INTRODUCTION • Read vs.

The Instant & Easy

- 1. The innovations of modern technology have produced dozens of products that make what **used** to be difficult & time-consuming chores, a breeze.
  - a. Washing machines & driers.
  - b. Microwave ovens & dishwashers
  - c. Vacuum cleaners
  - d. Computers & printers
- 2. These appliances have **sped up** & **eased** what used to be lengthy & hard tasks.
- 3. A wide range of medicines speed recovery from diseases that usually meant death.
- 4. The result of all this is that **many** people have come to expect **whatever** they desire could & **should** arrive quickly & without effort on their part.
- 5. That mentality can infect us as followers of Jesus.
- 6. We must be on guard against the idea that spiritual maturity can be **microwaved** 
  - a. Whipped up in a flash,
  - b. **Distilled** to some elixir or **popped** in a pill we take orally & wake up the next day just like Jesus.
- 7. There is no, "7 Easy Steps to Godliness."
  - a. No book you can read, seminar to attend, DVD to watch
  - b. That will render you a saint.
- 8. You & I grow in Christ the same way Peter & Paul did.
  - a. The same way Ambrose & Patrick did.
  - b. By following Jesus, walking in the Spirit DAILY.
- 9. What Peter says in these vs. is that if we're **really** following Jesus, there **WILL BE PROGRESS**.
- 10. We will become more like Him.

Vs. 5-7

- 1. As we pick it up at v. 5, we need to connect to what we saw 2 weeks ago where we ended with v. 4.
- 2. God's given us exceedingly great & precious promises, that by them we may be partakers of the divine nature.
- 3. Next, Peter describes some of what that nature looks like . . .
- <sup>5</sup> But also for this very reason, giving all diligence, add to your faith virtue, to virtue knowledge,
- <sup>6</sup> to knowledge self-control, to self-control perseverance, to perseverance godliness, <sup>7</sup> to godliness brotherly kindness, and to brotherly kindness love.
- 4. Being born again isn't the *end* of the Spirit's work in us; it's the beginning.
- 5. He leads us **TO** faith in Christ so He can then lead us **IN** faith in Him.
- 6. Built into the code of your *physical* DNA is an amazing design for growth.
  - a. When you were a child, all that was needed to *maximize* that growth was good food,

exercise & rest.

- b. If a child **fails to get** healthy food & exercise, his/her growth is stunted.
- 7. It's the same in our *spiritual* lives.
  - a. God's designed our *spiritual* DNA the same was as our cellular DNA for growth.
  - b. That growth happens as we apply ourselves to a healthy spiritual diet & exercise.
- 8. That's why Peter says we're to give all diligence, make every effort toward, adding the marks of spiritual maturity.
- 9. He lists 7 of them.
  - a. The NT has several passages listing the virtues & traits that ought to reside in a believer.
  - b. These things *aren't* a *legalistic code* we're to walk lock-step into.
  - c. They're a *catalog of characteristics* we see in Jesus; *Desires* of a *transformed life*.
- 10. Peter links each trait by the word "add."
  - a. But we're not to understand these things as **sequential**.
  - b. Virtue isn't a prerequisite for knowledge; not does self-control have to come before perseverance.
  - c. The word "add" means to *lavishly include something*.
  - d. Like at a buffet line you might pile up on you plate a huge mound of mashed potatoes.
- 11. While each of these characteristics could be their own sermon, we'll just skim them today. add to your faith virtue,
- 12. Virtue means *moral excellence*.
  - a. This was one of the favorite words of the Greek philosophers.
  - b. Something was excellent when it perfectly fulfilled its purpose.
- 13. We were created to glorify God.
  - a. But God's *intent* in that is not that we'd be some mindless chorus droning an endless chant of praise. "Glory to God in the highest. All laud His holy name. Blah. blah, blah . . ."
  - b. The glory we're created to bring Him comes from a profoundly deep & intimate connection to Him.
  - c. He wants us to **KNOW** Him
    - 1) Like the aged sailor knows the sea.
    - 2) Like the artist knows his paint, pallet & brush > notch in finger & thumb.
    - 3) Like the musician knows her violin & bow > Cheek & violin perfect match; muscles of arm.
    - 4) Like 2 friends of many yrs who know each other so well, can complete each other's sentences.
  - d. That's how God wants us to know Him. And that knowledge has filled is with such peace & purpose, not only our words glorify God, our living does as well.
- 14. The Westminster Catechism captures it well when it says the chief end of man is to glorify God and enjoy Him forever.
- 15. When Peter says we're to lavishly pile on virtue, he means we're to set ourselves to go **ALL OUT** in our pursuit of God.
  - a. There's to be no **desire** or **affection** we don't invite Him into.
  - b. No *dream* or *plan* He doesn't become master of.

to virtue knowledge,

- 16. This is the *practical application* of what we learn about God *to daily life*.
- 17. The person who's Christianity is limited to Sunday mornings is no real follower of Jesus.
- 18. The Book of Proverbs is the **blueprint for a successful life**.
  - a. At the core of Proverbs is the oft-repeated <u>starting point</u> that the **beginning of wisdom** is the knowledge of God.
  - b. That's why our world today is rapidly spinning out of control; it's rejected God.
  - c. When you remove the center, the rest caves in.
  - d. The post-modern age in which we live is **hollow**.
    - 1) We live in a world of **hollow** men & hollow women.

- 2) Politics are hollow; Govt is hollow. So their policies & practices are *empty*.
- 19. The world forever looks for better programs God's program is all & only about better people.
- 20. The world wants a plan > God sends a man.
- <sup>6</sup> to knowledge self-control, to self-control perseverance,
- 21. **Self-control** is **restraint** in handling **pleasure** while **Perseverance** is **patience** in dealing w/trials.
- 22. These 2 words go far to highlight the **BALANCE** that's to mark the Christian life.
  - a. God wants us to *enjoy* the pleasures He built into Creation.
    - 1) But that enjoyment must never become an end in itself.
    - 2) Success in life isn't determined by coming to the end with more pleasure than pain.
    - 3) We don't define ourselves by how we "FEEL."
    - 4) We are IN Christ; sons & daughters of the Living God; free to enjoy what He's created w/o regret or guilt.
- b. And when pleasure's replace by the pain of a trial, we aren't going to freak out & doubt the goodness of God because we know He's still on His thrown & works all things together for good. to perseverance godliness,
- 23. This is a rich word that conveys the idea of a devotion to God so strong it results in blessing to others.
  - a. When I read this word I think of St. Francis of Assisi who was walking along one day, just worshipping God, caught up in praise for His goodness.
  - b. He saw a leper and was surprised by his own lack of revulsion at the man's hideous visage.
  - c. For what Francis saw was a human being made in God's glorious image with amazing potential because of the Gospel.
  - d. So he went over to the man who'd not been touched by another human being for many years.
  - e. And he knelt down, took the man's foot, lifted it to his lips and kissed it.
- 24. An inconsequential act to the eyes of the world; but a soul-transforming kindness to that leper.
- 25. Friends, let's be done with the idea that it's only within these walls we show our devotion to God by worshipping & talking of spiritual things.
  - a. This is but the *team room* where we gather to go over plays,
  - b. Then hit the field out there where we run those plays & live it!
- <sup>7</sup> to godliness brotherly kindness, and to brotherly kindness love.
- 26. Peter lists 2 flavors of love;
  - a. The first is the *affection* we have for one another as believers.
  - b. The second is **agape**; the love that comes from God alone.
- 27. There's a special affection we ought to have for one another both here at Calvary, & toward the wider Body of Christ; wherever it is and whatever flag it flies.
  - a. When the unsaved visit a local church, or happen to see Christians gathered in some public place
  - b. What they ought to behold is genuine warmth & affinity for one another.
  - c. They ought not be subjected to our debates over how many angels it takes to screw in a lightbulb.
- 28. But the *highest* love of all is agape; God's love.
  - a. In Christ, we're not only to receive that love,
  - b. We're to be channels of it to others; even those who don't deserve it.

Vs. 8-9

<sup>8</sup> For if these things are yours and abound,

1. If these 7 traits are lavishly piling up in us . . .

you will be neither barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ.

- 2. Peter's point again is that spiritual growth is the norm for us.
- 3. It is possible for someone who's been born again to be barren & unfruitful.
  - a. Barren means useless.
  - b. In John 15, Jesus said it was God's will we bear abundant fruit.
- 4. One of the great challenges we face today in the Modern American church is the danger of *consumerism*.
  - a. Where people think being a Christian means believing the Gospel story,
    - 1) Going to church once a week, singing a half dozen songs, & listening to a vaguely interesting sermon.

- 2) & if you're **really** into it—maybe putting a bumper sticker on your car.
- b. But that's the extent of their involvement & experience of the Christian life.
- 5. It's the very thing Peter's saying we're NOT to do; just religious consumers who take but never give.
- <sup>9</sup> For he who lacks these things is shortsighted, even to blindness, and has forgotten that he was cleansed from his old sins.
- 6. Peter minces no words. The person who isn't growing in Christ & the virtues of vs. 5-7 is short-sighted to the point of spiritual blindness.
  - a. He/she has lost sight of the fact that being born again ushers us into a new life
  - b. And that life **grows** to become more & more like Jesus.
- 7. But the person who DOES know that and is growing in Christ sees clearly; their vision is sharp.
  - a. Rather than being short-sighted, pre-occupied just with their life & the world,
  - b. They see the future God has for them in His amazing plans.
- 8. In John 4:35 Jesus told His disciples to *lift up their eyes* & to see the fields ready for harvest.
  - a. He didn't mean literal crops of grain;
  - b. He meant **people** ripe for the Gospel.
  - What Jesus told them, the Holy Spirit repeats to us today.
- 10. Last week we shared the vision God's given for the future of CCO.
  - a. The response was wonderful as so many shared their support.
  - b. A few others shared their concern that we not get ahead of the Spirit of God as we move forward.
  - c. We appreciate that caution & need people who'll ever remind us of the need to keep this entire undertaking bathed in prayer.
  - d. But there were a few others whose caution I'm concerned is the lack of vision Peter refers to here in v. 9.
    - 1) They don't like change.
    - 2) They're content where we are right now & don't want to be bothered with all the work a new home requires.
    - 3) What they don't realize is—there'd be no "Here" & where they are right now if we'd listened to their spiritual ancestors back in El Rio.
    - 4) Back then there were people who said what they're saying now.
    - 5) They didn't have the vision for this & missed out.
    - Now it's the turn for everyone here to SEE the future & move with purpose toward it.
- 11. As we look to a new campus, SEE a city that NEEDS Jesus!
- 12. Lift up your eyes, because God has given us Oxnard!

Vs. 10-11

- <sup>10</sup> Therefore, brethren, be even more diligent to make your call and election sure, for if you do these things you will never stumble;
- 1. Peter's use of the words "call & election" are an enticing invitation to dive into a highly controversial issue.
- 2. But wouldn't you just know it we're out of time!
- 3. So let's stay on track & be sure to see what he says . . .
- 4. Peter uses the <u>same word</u> in vs. 5 & 10 when he says we're to be **diligent**.
  - a. We **make** our calling & election sure by growing in the graces he describes in vs. 5-7,
  - b. & not being barren, unfruitful, or spiritually short-sighted.
- 5. Whatever your understanding of God's call & our election, Peter's clear that we must never adopt a passive attitude toward growing in grace.
- 6. The doctrine of grace must never lull us into spiritual apathy & laziness.
- 7. On the contrary, it ought to spark us to ever-increasing faithfulness; knowing we are loved by a mighty God.
- 8. The stumble Peter refers to at the end of v. 10 means a fatal fall; one that takes you out of the race. It's an athletic image.
- 9. That image carries on in v. 11
- <sup>11</sup> for so an entrance will be supplied to you abundantly into the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.
- 10. The picture here is the welcome extended an Olympic champion when he returned to his city.

- a. Everyone turned out to welcome him home & exult in his victory!
- 11. Peter's point is that by purposing to grow in Christ, by setting ourselves to put what we believe into action,
  - 1) We **prove** we really do belong to God,
  - 2) We **don't have to worry** about falling away
  - 3) And we can be *confident* of our arrival in glory.
