Where are we in the historical context of Israel?
When we get to the New Testament it has been over 500 years since the Israelites
have heard a word from God. The last event was recorded in Nehemiah 13:4-30
and the last prophecy recorded in the Old Testament came from the book of . Although the voice of God was silent, the hand of God was
actively directing the course of events during these centuries. During this time of
silence there were four periods to take note of:
#Persian period (539-336 B.C. 203 years) King Cyrus freed the Israelites from
captivity; rebuilt the temple; Jews began gathering in local synagogues where the
focus was on studying the law. Israelites came in conflict with Samaritans;
Samaritans intermarry with and adopt customs. While Jews
rebuilt temple in Jerusalem, Samaritans built a rival temple in the north creating
constant strife.
#Hellenistic period (336-165 B.C. 171 years) Alexander the Great and the Greek
empire defeats Persia; initially Jews still had freedom to worship the Lord God.
However, influence began rise in every aspect of their way of life,
language, culture and religion. The Syrian section of the empire began to stamp
out Judaism completely. Desecrated the temple, forbade sacrifices to Yahweh,

outlawed circumcision, forced Jews to eat pork and canceled Sabbaths and celebrations. Jews become divided, Pharisees and Sadducees form.

#Maccabean period (165-63 B.C. 102 years) Maccabees ruled, supported by Sadducees division continued, Pharisees insist that a true king could only be a descendant of David and a priest could only be a descendant of Aaron. Jews continued to revolt and have conflict; Alexander Janneas killed 6,000 Jews after they rejected him as their priest.

#Roman period (63 B.C.-135 A.D.) Jews are now under Roman rule. They have freedom of worship and limited authority in overseeing their own affairs. However, they long for more. They long for the days when Israel will once again rule like they did under King David. Nevertheless, they struggle to survive under Rome. As they wait and anticipate a conquering warrior God breaks His silence and sends an angel to announce that two unexpected women will conceive and give birth. One son will make a way for the Messiah and the other will be the Messiah. The Messiah is not a warrior, but a babe wrapped in cloth to become a sacrifice for the sins of humanity.
