Down Deep • 1 Thessalonians 2:3-8

- I. INTRODUCTION Read vs. 3-8
- A. Riding No Hands
- 1. Once upon a time, learning to ride a bike was an important part of childhood.
- 2. **Now** kids **ride** virtual bikes in video games.
- 3. But it used to be that climbing on a bike, learning to ride w/o training wheels was a big deal.
- 4. Once you mastered that, it was time to ride **without hands**!
- 5. You'd see older kids, cruising along with their hands at their sides. And you'd say, "That is soooo, cooool!"
- 6. So you'd climb on your bike—but not knowing what to do, you barely pedal, because you don't want to fall going fast.
 - a. Then you'd take your hands off the handlebars;
 - b. And sure enough, fall over.
- 7. The reason you fell was because you were going *too slow*.
 - a. By trial & error you realized the *faster* you went, the more stable the bike.
 - b. It's counter-intuitive, but you discover Speed was your friend;
 - c. It enabled you to ride w/o hands.
- 8. Later in high school physics you discovered why.
 - a. The wheels of the bike were like **gyroscopes** that kept the bike running true.
 - b. The motion of the wheels produce the momentum to stay in balance.
- B. The Heart
- 1. Just as a spinning wheel provides momentum for balance, our *hearts* provide the *spiritual* momentum that determines our direction.
- 2. The question is What **force** has set our heart in motion?
- 3. That's we're headed in our study today. But first, let's take a closer look at what Paul writes here . . .
- II. TEXT
- A. Vs. 3-4
- ³ For our exhortation *did* not *come* from error or uncleanness, nor *was it* in deceit. ⁴ But as we have been approved by God to be entrusted with the gospel, even so we speak, not as pleasing men, but God who tests our hearts.
- 1. In vs. 1-2, Paul reminded them of when his team had first arrived in Thessalonica.
 - a. They were bruised & sore from their ill-treatment in Philippi.
 - b. Despite that, they preached Christ **boldly** because they'd seen how God turned their suffering to astounding blessing. = That's what we looked at last week.
- 2. Paul, Silas & Timothy went to Thessalonica to share the Gospel.
 - a. Not out of selfish ambition, but because they were absolutely convinced it was true!
 - b. They weren't out to con anyone.

As today, the 1st Century had plenty of crooks

- 3. As today, the 1st Century had plenty of crooks who used religion to con the unwary.
 - a. They travelled around with their own concoction of enticing ideas.
 - b. Because listening to speeches was a form of entertainment, it wasn't difficult to gather a crowd.
 - 1) They didn't have TV, radio, or books.
 - 2) So for fun people listened to someone give a speech.
 - 3) If they liked what they heard, they'd give him a few coins & invite him back.
 - c. There was a steady stream of guys who played on the superstitions of people by mixing philosophy, religion, & ancient science up into a mishmash that sounded good.
 - d. When they arrived in a new city, they'd give an introductory pitch to what they claimed was an elaborate system of truth.
 - e. They ended by inviting anyone who wanted to learn **more** to join a series of classes.
 - f. And of course, those who took them had to pay; & they weren't cheap.
- 4. But it was all a con. What they taught was drivel, gobbledy-gook, a hocus-pokus they'd made up or borrowed from other frauds & false religion.

- a. Their goal was to get rich & gain the prestige of being the leader of devoted followers.
- 5. Paul could say to the Thessalonians,
 - a. "Remember how it was when we came to you.
 - b. We arrived from Philippi battered & bruised because of persecution for the Gospel's sake.
 - c. And not long after we arrived in **your** city, our enemies hired thugs to beat us up again!
 - d. If we're frauds, if we're in this for wealth & the kudos of the crowd, we need to do something else because it's not workin'.
 - e. We're not getting rich. We're getting whooped!"
- 6. Paul **wasn't** a fraud & the Gospel **wasn't** a con; it's Truth!
 - a. It's the message God *entrusted* to him; preaching it was his charge.
 - b. Paul's motive wasn't selfish ambition. It was *faithfulness*.
 - c. So when he spoke, he knew the message would enflame the hostility of some.
 - d. But *others* would be convicted of sin & their need of Christ.
 - e. The *Gospel* has the power to effect salvation. That's what kept Paul tied to his mission.
- 7. As he says in v. 4, he didn't aim to please man; his ambition was to please God.
- 8. Others might condemn him but it mattered not because he knew God saw his heart.
 - a. Spectators of Olympic events like gymnastics, diving, or figure skating are often confused because the one who wins a Gold medal isn't as **flashy** as someone who takes the silver or bronze.
 - b. The reason is because the judges see things *differently* from the crowd.
 - c. They evaluate a performance on other criteria.
 - d. The audience wants razzle-dazzle; give us flips, twists, turns, & we're applauding like mad.
 - e. Judges *appreciate* the difficulty of a routine, but what they're looking for proper form, posture, placement, execution; dozens of things the crowd is *oblivious* to.
- 9. When the athlete steps onto a diving platform, mat or ice rink to start a routine, they don't perform for the crowd; they do what they do for the judges?
 - a. If they play to the crowd, they may get applause but chances for a medal are slim.
- 10. Paul didn't conduct his ministry for the approval of man. He did what he did *for & before* the Lord. V. 5

B. Vs.5-6

- 1. Both God & the Thessalonians knew Paul's team wasn't in it for the money.
- 2. And they didn't use the stock methods false teachers did for buttering up potential victims.
- 3. **Flatterv** is stock in trade for con men.
 - a. You see, everyone loves a compliment. We dig it when people say nice things about us.
 - b. So frauds say something nice to get us to stop & listen Closer.
 - c. "You look marvelous, darling." "What?" (We heard them, we just want to hear it **again**.)
 - d. Getting us to stop & listen is *exactly* what the con wants. So they spin out another juicy piece of flattery.
 - e. And once they have us waiting for more, they begin to pitch what they're selling, suggesting *that's* what will really make us hot stuff.
 - f. "Look at you, you're well on your way to being something special. I can see you have excellent taste. So you don't want to miss getting in on this."
- 4. But what was Paul's message? "You're *lost*; a *sinner* destined for hell. I know that's not what you *want* to hear but it's what you <u>NEED</u> to hear. That's the diagnosis for what's wrong with you. <u>Here's the remedy</u>, the medicine, God's prescription Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ & *You shall be saved*."
- 5. Oh gang, be cautious of the stranger doling out flattery. He's only playing you for a sucker.
- 6. V. 5 ends "God is witness."
 - a. Indeed He is. He sees all. **Nothing** escapes His gaze.
 - b. In Eccl 12:14, Solomon said

God will bring every work into judgment, including every secret thing, whether good or evil.

c. In Luke 8:17 Jesus said -

⁵ For neither at any time did we use flattering words, as you know, nor a cloak for covetousness— God *is* witness.

Nothing is secret that will not be revealed, nor hidden that will not be known and come to light.

- 7. While the *omniscience* of God is *troubling* to many, Paul mentions it here as a source of *comfort*!
 - a. He's *relieved* because God saw his heart.
 - b. Paul had been accused of a lot of bad stuff; malicious slander caused him much trouble.
 - c. He took consolation in God knowing the truth about him & trusted the day of vindication would come.
- ⁶ Nor did we seek glory from men, either from you or from others, when we might have made demands as apostles of Christ.
- 8. Paul's ambition wasn't for glory; to be thought of as something special.
 - a. Though truth be told, **he was!** Paul was an **apostle!**
 - b. Jesus appeared to him & called him to a special work of planting churches.
- 9. But Paul didn't appeal to *that* as the basis for their heeding him.
- 10. He **did** assert his apostleship in a couple letters to errant churches, but only because false teachers told lies about him that harmed their faith.
- 11. But in Thessalonica, he claimed no special treatment because, "I'm an apostle!"
- 12. Some people try to lead based solely on the authority of their position. Their attitude is, "I'm the boss; so do what I say."
 - a. People will do what that kind of leader says, but they'll have little *respect for* or *confidence in* them.
 - b. What **produces** confidence & respect is **competence** -
 - c. When the leader shows he knows where he's going & how to get there.
- 13. Paul knew he was going to heaven & told anyone who'd listen how to get there.
- 14. What's more, he **demonstrated** he really was on the way. He was living the life.
 - a. Jesus is the way, the truth & the life the only way to heaven.
 - b. That's why Paul wasn't worried about persecution & the threat of death.
 - c. After all, the worst his enemies could do was send him to glory.
- 15. It was Paul's *faithfulness* to the Word of God that gave him authority, not his claims to being someone special.
- C. Vs. 7-8
- ⁷ But we were gentle among you, just as a nursing *mother* cherishes her own children.
- 1. Rather than *putting demands* on the Thessalonians, Paul's team *served* them!
- 2. That service was marked by the same kind of tenderness a mother shows her infant.
- 3. It's distressing to see the way some pastors & Christian leaders treat people.
 - a. Instead of being servants **to** people, they expect them to fawn over & serve them.
 - b. That's precisely the attitude Paul *eschewed*.
- 4. A few weeks after the Resurrection Peter went back to fishing.
 - a. He had a hard time getting his head around the idea Jesus' forgiveness had restored him & his call to lead the flock of God.
 - b. Pulling into shore with empty nets from a night of fruitless work, he felt as big a failure as a fisherman as he was a disciple.
 - c. But Jesus was waiting on shore with a fire going & breakfast cooking.
 - d. As they ate, Jesus **gently** offered Peter a way to reverse his failure with an affirmation.
 - e. He told Peter "Feed my sheep. Tend My lambs. Take care of my flock."
- 5. He didn't tell Pete to **beat** the sheep, or **fleece** the flock.
 - a. He was to Lead, Feed & Protect them.
 - b. Isaiah 40:11 reveals the heart of God for His people.

He will feed His flock like a shepherd; He will gather the lambs with His arm,

And carry *them* in His bosom, *And* gently lead those who are with young.

- c. There are times when a pastor has to apply a little "tough love" with a wayward sheep.
- d. But his **general disposition** ought to be gentle, tender.
- ⁸ So, affectionately longing for you, we were well pleased to impart to you not only the gospel of God, but also our own lives, because you had become dear to us.
- 6. Paul & his team lived with the Thessalonians.
 - a. They didn't **sequester** themselves in special suites at the local Marriott & remained aloof,
 - b. Coming out to climb in a limo which took them to the VIP entrance of the Thessalonian theater, where they sat in a special room eating kiwi & strawberry sorbet till it was time to come out and perform their Gospel extravaganza,
 - c. Then get back in the limo & whisk back to the Marriott.
- 7. No, the Thessalonians **knew** what kind of people Paul, Silas, & Tim were because they hung out with them.
 - a. They saw up close & personal that they lived what they taught. The practiced what they preached.
 - b. And it had turned them into genuinely men of God, people of outstanding faith & love.
- 8. Even though they were only there for a month, they forged an affectionate bond.

III. CONCLUSION

- A. Approved
- 1. Let's go back now & take a look at v. 4 again.
- ⁴ But as we have been <u>approved</u> by God to be entrusted with the gospel, even so we speak, not as pleasing men, but God who tests our hearts.
- 2. That word *approved* means to find something reliable by putting it to the test.
 - a. It's what the *Underwriters Laboratories* do to products submitted to them for certification.
 - b. If you buy a product with a UL sticker on it, it means it's been put to a set of grueling tests to make sure it'll stand up to the conditions you're likely to use it in.
 - c. It's not easy to acquire a UL seal. It's a mark of superior quality.
- 3. Paul's team had a **God's seal of approval** on it.
 - a. He demonstrated His approval of them & their message by marking it with the power of the Spirit.
 - b. They gained God's approval because He'd tested their hearts & found them faithful.
 - c. That word "test" at the **end** of v. 4 is the same Greek word 'approved'.
 - d. So we can read it this way –

Being <u>found reliable by</u> God & entrusted with the gospel, we speak, not to please man, but to please God who <u>has</u> <u>found our hearts reliable</u>.

- 4. Paul, Silas, & Timothy had **proven & reliable hearts**.
- B. The Heart
- 1. We're studying Proverbs in our Mid-week study. This week we'll be taking a look at the importance of guarding our hearts.

Proverbs 4:23 • Keep [Guard] your heart with all diligence, For out of it *spring* the issues of life.

- 1. In the Bible, the *heart* is the soul; our mind, emotions & will.
- 2. Solomon calls us to **bend every effort** to guard our hearts because from there our direction in life is set.
- 3. The heart is our *spiritual autopilot*.
 - a. A pilot of an airplane keys in the direction he/she wants to go then turns on the autopilot which keeps the plane on course.
 - b. No matter what winds buffet it, the autopilot brings it back to the right course.
- 4. For many years, the central mechanism of an autopilot was a **gyroscope**.
 - a. Like the spinning wheel of a bicycle I referred to earlier, the gyroscope provided the internal momentum for the autopilot to stay on track.
 - b. If you ever played with a gyroscope, you know how *hard* it is to turn it out of alignment.
 - c. And the *faster* its spins, the harder it is to turn it. [Dynaflex]
 - d. Hang on to that illustration; we'll come back to it in a minute.

- 5. The *heart* is our *spiritual* autopilot.
 - a. It's the moral & spiritual **guide** that sets our course in life.
 - b. Whatever our heart is **set on** will be the deciding factor for nearly every decision we make.
- 6. Consider this **Most** of our choices are **automatic**; we make them without much thought.
 - a. We don't bother going through a long, complicated process of analysis to decide if we're going to brush our teeth every morning.
 - b. We did that long ago & now it's become something we do because we've assigned it to the "Good idea" category.
- 7. Imagine what a **nightmare** life would be if every decision, from big to the most mundane, had to be made by a fresh process of analysis. We'd never get anything done.
- 8. Now, catch this The heart is our moral autopilot when it's time to make a decision.
- 9. **How** we choose, **what** we decide, is determined by the **momentum** of our heart.
- 10. What's our internal gyroscope been set moving by?
- 11. Ultimately, it's one of 2 things **Self** or **God**.
 - a. Either our momentum is the one we were **born** with, the one inherited from Adam & the Fall.
 - b. Or it's the new momentum of being **born again** by the Spirit of God.
- 12. The heart of the matter is the matter of the heart.
- 13. Either we live for self or for the Lord. It really *is* that simple.
- C. Speed
- 1. The Christian life is like riding a bike with no hands.
- 2. You can't ride with no-hands **slowly**. The greater the speed, the more stable the bike.
- 3. In the same way, the **more** consistently we live for God, the more decisions we make for His glory, the momentum builds to keep going.
- 4. But That's true of living for self as well.
- 5. PRAY = "Lord as David prayed in Psalm 139
