MATTHEW 4:12-22



Little is known about Jesus' childhood. The stories of the Bible fast-forward to the time when He began His ministry around the age of thirty. His message was simple-the kingdom God promised is here, now turn from your sin and follow Me. Jesus pursued an assortment of men and invited them to follow Him in a special way. This group, known as the disciples, journeyed with Jesus over the next three years. They watched as Jesus preached about His kingdom and demonstrated His great power. They even had the privilege of representing Jesus by doing powerful acts as well. The first step for the disciples was a simple act of faith. God called them, and they responded by willingly leaving behind their old lives to follow Jesus. God continues to call men and women to give up their comfort, power, money, position, or anything else that might hinder them from wholeheartedly following after Him.

MATTHEW 16:24-28















The disciples received some challenging words from Jesus as they followed Him. He made it clear that He is to be the most important part of people's lives. Nothing, not even burying a dead relative, is to be more important than Jesus. Everything else pales in comparison to loving Jesus and doing what He says. This is not simply true for the disciples, it's also true for anyone who wants to follow Jesus, including you and me. Jesus said that all those who want to follow Him must die to their selfish desires in order to follow Him. A cross is an appropriate picture for the life of those who love Jesus. Not only did Jesus die on the cross, but all those who follow Jesus in faith must also die to themselves in order to live the life God desires.

JOHN 1:35-51



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John truly recognized Jesus. In this time in history, there was no shortage of religious leaders seeking young followers. Rabbis, or teachers, were very common, but Jesus was different than other rabbis of His day. He was not simply a good, religious teacher-He was the Lamb of God! John's description makes sense after we've seen God's plan through the Old Testament sacrificial system. The Israelites were required to offer a perfect lamb as a substitute for their sins, and that lamb would die in their place. The problem with the old way was, as we have seen, that the people had to continually offer these sacrifices because they kept sinning. Jesus came as a final sacrifice, the perfect Lamb to atone for the sins of His people forever. Everyone who follows Jesus knows Him, like John did, as the Lamb of God who takes away their sin.

ROMANS 1:1-7



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Jesus didn't only call the twelve disciples to follow Him, there were hundreds of other followers with Him during His ministry. This included many of those He healed, a host of women, and a few prominent apostles. And a list of those who followed Jesus does not stop there. Paul wrote that the church was filled with those who followed Jesus. They began their journey of faith in much the same way as the first disciple-called by God. Those who live after Jesus' earthly ministry aren't called in exactly the same way-we don't see Jesus or hear His voice the way the first disciples did. Yet God still speaks to us through His Word and calls us to belong to Him. Those who respond to this call by faith are saved. Paul went further to say he was called in a unique way to take the message of the gospel to those who hadn't yet heard. Like Paul, Christians are called to faith in Jesus that we would share the good news of His work to a lost world.
