INTRODUCTION

Practically speaking, rules are often the centerpiece of religious life. Many people think the Ten Commandments are rules that make a relationship with God possible. If you follow the rules, God will be happy. If you don't, he won't. **But what if a relationship with God doesn't depend on our obedience**? When it comes to your relationship with God, what is the role of rules?

LISTENING GUIDE

Faith Has a Starting Point.

- Every religion has a set of <u>rules</u> and a <u>rule-maker</u>.
 (5 Pillars of Islam, 10 Commandments, Sermon on the Mount)
- Rules always assume a relationship.
- Family Model: your parents set the rules the family.
 You don't keep the rules to <u>become</u> part of the family,
 you keep the rules <u>because</u> your a part of the family.
- Club Model: you agree to keep a set of rules to get into the club and to stay in the club. If you keep the rules you're in . . . if you break the rules you're out.
- **Neighborhood**: you <u>never know</u> where you stand.

Ten Commandments. (1446 BC)

- Abraham > Ishmael > Arab Nations
- Abraham > Isaac > Jacob > 12 Sons > Nation of Israel

- Joseph moves to Egypt as a slave but eventually becomes the prime minister of Egypt.
- Nation of Israel: spent 400 years in slavery to Egypt.
- Moses says to Egyptian Pharaoh, "Let my people GO!"
 Pharaoh said, "NO" . . . so God sent the 10 Plagues.
- Moses leads people of Israel out of <u>slavery</u> and into the <u>desert</u>.
- Nation of Israel hadn't know freedom in 400 years and didn't have a <u>set of laws</u> to govern their nation of 2 million people.
- God met with Moses on the top of Mt. Sinai to give him the
 10 Commandments a set of laws for the nation to live by.

Exodus 20:1-3

And God spoke all these words: "I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of Egypt, out of the land of slavery."

God was saying, "TRUST ME."

First Commandment: "You shall have no other gods before me."

The Ten Commandments were a <u>confirmation</u> of, not a <u>condition</u> of, Israel's relationship with God.

With God, relationship precedes rules.

The Rules are <u>confirmation</u> of, not a <u>condition</u> of, a relationship with God.

A relationship with God is based on the Family Model.

Q: What if God plays <u>favorites</u>?

Q: What if the standard isn't <u>clear</u>?

Q: How good is good enough?

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Exodus 18:18

"All the nations of the earth will be blessed through you."

Isaiah 49:6

"I will also make you a light for the Gentiles, that my salvation Mary reach to the ends of the earth."

John 1:12

- 4. Is it easier to see God as a rule maker or a parent with boundaries? Why?
- 5. What would change if you really saw yourself as a child of God?
- 6. Have you entered a relationship with God through the door of faith or have you been trying to behave your way in?

MOVING FORWARD

You can find out a lot about a person by the rules he or she imposes. They tell you <u>what</u> the person values. They tell you <u>who</u> the person values. This is true of God's rules too. They're not a condition for relationship with him, they're confirmation of that relationship. They provide us with a framework for healthy relationships with God and others. His motive is one of provision and protection for the people he loves.
