REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2019

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 September 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The objects of the Company are for the benefit of the public:

- to advance the Christian faith in accordance with the Statement in such ways and in such parts of the United Kingdom or the world as the directors from time to time may think fit;
- to relieve sickness and financial hardship and to promote and preserve good health by the provision of funds, goods or services of any kind including through the provision of counselling and support in such parts of the United Kingdom or the world as the directors from time to time think fit, and;
- to advance education in such ways and in such parts of the United Kingdom or the world as the directors from time to time may think fit.

Significant activities

The Trustees are satisfied with the progress made during the year in furthering the objectives of the Charity. The Church has continued to welcome new worshippers to services during the year. They are grateful to acknowledge that the Church is in a healthy position both financially and relationally. There has been a strong emphasis on prayer, community and mission, focusing upon our purpose as a Christian Church.

All Nations is seeking to be fruitful in all areas in the coming year, particularly in continuing to develop Life Groups as the primary context for Christian discipleship and outreach to care for the spiritual and physical needs of the communities in which members live.

The Prayer Hub has continued to remain open six days a week, 24 hours a day for members and other Christians to take part in corporate prayer and we regard this as a significant underpinning of the life of the church. We acknowledge with gratitude the considerable sacrifice on the part of many of the prayer leaders.

During the year under review, three new church planting initiatives were begun. The new campus in Telford has met regularly for public worship since March 2019 and has grown to an average attendance of 180 on a Sunday with other significant activities in Life Groups and prayer. The partnership with Eden in the Whitmore Reans area has impacted positively a number of people with various social and health issues. The team focused on Highfields, Stafford, has gathered a number of local people with them and are meeting mainly informally in Life Groups, so the church can become established in the community before regular public meetings for Sunday worship.

The wider ministry of All Nations with churches and ministers who wish to belong to the All Nations family, a relational network, has grown in scale and significance. All Nations Movement was registered as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation on 7 May 2019 to facilitate this work. At present it operates in very close partnership with the church but the trustees plan to transfer the relevant part of the operations to that charity as soon as it has sufficient funding to carry on the activities.

COVID-19

In March 2020 the church took steps (in line with government advice) to help contain the outbreak of COVID-19. This included the temporary suspension of all public gatherings. However we have been able to continue operating through our Life Groups using informal contacts and/or online media. Sunday services have been live-streamed and have attracted significantly more viewers than previous attendances. The trustees are monitoring income and expenditure and, if it becomes necessary, will take measures to mitigate the impact of COVID-19 on the charity's finances.

Public benefit

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 4 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit "Charities and Public Benefit".

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Contributions from Volunteers

The Charity is dependent on the generous support of its volunteers in terms of giving time, money and prayer. The Trustees and the Leadership Team are extremely grateful to the All Nations Church family for their continued and generous support of the work of God through All Nations.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Report of the Senior Pastor

I am very pleased to report, first and foremost, the goodness of the Lord towards us has enabled All Nations to touch the lives of thousands of people. We are seeking to make our public and other, informal meetings contexts for the presence of God to be experienced more and more. We continue to hold services in English, Punjabi and Cantonese at the Hub in Wolverhampton city centre and to include a wide variety of ethnic groups. Our campuses are developing well in several other locations. We have made a decision to wait until late 2020 before we plant any new congregations. This ensures that we are not over stretching ourselves both financially and with volunteers.

Campuses

We operate as several services at the Hub in Wolverhampton city centre and a small number of campuses, i.e. local congregations. These are all part of the charity and governed by the leadership and trustees of All Nations church.

Grace church in Pensnett has grown in regular attendances this year and moved to new premises leased from the local authority, which have enabled the congregation to function more effectively. The congregation worked hard and gave generously to enable the premises to be made suitable for use.

The campus in Gornal, Straits Community Church, changed its name to Bridge Church during the year, to reflect its growing strength and identity. New developments include activities for children and carers in the local community including children with learning disabilities.

We are excited that a new campus in Stafford is making good progress. We are deliberately focusing on meeting informally in the Highfields community while the team is forming.

The partnership with The Message Trust for an Eden project enables us to deploy a team in a particular area of Wolverhampton with significant social needs. This has prompted a number of our members in the Wolverhampton hub to help with visiting and prayer in the area. The Eden project is a joint initiative but governance is by All Nations' leadership team and trustees and is intended to become a campus.

Each of the three new initiatives has a different style and format but the same vision and values, as we are working hard to ensure the same culture in all expressions of All Nations.

The largest new campus is in Telford and we are pleased that the congregation has grown to 180 since commencement of public worship in March 2019. The life of the campus, expressed in Life Groups and a commitment to corporate prayer, has continued to strengthen and we are blessed by the number of committed volunteers devoting great effort. We are focusing on growing leaders and prayerfully considering how best to develop the work in the town and region beyond the space limitations of the leased premises.

Three campuses are based at the main hub site in Wolverhampton, the largest being the Punjabi speaking congregation, which has continued to grow in maturity though numbers are steady at present. The Chinese congregation is increasingly stable with a core of members based permanently in the area, but we still welcome many students and academics who are in the city only for a few months or a year. The GEM congregation for adults with learning disabilities meets for a weekly disco which gives opportunities for prayer and proclaiming the gospel as well as Life Groups and for prayer.

Youth

The youth work has held steady and stable over the past year and experienced some times of spiritual refreshing as well as friendship, games and teaching. It has been wonderful to see many young people being involved in wider Church life, including worship, media, creative teams and many other areas too. I am encouraged by the many signs of spiritual life among our young people.

Community

Many church members show compassion in their neighbourhoods and we encourage our small groups, Life Groups, in particular to be missional and to find creative ways of showing the love of God among friends, neighbours and colleagues. Other community outreaches included opening the Hub building at Christmas for outreaches to families with children and providing Christmas presents for children with little or no family support. The outreaches into some local prisons have grown in scale and many inmates or former inmates have benefitted from the compassion shown and from Christian worship and teaching. Many have made a first time commitment to Christ and we are seeking to help them in their discipleship.

Increasingly we see Frontline Youth and the Life Groups as the main vehicles for care of the vulnerable and marginalised in our neighbourhoods. At the time of writing the world is struggling to deal with the impact of the virus COVID-19 and I am pleased to hear many reports of church members supporting people in their neighbourhoods.

Life Groups

Life groups have been going since 2013 and the simple vision is to gather in smaller, Christ centred groups that are relational, transformational and missional. Special thanks and acknowledgement are due to all of our Life Group leaders who serve the Church family so faithfully. Life Group leaders are essential to the success of any group and we have a growing group of leaders who are providing front line pastoral support as well as facilitating discipleship and mission. Some of the Life Groups have continued to provide food and other support for marginalised people or visiting the housebound elderly.

Even though it is hard for many of the Life Groups to meet altogether at this time, with precautions against COVID-19 recently imposed, the signs are that the church community is developing through smaller, informal connections.

The team of Area Pastors are responsible for overseeing and encouraging Life Groups in seven geographical areas and and among students. We continue to encourage all who consider All Nations their church family to be part of a Life Group, and this is especially important at a time when the Sunday services have been suspended to comply with the Government's health advice.

Leadership and Pastoral Teams

Esther and I are very grateful to our Leadership team and Area Pastors. They have done an outstanding job of supporting us in clarifying vision/direction and developing/mentoring leaders. We are blessed with mature, spiritual people in these teams and other volunteers in the church, who have in many instances given sacrificially of themselves and their time to serve the needs of others. It is always a challenge with a growing Church to make sure everyone is connected, but as we all help each other I believe the task is made easier.

Since the year under review we have again reviewed our leadership and operational structures with a view to ensuring they facilitate current and future growth. This has meant some reorganisation of responsibilities for the small team of paid staff and the vast number of volunteers. A group of "Sphere Leads" head each ministry area or staff team and I am grateful for their diligence in providing leadership. We are committed both for theological reasons and for practical, organisational reasons to developing more people to carry weight in the activities of All Nations.

Staff

I am particularly grateful for all the hard work of volunteers and staff that have made possible all our outreach, discipleship and service to so many people. All our paid and regular volunteer staff are committed to the vision and work extremely hard to fulfil it, and I want to express heartfelt thanks to them all.

Leadership Development

I have been very conscious of our need to prepare for growth by developing people. We continue our efforts in growing, equipping and releasing leaders. The NextGen programme has continued and we have continued running a new programme called Apprentice which provides coaching and equipping for a small group of emerging ministries as listed in Ephesians 4:11.

There is continued focus on developing a small number of leaders who can pioneer or pastor campuses. With this in mind, we announced in late March 2020 a more comprehensive leadership training and discipleship programme for the future. All these training initiatives are delivered with a mix of theological training, practical experience and a relational environment in a small group for well rounded ministry formation.

Influence outside Wolverhampton and the surrounding areas

We have seen our influence continue to grow in a number of other nations and we are seeking to help pastors and apostles in a number of places who relate to the All Nations family. I have made visits in the past year particularly to the USA, North India and to Myanmar.

I continue to broadcast on daily radio with United Christian Broadcasters. Also a number of my TV programmes are being aired regularly on TBN TV channel too. There is a constant flow of reports of lives being touched and encouraged through the programming we offer. I recently stepped down as a member of the Board of the Evangelical Alliance due to the other demands on time, but I continue to be a Council member and to participate in the One People Commission and the South Asian Forum. This is a great honour and offers a wider perspective for All Nations and also enables our voice to shape and serve others across the nation. There has been a continued input into various churches and events among many different denominations and networks in our country.

All Nations Movement

It has been particularly encouraging to see a small family of churches begin to grow around All Nations. Various pastors and churches have begun to relate with me and my team in various ways ranging from occasional meetings for mentoring to an active commitment to shared vision and working as part of All Nations. For some, this means little more than attending our quarterly "Fuel the Fire" leaders days. Others also take part in our Network days, open to leaders of churches in the All Nations family (or considering building friendship with the family). They are also open to trans-local ministries who want to benefit from apostolic connection and the mutual encouragement and friendship that a relational network makes possible.

A separate charity has been formed to give focus and sufficient oversight and governance to the Movement, without diverting the local church from its prime calling and activities in Wolverhampton and the surrounding areas. It is expected that part of the activities will be legally transferred to the new charity as soon as it has sufficient funding in place.

The Movement is in its early stages but I believe it is in response to God's calling on me and on All Nations that we are building a connection on the basis of relationship rather than as an organisation. I am particularly encouraged that a number of those exploring links are from a different theological perspective and denominational background, as we value unity in Christ highly as part of our preparation for revival in the nation.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

It is the Trustees' view that it is prudent to ensure that there are sufficient funds to provide financial flexibility over the course of the forthcoming challenges. The Trustees aim to hold two months running costs (currently approximately \pounds 134,000) in unrestricted reserves. The balance on unrestricted reserves at the year end was \pounds 343,619 which includes \pounds 270,193 relating to fixed assets. Therefore the balance on free reserves is \pounds 73,426. The Trustees are seeking to raise the level of free reserves by increasing donations and, where it doesn't impact on the work of the charity, reduce costs.

The Trustees consider the financial performance of the Company to be satisfactory.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Building fund

A balance of £906,837 (2018: £966,750) is held in the restricted Building fund which is now represented by the cost of the property less the related mortgage.

The Statement of Financial Activities shows total incoming resources for the year of £832,266 (2018: £849,764) and net incoming/(outgoing) resources of $\pounds(52,337)$ (2018: $\pounds133,662$). The majority of the expenditure is direct charitable expenditure - particularly salaries, missions, and evangelical outreach.

The total funds held at the year end were £1,388,423 (2018: £1,440,760).

FUTURE PLANS

I believe the coming year will build on the strength of the work of the last few years and we will go from strength to strength. Psalm 11.3 says 'if the foundations are destroyed what can the righteous do.' Foundations are important but they take time and care to build right. That is what we have been doing not just spiritually but in all the administrative, financial and legal side of things to do. Those healthy foundations now allow us to build upon them and the new building project is a picture of what is happening spiritually and organisationally.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 2 July 2007 and registered as a charity. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objectives and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association as amended by special resolution on 22 July 2010. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

Recruitment and appointment of new members and trustees

As set out in the Articles of Association persons may be admitted to membership of the Company provided that they:

- have by grace exhibited saving faith in the Lord Jesus Christ,
- have desired to worship and serve God in the context of the Statement,
- are committed to promoting the Objects, and
- are nominated by the Senior Minister and approved by the majority of the members.

Friends and Associates of the Company may also be appointed by the directors if they think they are fit to be admitted. Friends and Associates do not have the right to speak or vote at general meetings of the Company.

The directors of the Company are the charity Trustees. The Board of Directors comprises of the Senior Minister of the Church, together with such persons as the Senior Minister nominates and the directors appoint. A minimum of three directors should serve on the Board. Directors are not required to retire by rotation.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Organisational structure

The Senior Pastor, Steve Uppal, retains oversight of all church matters, but works with and is accountable to the Trustees and Leadership Team.

Trustees meet formally normally four times a year to discuss all financial and legal matters concerning the charity but also have regular dialogue in conversation and by email. The Trustees are Angela Foster, Chris Green, Israel Moyo and Steve Uppal (Chairman).

The Leadership Team are the Senior Pastor, Manuel and Hannah Heinke, Chris and Catherine Horton, Dave and Jet Jones, Simon and Abi Lloydbottom and Esther Uppal. They oversee and lead all spiritual matters relating to the Church.

The small team of paid staff meets regularly with some of the Leadership Team. The staff team facilitate and implement their strategic direction through taking responsibility for:

- Management of interns and volunteers in key areas providing infrastructure for the church's activities
- Health and Safety
- Buildings and plant
- Administration and smooth running of the office to facilitate the vision of All Nations Church and Movement
- Media and Communications
- Business activities and contracts including developing revenue from conference activities
- Events Sunday meetings, conferences and any other meetings or events in the life of All Nations Church or Movement
- Financial management
- Compliance with legal and regulatory requirements

Following a change in structures during the year (effective June 2019) all staff and senior volunteers report to one of the "Sphere Leads" who are all members of the Leadership team and oversee various spheres or areas of ministry and operations. They are currently Esther Uppal, Manuel Heinke, Dave Jones and Simon Lloydbottom.

We also have a Pastoral Team in place who help disciple and care for the community of believers at All Nations. The Pastoral Team consists of:

This team's primary function is to help provide care and discipleship to All Nations Family through overseeing, supporting and developing Life group leaders. They have had a positive and growing influence on the church community and are becoming established in leading much of the pastoral ministry.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Induction and training of new trustees

Trustees are usually active members of All Nations Church but are encouraged to familiarise themselves with the Company's policies and operations and also with Charity Commission guidance. The Company Secretary provides advice on governance and the staff team provide information as needed.

Risk management

The Trustees review the major risks to which the charity is exposed and strategies are developed to mitigate these risks. The Trustees are particularly aware of the risks associated with the scale of the premises owned or occupied and the numbers attending services, particularly in a city centre location.

Internal risks are minimised by the implementation of proper processes and procedures. These procedures are regularly reviewed to ensure they remain appropriate.

Governance arrangements

The trustees adopted 'Good Governance: a code for the voluntary and community sector' and has reviewed all the governance arrangements, including the composition of the teams of leaders, volunteers and paid staff, and how they communicate and work together. The trustees have also considered how these may need to be changed and added to, as the scale of operations grows and there are increasing numbers of people involved in All Nations Church and the Movement.

The trustees have reviewed the Memorandum and articles of association of the company, now that the church is no longer a member of the Assemblies of God movement. They consider there is no need to make changes as the only reference to the Assemblies is to their Statement of faith and the trustees and leadership of the church remains in harmony with the Statement.

Independent examiner's report to the trustees of All Nations Christian Centre (Wolverhampton) ('the Company')

I report to the charity trustees on my examination of the accounts of the Company for the year ended 30 September 2019.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property	-	2% on cost
Improvements to property	-	10% on cost
Plant and machinery	-	25% on reducing balance
Fixtures and fittings	-	20% on reducing balance
Computer equipment	-	25% on reducing balance

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Description, nature and purpose of the restricted funds

Building fund - A restricted fund for all income and expenditure relating to our property acquisition and building project.

Missions - A restricted fund for all income and expenditure relating to mission work, including REACH. REACH stands for Reaching Every Adult and Child Holistically and supports a project that works with vulnerable families in India.

Spiwe - A restricted fund to support a vulnerable member of the Church.

Grace Building Fund - A restricted fund for the purpose of building improvements at Grace Church. The balance represents the net book value of assets purchased with these funds.

Straits Community Church - A restricted fund held to be used only for mission activities or a building project for the benefit of the S traits and surrounding area as agreed by the Straits Campus Pastor and leadership team.

Whitmore Reans Community Project - A restricted fund to support community work in the Whitmore Reans area of Wolverhampton.

Community Worker Telford - A restricted fund to support community work in the Telford area.

Transfers between funds

£36,656 was transferred from the General fund to the Building fund to cover mortgage repayments in excess of funds held. The balance represents cash at bank and fixed assets less the mortgage in relation to the property.

 \pounds 1,414 was transferred from the General fund to the Missions fund to cover expenditure in excess of funds held. The balance represents cash at bank.

 \pounds 1,418 was transferred from the Spiwe fund to the General fund to cover expenditure made out of general funds. The balance represents cash at bank.
