


STRAIGHT FROM THE HART

Ministry Clarity Co-Directors, Chris Gleason and Kim Zwisdak, and their team (along with Consultant Rev. Billy Brath from LCEF), continue to lead the congregation through a Ministry Clarity Process (strategic plan) designed to help our church and ministries come out strong after the pandemic.

We continue to review the "Mission Pillars" which are areas of stability that help support our mission. They are the solid foundation on which we wish to build.



Pillar #3 Christian Education: Adults and children are nurtured in faith and empowered to live the love of Christ as they experience, learn and reflect on His Word.

God's Word, the Bible, is a precious gift to Christians. Like our sisters and brothers in the Jewish faith, we hold that "long ago God spoke to

our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets" (Hebrews 1:1), and that these words were written down (in what we call the Old Testament) so that God's people might hear about God's law and His eternal mercy. As the Church, we believe that "in these last days He has spoken to us by a Son, whom He appointed heir of all things" (Hebrews 1:2a)—Jesus. We also believe that the Gospel writers and Apostles shared the message of Jesus in written form (what we call the New Testament) so that the faith might be received and passed down.

Modern times are complicated, and we are so blessed to have God's Word to shape and inform our lives. How would we have survived the COVID-19 pandemic without God's blessing through His Word? And in our daily lives, where could we look to live as Jesus directed apart from God's Word? The world is also becoming more secular, so the need for instruction in the Bible is more important than ever. In times past, many knew the Bible from culture, literature or art, but those days are past. We must also always be on guard from what I would identify as extremist groups that use the Bible out of context and with an agenda of hate. The need for balanced, Christ-centered growth in God's Word is a necessity.

This growth in God's Word starts in the home, as parents share faith and the stories of the Bible with their little ones, and it continues through Sunday School, religion classes at The Chapel School, and 1st Communion and Confirmation. Teens and adults can continue their growth through Bible classes, and even worship is a chance to be informed through Bible readings, the liturgy (often quoted directly from the Bible), the sermon, and prayers that are reflections of the scriptures.

As Jesus said in Mathew 4:4, "It is written, 'One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God." For our church, God's Word is our secure and solid foundation. A thought about our third Mission Pillar that is Straight from the Hart.

ECAP: During the first two weeks of October, members of Village Lutheran Church and families from The Chapel School partnered with the Eastchester Community Action Partnership (ECAP) to assist in fighting food insecurity. The Thrivent Member Network-Northeast Region challenged members to combat food insecurity by using Thrivent Action Teams. If they collected at least 500 nonperishable items for a local food pantry, the region would reward their efforts with a \$500 check to that organization. The school and church set up an October Food Drive Challenge. "I was so happy when Value Drugs in Eastchester donated a box of paper bags with handles," recalled Nelly Palumbo, Fellowship Coordinator at Village Lutheran Church. Flyers with information about the challenge were

created and stapled to the bags, and sent home with each student. They served as a reminder and an easy way to collect the non-perishable food items.

Students were tasked with helping to count, sort and pack the items. Members from Village Lutheran Church with large vehicles volunteered their time to collect and drop off the donations to the food pantry.

"Within the first two days the collection tables were packed with donations," said Kim Zwisdak, Development Office Project Manager at Village Lutheran Church & The Chapel School. "I was nervous at first, because 500 items is a lot, but our families and community member are always so generous, we not only hit that goal but exceeded it before the end of the challenge period." (Over 1,000 items were collected for ECAP!)

FOCUS ON WORSHIP

At this time of the year, when we give thanks for the fruits of the earth and all of the blessings from the hand of God, we turn our attention to the Offertory canticle "Let the Vineyards Be Fruitful" (LSB 955). The original text was created by Rev. John Arthur (1922-80) for the new liturgy in the *Lutheran Book of Worship*. Pastor Arthur also wrote the text for "This is the Feast" (featured in September), and my appreciation for his creative blending of Biblical themes has grown.

Whereas "This is the Feast" is based on songs in Revelation, "Let the Vineyards" employs significant metaphors found over and over in both the Old and New Testaments:

- 1. *Let the vineyards be fruitful, Lord* Isaiah 5 has an elaborate vision of Israel as the Lord's beautiful vineyard, one which was well cared for but yielded only bad grapes. In John 15, Jesus identifies Himself as our vine, enabling us to bear spiritual fruit and encouraging us to accept necessary pruning in order to be even more fruitful.
- 2. And fill to the brim our cup of blessing Did anyone else think immediately of Psalm 23, "My cup overflows"? What a promise of blessing that is. The other prominent image of a cup is related to the Passover meal, where there are 4 special cups of wine and which Jesus used to institute the sacrament of Holy Communion. No matter whether we have a precious gold chalice or a little plastic sippy cup, our Lord comes to us with abundant healing and strength.
- 3. *Gather a harvest from the seeds that were sown* Another series of powerful metaphors from Isaiah 55 tells us of God's extravagant provisions and reminds us that He is at work in all things. God declares that His Word "will not return to me empty, but will accomplish what I desire and achieve the purpose for which I sent it." Paul writes of sower, seed and harvest in 2 Corinthians 9:10: "Now he who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food will also supply and increase your store of seed and will enlarge the harvest of your righteousness."
- 4. That we may be fed with the bread of life As we heard this summer from John 6, Jesus proclaimed "I am the bread of life." This is not simply manna that sustained Israel through its desert wanderings, but bread from heaven, which feeds our true hunger and leads to eternal life.

All these images are wrapped together in the second half of the canticle, preparing us for the Communion celebration. As God gathers the harvest, we ask Him to gather up all of the hopes, dreams and prayers that have collected in our hearts. We invite our Lord to come among us collectively and dwell within us individually, so that our cup of blessing remains filled and we see a glimpse of the heavenly kingdom right here and now. Thank You, Lord!

CONCORDIA LEGACY AT VLC

At the closing of Concordia College, several items were designated to be transferred to the care and keeping of VLC and

TCS. This month, long-time VLC member Dr. Betty Geiling talks about the meaning of the new wooden chairs and table on the Great Porch, which were given to Concordia College in memory of Professor John Bahr by his family. Dr. Geiling shared: "John was a faithful servant, a professor of the faith who dedicated his life to the mission of Concordia College. He served generations of students as their Dean of Students. John held many positions at once and he was a busy person. However, he always had the time for a conversation with his colleagues and students. He was wise, a trusted mentor, a careful listener, and helped us in our struggle. He was our "go-to" guy and had a magical way of clearing the darkness and leading us to the light. In his final baccalaureate sermon, John stood before the college and the graduates. He was terminally ill—completely out of time—but as always, he invited us into conversation with him.



This conversation was a call and response. He would outline a challenge and end with "God is Good," and we would respond "All the Time". And then he would follow with "All the Time" and we would respond "God is Good." He cleared away the worry and despair with a simple statement of faith. Whatever you are handling, the steadfast truth remains, for all time, that God is Good. The pieces of outdoor furniture are not just beautiful and comfortable; they are also inscribed with those special words. So, next time you are on the Great Porch, sit for a minute and remember: "God is Good, All the

Time!"

Empowered

This fall, students of all ages are headed back to either virtual or in-person school, preschool on up to graduate school, as well as night classes and self-improvement courses. Many will also begin or continue their "schooling" in mental health therapy. Talk therapy (or counseling) can perhaps best be understood as education, a learning about one's self. Given that education is a quest for knowledge and skills so central to life today, the quest to know one's self in a much more focused and intentional way must be a priority. Therapy gives us this unique opportunity!

People come to therapy with all sorts of concerns—anxiety, depression, anger, relational and family issues, mood swings, addictive behaviors and many others. But as these concerns are discussed, the individual's sense of self that underlies them emerges—a self that is invariably barely known, or denigrated or dismissed, or kept hidden away. You may discover that you don't really know yourself, or that you don't really like yourself, or that you don't have much confidence in yourself. Many a client complains of being "stuck," going around in circles and getting nowhere, of not being heard or heeded, of not accomplishing anything, of not living the life that they want.

Personal empowerment begins with the self. At its most basic, empowerment means "becoming powerful." Everyone has strengths and weaknesses (aka "growing edges") and a range of skills used in everyday situations, but often people remain unaware of, or undervalue, their true self and personal abilities. Empowerment is about looking at who you are and becoming more aware of yourself as a unique individual. It involves developing the confidence and strength to set realistic goals and pursue them with determination. As we discover and reflect on our values, skills and goals in our counseling conversations, and as we adjust our behaviors in order to achieve our goals, we grow in self-awareness, self-esteem and self-confidence. We get "unstuck" and are free to "get somewhere"!

Being "enabled" involves outside control; it is the antithesis of "empowered." It is true that a newborn baby must be enabled to survive. But the wise parent brings a child from a place of enablement into maturity as an empowered human being. Empowered people are able to care for themselves in relational community; are aware of self and others; create their own goals; want to change and believe they can; and act on choices freely made with all the consequences, risks and rewards that follow. "You will receive power..." (Acts 1:8) is a promise from God that we can embrace. Knowing ourselves free and valued before God, and through the special "education" that therapy avails, we can say with St. Paul, "I can do all things through Christ who empowers (strengthens) me" (Philippians 4:13). On that empowerment ladder, whatever our goal, we'll own it, initiate it, build it, maintain it and grow it!
