"Jesus told the crowds all these things in parables, and he did not tell them anything without a parable, so that what was spoken through the prophet might be fulfilled: I will open my mouth in parables; I will declare things kept secret from the foundation of the world." -Matthew 13:34-35

Weeds: Those who proclaim to be of God but their actions deceive and suggest otherwise, these are the weeds. Matthew 7:15-20; Acts 13:9-10; 1 Timothy 4:1-2

*Darnel was a type of weed that can hardly be distinguished from wheat until the head matures. In an agricultural setting sowing darnel in someone else's wheat field was a way for enemies to destroy someone's livelihood.

As we consider the contentment of the sower, what dangers lie in trying to label people as either "weeds" or "wheat"?
Notice whose responsibility it is to identify the weeds and deal with them:
The Harvesters: It is not me or you, but the angels of God who are responsible for carrying out God's judgement:
The Master/Sower says in verse 30, At harvest time I'll tell the reapers: Gather the weeds first and tie them in bundles to burn them, but collect the wheat in my barn.
*Separating the wheat from the weeds; those who are guilty from those who are covered by the blood of Jesus. Matthew 13:41
*Escorting the guilty and saved to their eternal destination. Matthew 13:42-43
