteristics of Paul. We will need one person to choose which question about Paul will be asked. We have some fun ways that will help us decide who chooses the questions.

WHO CHOOSES

- **1.** The person who will choose our first number has the most pockets on his/her clothing today. Pick a number between 1-10 and we will answer that question on our Paul Revealed Card.
- 2. The person who will choose the next number is the person who has the shortest pinky finger. Pick a number between 1-10 (that has not yet been chosen) and we will answer that question on our Paul Revealed Card.
- **3.** The person who will choose the next number is the person who has recently lost a tooth. Pick a number between 1-10 (that has not yet been chosen) and we will answer that question on our Paul Revealed Card.
- **4.** The person who will choose the next number is the person who has most recently cut his/her hair. Pick a number between 1-10 (that has not yet been chosen) and we will answer that question on our Paul Revealed Card.
- **5.** The person who will choose the next number is the person who is the tallest. Pick a number between 1-10 (that has not yet been chosen) and we will answer that question on our Paul Revealed Card.
- **6.** The person who will choose the next number is the person who has the most pets. Pick a number between 1-10 (that has not yet been chosen) and we will answer that question on our Paul Revealed Card.
- 7. The person who will choose the next number is the person who has the most brothers and sisters. Pick a number between 1-10 (that has not yet been chosen) and we will answer that question on our Paul Revealed Card.
- **8.** The person who will choose the next number is the person who practiced an instrument yesterday. Pick a number between 1-10 (that has not yet been chosen) and we will answer that question on our Paul Revealed Card.
- **9.** The person who will choose the next number is the person who is the shortest. Pick a number between 1-10 (that has not yet been chosen) and we will answer that question on our Paul Revealed Card.
- **10.** The person who will choose the next number is the person who has most recently broken a bone. Pick a number between 1-10 (that has not yet been chosen) and we will answer that question on our Paul Revealed Card.



VIDEO 3 / SMALL GROUP 3

PREPARATION

Supplies: Video 3, Bibles, Various Art Supplies (to create map), Map It Print Pieces, Scissors, Glue and Tape

Teacher Note: Create a map of Paul's journeys using the Map It Print Pieces and Various Art Supplies

SAY Paul sure did a lot of traveling! I have a bucket of art supplies that we can use to map out Paul's travels that we learned about in the book of Acts.



PLAY: Video 3

VIDEO 4 / SMALL GROUP 4

PREPARATION

Supplies: Video 4 and GO HOME Cards (1 Per Child)

Teacher Note: This activity is a set of review questions that will appear on the video. Take time to answer and discuss each question with your small group. At the end of this time, take prayer requests and lead a time of prayer with your group.

ACTIVITY

SAY: Let's play Bible What's It? I will divide you into 2 teams. You can work with your team to answer each question. The team who answers the most questions correctly, wins!

SAY Today we learned about Paul. Do you remember Clive & Ian's song? Let's listen to it again.

PLAY the Clive & Ian Song from Video 2 on an iPad or Video Player. You can find this song on the Week 4 menu on the Classroom DVD. Encourage the children to sing along. If you don't have access to a video player, read or sing the words on the following page.

AFTER the SONG, LEAD the children in the following discussion:

SAY Paul was the perfect guy to spread God's good news during Biblical times. He had many characteristics that made him just right for the job. But, that was Paul's time. Now, it is our time.

SAY Let's think about the characteristics, the talents, the skills and the passion we have to spread God's good news. (Encourage the children to share with each other)

SAY Fantastic! We can spread God's good news to the people in our communities and around the world. Let's pray that God will give us strength to do this!

PRAY Let's pray together. What would you like to say to God today?

Where did Paul grow up?

ANSWER: In Tarsus, in the Greek world

How did knowing the Old Testament Scriptures help Paul when he talked to people about Jesus?
