

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ, (With thoughts from Jeremiah 29: 1-14)

As I write this month's note, we are approaching Independence Day and the celebration of America's 244<sup>th</sup> birthday. In just those few years, there is so much history to celebrate. So many events good and bad our country has endured. So much to be proud of and ashamed of. History is like that for all countries.

I think birthdays are a day to stop and look back at accomplishments and blessings through the years. It is also a day to look forward. But for many, that is a scary thing to do with the COVID 19 pandemic, the protest and racial tensions, economic set-backs and possible reclosing of businesses, escalating numbers of coronavirus, farm crisis, and uncertainty about opening schools and churches, to name just a few concerns today.

It can be a time of great fear and anxiety.

But during these difficult times, God tells you, "11 For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the LORD, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope." (Jer 29:11)

Jeremiah knew a little bit about fear and anxiety living through difficult circumstances while trapped in Jerusalem as it was being destroyed by the Babylonians. There were false prophets saying God would send a miracle to save them and those who failed to realize the judgment of God was upon them.

Jeremiah was offering them hope telling them to make the most of life during this time of exile. To pray for peace for the nation because when those who oppose you are at peace and prosper, you also will have peace and prosper.

He also warned against listening to the wrong voices telling them to stick it out for the long-haul looking to the long-term goal of reward for the faithful, rather than immediate gratification, which Paul emphasised in 2 Corinthians 4: 16-18: "<sup>16</sup>So we do not lose heart. Though our outer self is wasting away, our inner self his being renewed day by day. <sup>17</sup>For this light momentary affliction is preparing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, <sup>18</sup>as we look not to the things that are seen but to the things that are unseen. For the things that are seen are transient, but the things that are unseen are eternal."

Jeremiah's message was to live in hope because God has a plan for you. Unfortunately, we don't know that plan. Or maybe it is fortunate we do not, because if we did, if we knew when the tragedy would strike us or our family, we might not be able to endure it. The hope we live in is in God's words which say, "... plans for your welfare and not for harm..."

We often do not understand how plans for our welfare can mean enduring hardship or struggle or even that we may suffer great loss. God gives us free will to make choices. When we make the wrong choices or the evil of this world throws us down into a pit, those difficult times of sadness and pain can use it for good to bring us closer to Him so our reward is heavenly and not eternal damnation. Because in times like this Jeremiah says:

"12 Then when you call upon me and come and pray to me, I will hear you. 13 When you search for me, you will find me; if you seek me with all your heart, 14 I will let you find me, says the LORD, and I will restore your fortunes and gather you from all the nations and all the places where I have driven you, says the LORD, and I will bring you back to the place from which I sent you into exile." (Jer 29:12-14)

God does not want you to suffer through this time of trial alone but wants you to turn to Him, seek Him out, hear His word, know the grace and love He has for you, and the promise of forgiveness and eternal life.

Even in this time of suspended worship, you are invited to receive Christ into your life as your Savior, to know His love for you to make you righteous through His actions on the cross, and to live in the promise of resurrection because God rose Christ from the dead, you too shall rise in a resurrection like His.

Christ will never abandon you. Christ loves you, died for you and waits for you to come to Him and accept the beautiful name He calls you... Child of God... Brothers and Sister in Christ... Heirs to the Kingdom.

If you are struggling, if you are in need of words of hope, the church is open to you for prayer, to meet with the pastor, to just sit and talk about your questions, your doubts and your concerns.

Don't hesitate to reach out to your church family, or to me, for we are the church together.

#### **ITEMS:**

**Financial Report**: Cindy Vander Leest reported the monthly income to the general fund was \$36,416 the weekly average giving was \$5,753 and the weekly worship attendance was 324 (includes drive-in service, views on Facebook and Youtube). 5 worship services, lead the Blessing of the Motorcycles, lead a wedding at the Country Road Barn, wrote a Public Opinion article, wrote the Gleanings, Zoomed 4 Bible Studies, Zoomed 4 Confirmation student classes, attended 2 Council meetings, attended and lead Pastoral Zoom sessions, attended online 2020 Festival of Homiletics, made 4 weekly bulletins and recorded 30 daily readings w/Martin Luther to upload on Facebook. Pastor Cheryl introduced, Nancy McClanahan to the Council members. Pastor Cheryl will be helping Nancy with CPE requirements to become a Pastor. Nancy will by leading Sunday, June 21, 2020 service while Pastor visits her sons in Minnesota.

#### GRACE LUTHERAN CHURCH'S RESPONSE TO COVID 19

#### SUGGESTED STEPS ATTENDEES ARE TO TAKE TO BE SAFE AS WE COME TOGETHER

- 1. Frequently <u>wash hands</u> with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not readily available use hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol.
- 2. Cover coughs and sneezes with a tissue or use the inside of your elbow.
- 3. Wear a face mask for your protection and ours.
- 4. Stay home when sick or you just don't feel quite right. Worship is available online and on KWAT.
- 5. Stay home if you are immunocompromised. You can ask for home communion or a pastoral visit. Worship is available online and on KWAT at 10:05 AM Sunday morning and at drive-in worship.
- 6. Family members who frequently interact may sit together. All others should maintain 6 feet physical distancing. (If you both reach out to the side your fingers should not touch.)
- 7. Please do not sit in the balcony as the airborne virus could drop on those below.
- 8. Pews will be marked off to leave every other pew open between you and the next group. Stagger where you sit so some are on one end of the pew and others to the other end.
- 9. Each person using a hearing device will use the wipes provided to wash them down after use.
- 10. There will be NO singing by the congregation. Song leader(s) will stand behind the piano or platform to provide music for the service. There will be no hymns and the words will not be added into the Power-Point. This is to respect your neighbor's safety as viruses are airborne and can be passed further by those singing.
- 11. Take your temperature at home prior to coming. If you have a temperature, please do not come.

#### STEPS WE WILL TAKE TO BE SAFE AS WE COME TOGETHER

- 1. The sanctuary and public areas of the church have been cleaned.
- 2. Public areas used will be cleaned once a week between services or other activities.
- 3. Other areas will be cleaned when used for group meeting on the calendar or approved by the business administrator.
- 4. Our custodian is part-time, cleaning is done weekly, and scheduling is required to use other areas of the building.
- 5. If you come midweek to pray, do not touch anything as you enter the sanctuary and please use the front pew. Wash your hands or use hand sanitizer as you arrive and leave. Hand sanitizer and wipes will be available in the front pew to use and to wipe down the pew when you are finished.
- 6. Only a few bulletins will be printed for those who have difficulty seeing the screens. Take them with you when you leave and dispose of them at home.
- 7. Announcements will be available in the pew. Please take them with you and disposed of at home.
- 8. When worship has ended, you will be dismissed by the usher one group at a time to maintain physical distancing. Please directly leave the building without mingling.
- 9. We will not serve coffee hours, fellowship meals, or other food related celebrations at this time.
- 10. We ask that you wear a face mask for your protection and ours.
- 11. The pastor will leave through the chancel area at the end of the service.

GUIDELINE FOR REPORTING: If you come down with COVID 19 Symptoms, or are diagnosed with COVID 19, and have been at worship or in our church building, within the two weeks prior to your illness, you are responsible to contact the church office at 605-886-5737. Your name will not be shared but we must protect all our members and notify them.

1. When we are informed someone who was at worship has symptoms of COVID, we will notify the congregation to encourage caution. We will return to drive-in worship in the parking lot only. Online worship is available or can be listened to on KWAT.

2. When it is verified someone at worship has been diagnosed with COVID, we will close for two weeks (14 days) following diagnosis and return to drive-in worship in the parking lot only. Online worship is available or can be listened to on KWAT.

#### WHEN SOMEONE WAS AT WORSHIP AND HAS BEEN DIAGNOSED WITH COVID 19

- 1. We will close for two weeks following their diagnosis. We will return to drive-in worship in the parking lot. Online worship will be uploaded to Facebook and YouTube and a recording can be heard on KWAT at 10:05 AM Sunday mornings.
- 2. To protect our custodian, cleaning will not be done during the first 7 days.
- 3. When we verify someone was at worship and has contracted symptoms of COVID, we will notify the congregation on Facebook and the Website to encourage caution. We will return to drive-in worship in the parking lot. Online worship will be uploaded, and a recording can be heard on KWAT at 10:05 AM Sunday mornings.
- 4. Let us know if you want to be on our prayer list.

#### **EXPECT CHANGES IN HOW WE WORSHIP**

- 1. Video worship post will continue online even after we reopen to in-person worship. Weekly services will be recorded, so online worship might not be available until later on Sundays. We will continue to post worship on Facebook and YouTube. You can also connect through our website at glcwtn.org. Our radio broadcast on KWAT will continue to be heard at 10:05 AM each Sunday morning.
- 2. Liturgy will be said and not sung. We will still have prayers, scripture and preaching.
- 3. There will be NO hand shaking or hugs. This is because we love you. God's peace will still be given during the worship but please greet each other with a nod, bow, or wave from your pew.
- 4. Offering plates will not be passed. You may give your offering when you come in for worship at the back of the church or by the elevator. You may also send your offering to the office at 202 2<sup>nd</sup> St SE, Watertown, SD 57201-4308, or give electronically. We will dedicate the gifts given during worship.

#### USHERS AND GREETERS DUTIES

- 1. Wear a mask.
- 2. Offer a mask to anyone who does not have one with them.
- 3. Please have someone at each door to open the door for those arriving.
- 4. Welcome people and explain the pews are marked off and they are to sit in every other pew and stagger to one end of the pew opposite those in front of them if possible.
- 5. Explain there is no congregational singing as the reason for no hymn books or PowerPoint song words.
- 6. Thank people for worshipping and remind them NOT to shake hands.
- 7. Be sure hand sanitizer is available and can be seen easily.
- 8. Place announcements in the pew for people and remind them to take them home to dispose of.
- 9. Have bulletins available for those who require them.
- 10. Do not pass the offering nor bring it forward. Direct people to where it is located.
- 11. To usher people out, leave plenty of space between groups. Only one usher is needed at this time to dismiss people in groups observing the need for physical distance to exit the steps.
- 12. If possible, hold doors for those leaving worship also or block them open.
- 13. The security committee will provide someone to watch for any who refuse to comply with guidelines and be ready to protect members and pastor from those who do not comply.
- 14. Pastor and musicians will exit the chancel area and leave from the chancel doors.

#### **Bathrooms**

- 1. Post handwashing reminders in bathrooms.
- 2. Place trash bin in hallway outside bathroom for disposing of paper towels.

3. Encourage people to use a clean paper towel to handle the doorknobs as they leave.

#### STATEMENT ON COMMUNION

This statement on holy communion is taken from "Holy Communion Practices and Variations in times of Pandemic" written by the South Dakota ELCA Synod task force. - The early Lutheran Reformers argued that administering holy communion was about more than "doing it right."

In their debates with what they refer to as the "Sacramentarians," the Lutheran reformers vigorously argued against the notion that only certain people are worthy of receiving Holy Communion; and also against the belief that receiving holy communion required specific types of preparation (Epitome VII.16-18). As a consequence, they claimed:

"We believe, teach, and confess that no genuine believer, no matter how weak he may be, as long as he retains a living faith, will receive the Holy Supper to his condemnation, for Christ instituted this Supper particularly for Christians who are weak in faith but repentant, to confront them and to strengthen their weak faith.

"We believe, teach, and confess that the entire worthiness of the guests at this heavenly feast is and consists solely and alone in the most holy obedience and complete merit of Christ, which we make through our own genuine faith and of which we are assured through the sacrament. Worthiness consists not at all in our own virtues or in our internal and external preparations." (Epitome, VII.9-10) During communion, walk with your group to the front leaving 6 feet between you and other groups. Please practice safe physical distancing as you come forward to receive the elements. Let the ushers direct you.

#### WHEN WE GATHER FOR HOLY COMMUNION

Communion will be held twice a month. God is not only in the church building, but is everywhere. Martin Luther wrote in the Formula of Concord (article VII, Affirmative Theses 5:14) "God has and knows various modes of being at a given place, and not only the single mode which the philosophers call *local* or spatial."

#### We will take the following steps for Holy Communion at Drive-In (Parking Lot) worship.

- 1. Worship is live streamed by radio into the parking lot where worshipers remain in their cars but share the same place and time. The presiding minister of word and sacrament is visible, and they can hear the words of institution.
- 2. Worshipers can bring their own bread and juice/wine. When available, prepacked communion elements may be provided. Watch Facebook for information if they are available.
- 3. When available, ushers will provide prepacked elements when entering the parking lot. Communion elements will not be distributed to cars during the service.
- 4. Please do not get out of your car during the service.
- 5. If you or your child/ren would like to receive a blessing, you may carefully drive up to the platform following the service and the pastor will give a blessing. Please remain in your car.

#### We will take the following steps for Holy Communion when we gather for inside worship.

- 1. Worshipers will remain in their pews for the communion distribution.
- 2. The pastor and assistant(s) will walk to your pew and serve you there.
- 3. Pastor and assistant(s) will wash hands before coming forward (or use hand sanitizer)
- 4. Pastor and assistant(s) will wear masks.
- 5. Gloves will be used to serve the elements.
- 6. Cups in the trays will be placed in every other space. The assistant will hand the cup to you taking ahold of the top of the cup. Please take ahold of the cup from the bottom without touching.
- 7. Wafers will be dropped into your hands with a tong. Please cup your hands together so the wafer can be

- dropped into them.
- 8. Blessing will be given with a hand extended over you but there will be no laying of hands or touching. Communion assistant(s) will be served after the congregation.

## We will provide the following steps for Holy Communion when worshipers are unable leave their home.

- 1. Worshipers are invited to join via an online platform by phone using a conference call for an audio service or face-to-face via screen sharing using zoom or a similar media source. (Alternative could be the presiding leads liturgy and words of institution through a window.)
- 2. Worshiper gathers their own bread and fruit of the vine. (No elements are passed through a window.)
- 3. Presider leads a liturgy of holy communion.
- 4. When the elements are normally distributed, the presider invites worshipers to eat and drink using the proper language.
- 5. Worshiper will eat and drink when the presider gives the words: "The body of Christ, given for you," and "The blood of Christ, shed for you."

Alternative: Fasting from Holy Communion: "Throughout history, faithful Christians have fasted from Holy Communion, including during times of plague and pandemic. It is an acceptable and faithful until the body of faith can once again safely gather in person around the altar. We trust that God's redemptive Word, and God's grace and mercy will be extended to us in other ways through the Holy Spirit during this time of fasting. Use this time to emphasize remembrance of baptism, and develop a special in-home ritual." (*Taken from "Holy Communion Practices and Variations in times of Pandemic" written by the SD ELCA Synod task force.*)

#### **SETTING UP FOR COMMUNION**

- 1. Wash your hands before touching anything. Get all items out and open, wash hands again. Space cups at least every other space and fill.
- 2. Put the wafers on the plate with the tongs.
- 3. Put the covers on the containers or cover with Napkins or paper towels.
- 4. Put out enough gloves and masks for those handling wafers with the communion equipment.
- 5. Be sure hand sanitizer is available
