Life lessons from Jezebel

"No one else so completely sold himself to what was evil in the Lord's sight as Ahab did under the influence of his wife Jezebel." -1 Kings 21:25

To what or whom are you most committed to in life? How do you think God would evaluate your commitment? These are just a couple of questions we will examine in our study as we look at the life of Jezebel. The Bible is clear in not only showing us various examples of good and evil, but also revealing the results of their end. As we consider the life lesson from Jezebel, let us ask ourselves, "am I committed to doing the will of God or something else and what will be the consequences of my actions?"

now we are in the rule of King Ahab. Not only did he follow the poor example of
Jeroboam who permitted the people to worship in pagan shrines and refused to
ordain priest from the tribe of Levi, but he also married Jezebel, a woman who was
known for her commitment to Baal the Canaanite god of fertility.
Another important person to make note of in this period is the prophet Elijah.
During this time, notice how God not only raises up Elijah to confront Ahab in his sin,
but also how He allows Elijah to be a contrast to their commitments and to idol
worship. In other words, this story shows us the consequences of staying
committed to evil and benefit of staying committed to the will of the true and living
God of Israel.

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Jezebel's Impact 1 Kings 16:31-33
After Ahab's marriage to Jezebel, it caused a negative ripple effect in him that
continued in the nation of Israel. Once he started worshiping Baal his commitment
to the Lord slipped further away. Notice what he did:
*He built a and for Baal in Samaria (verse 32).
*He set up the Asherah pole (verse 33).
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*He did more to the Lord to anger than any of the other kings before
him (verse 33).
In contrast to Ahab's poor leadership and unwillingness to guide the people into a right relationship with God. Elijah comes on the scene in chapter 17 and declares the dew and rain will cease for the next few years! 1 Kings 17:1
Keep in mind the people who worshiped Baal believed he was the god who brought the and bountiful harvest. However, Elijah was reminding Ahab that the God of Israel was the supreme creator and sustainer of life. Genesis 7:4; Psalm 93:3; 107:25; 148:8; Isaiah 51:15
Can you identify some things that we knowingly or unknowingly put before God as idols in our lives today?
Jezebel's Influence 1 Kings 18-19; 21 Three years into the drought, the Lord sends Elijah to Ahab and tells him the Lord will soon send rain. Sadly, all this time as a way of retaliation, Jezebel had tried to kill all the Lord's Although she managed to kill some, Obadiah was able to hide in two caves.
In contrast to their commitment to idol worship and promoting false prophets, Elijah sent a challenge to 450 prophets of Baal and 400 prophets of Asherah who were all supported by Jezebel to meet him at Mt. Carmel for the ultimate showdown of whose god was the true God!
The Lord's prophet Elijah vs. 450 prophets of Baal They both presented sacrifices; He told them to call on their god, and he would call on the Lord. "The god who answers by setting the wood on fire is the true God."
Elijah let them go first verses 25-29 they called on Baal from morning until noon.
They began to dance, shout and themselves all the way until evening but still no answer from their god.
Then it was Elijah's turnverses 30-41 He gathered 12 stones for the of
Israel, rebuilt the altar in the name of the LORD, dug a trench around the altar to
hold 3 gallons of water, prepared the sacrifice, had water poured on the altar three

times over. When he called on the Lord, verse 38 says, Immediately the fire of the

LORD flashed down from heaven and burned everything! When the people saw it they said, "The Lord He is God! Yes the Lord is God!"

At that moment Elijah seized all the false prophets of Baal and had all of them killed.

As we reflect on this dramatic scene, considering the action Elijah took in killing all

of the false prophets, what are s from your life?	some things that need	to be permanently i	removed

Jezebel's influence in inciting fear, killing the Lord's servants, promoting false prophets, now notice her influence in undermining the law.

1 Kings 21:1-15

This instance tells us of a man named Naboth who owned a vineyard next to the palace of King Ahab. Verse 2 says, Ahab offered to purchased the land for himself, but Naboth refused. Frustrated and upset, Ahab goes home pouting to his wife Jezebel who in turn tells him to toughen up and let me get it for you!

Notice her e	vil scheme:
*	letters in Ahab's name.
*Sealed ther	n with Ahab's seal.
*Sent them t	o the elders.
*Called for a	fictitious fasting and prayer
*Gave Nabo	h a place of honor
*Set him up	to be falsely accused of blasphemy against God and the king
*Had him	to death.

Jezebel tells Ahab that the land is available, and he immediately goes to the vineyard to claim it.

God's contrast:

Verse 17 says, while Ahab was at Naboth's vineyard, Elijah met him with a word from the Lord. Not only did they _____ Naboth but they also _____ him. Notice God's judgement:

- *Dogs will lick your blood at the same place where Naboth was killed.
- *He will be consumed by disaster.
- *His male descendants will be destroyed.
- *His family will be destroyed.
- *His wife Jezebel's body will be eaten by dogs at the plot of land in Jezereel.
- *Members of his family who die in the city will be eaten by dogs
- *Member of his family who die in the field will be eaten by vultures.

Verse 25 all this happened because no one else so completely sold himself to what was evil in the Lord's sight as Ahab did under the influence of his wife Jezebel.

Notice God's grace on Ahab...

Verse 27-28 says, But when Ahab heard this message, he tore his clothing, dressed in burlap, and fasted. He even slept in burlap and went about in deep mourning. Then another message from the Lord came to Elijah. Do you see how Ahab has humbled himself before me? Because he has done this, I will not do what I promised during his lifetime. It will happen to his sons; I will destroy his dynasty.

As for Jezebel...

2 Kings 9:10; 30-37

Her life came to a horrible end. God's judgement against her came to pass in that the dogs ate her body and she was unrecognizable. The Bible makes it clear that there is a place of judgement reserved for those who reject God and His plan of salvation through Jesus Christ.
