Tasty – Philippians 1:3-14

- I. INTRODUCTION
- A. Read John 15:1-8 / Pray
- B. A Riptionary of Surf Lingo
- 1. Surfers have developed a huge vocabulary of unique words.
- 2. They even have their own word for dictionary It's a *riptionary*.
- 3. A **Barney** is an unskilled surfer.
- 4. **Freddie** is a reckless Barney; sometimes called a **Federico** or if a woman, a **Federica**.
- 5. **Brah** or **Broh** is surf-talk for any fellow surfer.
 - a. **Brosef** is a *close* surf-buddy, or someone you have a lot of respect for.
 - b. But if you overuse the term 'broh' you become a **Brodad**; not good.
- 6. **Bubbles** refers to a ditzzy beach bunny. "Yo brah, that beach bunny was so bubbles!"
- 7. If something is *filthy*, it's super good. But if it's *narbs* it horrendous.

"The break at the Point was filthy this morning, but the Barney's were narbs."\

- 8. There are hundreds of these but there's **one** I want to highlight & apply to our text.
 - a. It goes back a few years. To a surfer, if something is *tasty*, it's *excellent*, *super-good*.
 - b. Tasty doesn't apply just to food, it's **anything** that causes a glorious stoke!
- 9. Paul tells us how we can be *tasty peeps!*
- II. TEXT
- A. Vs. 3-6
- 1. After his greeting in vs. 1-2 he writes -
- ³ I thank my God upon every remembrance of you,
- 2. Paul isn't just being polite. There was a tight bond between Paul & the Philippians.
- 3. Though they were separated by 800 miles their relationship was close.
- 4. There'd been regular letters between Paul & the Philippians.
 - a. Elders from Philippi had visited Paul
 - b. He'd sent his assistant Timothy there more than once.
- 5. Now that Paul was under arrest in Rome & awaiting trial, his thoughts turned to them often.
 - a. Whenever they did, he was moved to thank God for them.
 - b. That wasn't Paul's first thought when he remembered some of the *other* churches, like Galatia or the Corinthians.
 - 1) Those were *troubled* congregations –
 - 2) Struggling with things that ought not have been a problem.
 - c. Those churches **stressed** Paul but not the church at Philippi.
 - d. They brought a smile to his face & a prayer of thanks to his lips.
- ³ I thank my God upon every remembrance of you, ⁴ always in every prayer of mine making request for you all with joy,
- 6. Read all Paul's letters & you see he spent a lot of time in prayer.
- 7. He never failed to mention the Philippians, asking God to continue blessing them & working in their lives.
- 8. Praying for them was a **source of joy** to Paul.
 - a. Though he was under arrest & chained to a guard, his joy was undimmed.
 - b. He'd had plenty of time to work it out.
 - 1) From the time of his arrest in Jerusalem,
 - 2) The months in prison in Caesarea,
 - 3) The weeks of sailing to Rome, & the months of awaiting trial had given him plenty of time to think about what was going on.
 - 4) He realized since his one desire was to serve God & preach the Gospel, God must have him right where He wanted him.
 - 5) It wasn't what **Paul** would have chosen, but he had come to see that God's ways are better.
- 9. That lesson that had been driven home powerfully when Paul was in Philippi 10 years before!
 - a. When he first arrived in the city since there was no Jewish synagogue, Paul had had to preach the Gospel in the streets.

- b. One day a demon-possessed slave girl began following him around, causing a distraction.
- c. So Paul cast the demon out of her and led her to faith in Christ.
- d. Her owner was furious because she'd made him a lot of money as a fortune teller.
- e. He had Paul arrested as a trouble-maker, beaten & thrown into prison.
- f. Paul & his friend Silas shared the Gospel with their fellow prisoners, then sang their hearts out in worship.
- g. An earthquake shook the prison & all the cell-doors flew open.
- h. The jailor came running out of his office, saw the doors hanging wide & assumed the prisoners had run off.
- i. This was a serious breach of his duty as jailor. He knew he'd be tortured then executed the next day, so he drew his sword to kill himself.
- j. But Paul & Silas had persuaded the other prisoners the right thing to do was stay put; they were all still there.
- k. They saw the jailor getting ready to fall on his sword & called out to him to stop; they were all still there.
- 1. The Jailor couldn't believe they'd not run off.
- m. That became the opening Paul needed to share the Gospel with him. The jailor & his entire family came to faith in Christ & became some of the first members of the church.
- 10. That jailor & his family were some of the faces Paul thought of when he remembered the Philippians.
 - a. Had he not been falsely arrested, beaten & tossed in jail, that man & his family might never have heard.
 - b. So looking back, Paul could see clearly how faithful God is & how His ways are so much better than ours.
- 11. And that filled him with joy. His hardships had made him *better*, *not bitter*.
- 12. You & I have the same choice when hardship comes our way.
 - a. It will either make us better, or bitter.
 - b. We can trust God knows what's He's doing or assume we know more.
- 13. We can be sure Paul didn't *enjoy* imprisonment. But he trusted God was *using* it to grant his deeper desire to win the lost to Jesus.
- 14. A bit later we'll see THAT was exactly the case!
- 15. Another source of Paul's joy is found in v. 5 -
- ⁵ for your <u>fellowship</u> in the gospel from the first day until now,
- 16. Throughout the 10 years he'd known them, the Philippians supported Paul.
 - a. They prayed for him & sent him financial support.
 - b. As a tent-maker, Paul usually paid his own way & did ministry at his own expense.
 - c. But the Philippians understood if they helped pay some of Paul's bills, he'd have **more time** to do ministry & plant churches.
 - d. Their support was doubly important now that he was in Rome because being under arrest, he couldn't work.
 - e. And prisoners weren't fed & clothed by the jailor; they relied on the charity of their family & friends.
 - f. Without the Philippians help, Paul could have gone hungry.
- 17. In ch. 4 when Paul returns to this subject he again thanks them & reminds them their support partnered them with him so that *their reward* was the same as his.
- 18. Paul couldn't have done what he did without help & he knew it.
 - a. By praying for him & sending him the practical assistance of financial help,
 - b. They were assisting him in expanding the Kingdom of God.
 - c. God would reward them for that partnership.
- 19. We get a lot of requests from ministries & missionaries for support.
 - a. We can't support all of them.
 - b. The one's we **do** support are people from CCO who go out.
 - c. We also look for ministries that are involved in church-planting or church-building in areas of the world where there isn't a strong Christian presence.
 - d. We look for ministries where the maximum amount goes to **ministry** rather than administration.

- e. Every so often we have a ministry or missionary come & share their calling to reach the world to give you an opportunity to partner **specifically** with them.
- f. Besides regular giving to your church, it's a good idea to find a ministry or missionary you can get behind and support both with prayer & your giving, even if all you can give is \$5 a month.
- g. That \$5 could mean an extra hour or two a missionary has to share the love of God with people & during that time, people could be saved.
- 20. Another reason for Paul's joy, v. 6 . . .
- ⁶ being confident of this very thing, that He who has begun a good work in you will complete *it* until the day of Jesus Christ;
- 21. In v. 5, Paul was joyous because of their partnership with him *from the beginning*. Now he looks *to the future*, confident that they will go on, faithful to the end.
- 22. Let's read it again.
- 23. Does Paul sound bummed out & depressed about the Philippians?
- 24. No way! He's **stoked**! This was a group of people he delighted in.
 - a. They were growing in grace & faith.
 - b. The love of God was evident in them.
- 25. There's a lot of bad-mouthing the church today.
 - a. It comes from both inside & outside.
 - b. Many *Christians* have a negative view of the church & see it as messed up.
 - c. No doubt in some places it is; but not everywhere.
 - d. There are some good churches & CCO is one of them. You guys rock!
 - e. Sure some of us struggle. We have some real knuckleheads.
 - f. We **need** the knuckleheads so we can practice the virtues of patience & longsuffering & determined love.
- 26. Like Paul with the Philippians I love you guys! You make me smile.
- 27. And I thank God for you all the time.
- 28. I have every confidence that just as God brought you to faith in Him, He's going to complete what He's begun.
- 29. Christian Listen: God's not done with you yet. There's more work to do in conforming us to the image of Christ.
 - a. More chiseling, more scraping; more sanding & polishing.
 - b. God never begins a work then gets bored & walks away.
 - c. He always completes what he starts. He's going to complete you.
- 30. But know this that won't be till Jesus comes again.
- 31. We're in an especially tough season here at Calvary.
- a. There are a lot of people in our church family going through really hard stuff.
- b. While many are discovering the grace of God in brand new ways, others are struggling.
 - 1) Marriages are in turmoil. There's major problems with kids.
 - 2) Many people are out of work, losing their home, cars.
 - 3) Illness is rampant.
- c. My prayer list has never been longer!
- 32. In the midst of the turmoil, God has taught me to look at it from a different perspective than I've done in the past.
 - a. I **know** the day will come when we will look back on all this with the clarity of hindsight.
 - b. We'll see how God worked all things together for good.
 - c. We'll rejoice in His faithfulness to turn what looks like a loss into a win.
 - d. By faith, I'm standing in that day **NOW** when everything is still dark & chaotic.
- 33. **Knowing** that day **will** come, & standing in it by faith, renews my hope & gives wisdom in what to say & do.
- 34. That's what Paul was doing. So even though the Philippians were suffering for their faith, he was confident they'd make it safely home because God is faithful.
- B. Vs. 7-11

⁷ just as it is right for me to think this of you all, because I have you in my heart, inasmuch as both in my chains

and in the defense and confirmation of the gospel, you all are partakers with me of grace.

- 1. This is one of those places were the translation from Greek to English is difficult.
- 2. A paraphrase is helpful. Paul says,

You Philippians have a special place in my heart because it's obvious the grace of God is at work in all of us the same way. You aren't just fair-weather friends. We're brothers built for adversity. Not only did you support me when I was free to plant-churches, you continue to now that I'm under arrest.

- ⁸ For God is my witness, how greatly I long for you all with the affection of Jesus Christ.
- 3. Absence makes the heart grow fonder and Paul's long time away from Philippi had caused a deep longing to see them again.
- 4. Not able to be with them, he did the **next best** thing; he **prayed** for them.
- ⁹ And this I pray,
- 5. He lists 4 things.
 - 1) that your love may abound still more and more in knowledge and all discernment,
 - a. They were already marked by love. But you can never have too much.
 - b. So Paul asked God to give them *more* love,
 - c. Not a *sloppy-agape* unconnected to truth.
 - d. His prayer was that their love would be wise & well spent.
 - e. Later Paul warns them about the ever-present danger of false teachers.
 - 1) They would make themselves easy prey for deception if, in the interest of being loving, they accepted everything false teachers presented.
 - 2) We must stay alert to this danger.
 - 3) All too often the church refuses to stand against error because it thinks being loving means accepting everything.
 - 4) No! Real Love goes hand in hand with Truth; you can't have one w/o the other.
 - 2) ¹⁰ that you may approve (distinguish) the things that are excellent,
 - f. When the Philippians first came to faith in Christ, as Gentiles with no knowledge of God's Word they'd had to learn the difference between **good & bad**.
 - g. But now that they'd walked with God for ten years, they could discern the difference between what's good & the best, what excels.
 - h. The spiritually mature know that by waiting on God & seeking His will the Spirit often reveals a course of action better than what at first seemed good.
 - i. [Lynn & I staying here in Oxnard]
 - 3) that you may be sincere and without offense till the day of Christ,
 - i. This word 'sincere' is interesting; literally "sun-proof"
 - 1) Sculpture was a thriving trade in the Roman Empire.
 - 2) Anyone of means had sculptures decorating their home.
 - 3) It was common for a stray chisel to knock off a piece of stone in the wrong place, ruining an otherwise fine work of art.
 - 4) So unscrupulous sculptors would mix marble dust & wax & fill a hole, or stick a broken nose or ear, back on.
 - 5) The buyer would be none the wiser till the sun came out & heated up the statue standing in their courtyard. Then the nose would side off.
 - k. For this reason, *quality* sculptors placed their finished work outdoors in the sun to be tested. It was sun-proof; meaning it had no flaws that would ruin it.
 - 1. Being sincere means **refusing to pretend** or be a poser.
 - 1) The sincere person isn't perfect.
 - 2) But he **doesn't hide**, excuse, or justify his faults.
 - 3) He *confesses* them & asks God to heal him.
 - m. Paul prayed the Philippians would continue to grow in grace & be a people of such moral excellence, there'd be no opening for their enemies to charge them with anything.
 - 4) ¹¹ being filled with the fruits of righteousness which *are* by Jesus Christ, to the glory and praise of God.
- C. Fruit

- 1. Fruit! Do you like fruit?
- 2. Because our diet has so much processed food with added sugar & salt, fruit isn't as important a commodity as it was throughout most of history.
- 3. In Paul's day, fruit was a delight because it was one of the few sweets they ate.
- 4. Think about the incredible flavor of fruit!
 - a. Peaches, strawberries, kiwis, bananas,
 - b. Apples, pears, grapes, blueberries, raspberries, cantaloupe, watermelon,
 - c. Figs, lemons, oranges, limes, pineapple, pomegranate
 - d. Mango, grapefruit, passion fruit, plums = Yummmm
- 5. Besides tasting good, they're good for you!
- 6. When the Bible speaks of spiritual fruit, it means something good that brings delight.
- 7. It adds flavor & richness to life.
- 8. As we saw in John 15, Jesus wants His followers to bear fruit.
 - a. We produce fruit by *abiding* in Him.
 - b. Fruit is the natural result of staying in fellowship with Jesus.
 - c. Just as oranges grow on a branch connected to the trunk.
- 9. Paul says the same thing here look:

being filled with the fruits of righteousness which are by Jesus Christ,

- a. The fruit comes by the Spirit of Christ working in & through us.
- b. And when it comes, look what it does -

to the glory and praise of God.

c. Just as Jesus said in John 15:8 – The Father is glorified by our bearing much fruit.

III. CONCLUSION

- A. Tasty!
- 1. I like this! Paul prayed the Philippians would be *tasty*!
- 2. He asked God to make them a community of such glorious excellence that it delighted God, each other, & the rest of their city.
- 3. But here's the deal Jesus began His teaching on being fruitful in John 15:2 with this –

Every branch that bear fruits, the Father prunes, that it may bear more fruit.

4. In vs. 12-18, Paul speaks about some pruning that God had done in his life to make him more fruitful. We'll look at that next week.

For today – just dwell on the truth that God wants to fill you with good fruit & make you a delight.
