Pressing On – Philippians 3:12-16

I. INTRODUCTION

- A. Read Vs.
- B. Link to Last Week
- 1. These vs. continue vs. 1-11 & what we looked at last week, so let's do a quick recap.
- 2. Paul warned the Philippians to beware of legalists who would try to move them from trusting in the grace of God to their own efforts.
 - a. There were false teachers called *Judaizers* who followed Paul around, sneaking into the churches he planted *after* he left.
 - b. They told new believers Paul's Gospel was as **start**, but if they wanted to really please God they had to keep the Jewish Law.
 - c. They enforced a long list of **rules** that shifted dependence on God's grace to works.
- 3. So Paul gives an eloquent defense of grace in vs. 7-9.
- 4. He knew how the legalists would respond. Paul had *often* heard the come-back of his critics who said his *emphasis* of grace would cause people to get spiritually lazy.
 - a. They claimed only by enforcing the rule of works would people endeavor to be holy.
 - b. They thought preaching grace would lead to a immorality & a spiritual immaturity.
- 5. So having defended the Gospel of Grace, Paul followed it up with what grace **really** does.
- 6. Far from leading to spiritual laziness, grace produces a *holy ambition* to be like Jesus.
- 7. Paul describes what God's grace had done in him ...

II. TEXT

A. Vs. 10-11

- ¹⁰ that I may know Him and the power of His resurrection, and the fellowship of His sufferings, being conformed to His death, ¹¹ if, by any means, I may attain to the resurrection from the dead.
- 1. Paul had a deep & abiding passion to not just know **about** God; he yearned for a close relationship **with** Him.
- 2. He'd responded to Jesus' invitation to **follow Him**, not at a distance but as close as possible.
- 3. Paul understood being a Christian meant much more than agreeing to a list of doctrines.
 - a. It was a way of life,
 - b. Made possible by the indwelling presence of the Holy Spirit.
- 4. The more Paul grew in his relationship of Christ, the more he **wanted** to grow.
- 5. Far from grace making him lazy, the more grace he experienced, the more he loved & served the Lord.
- 6. An the more he grew in grace, the *farther* he realized he had to go. Look
- B. Vs. 12-14
- ¹² Not that I have already attained, or am already perfected; but I press on, that I may lay hold of that for which Christ Jesus has also laid hold of me.
- 1. As spiritually advanced as Paul was, he was still a **work in progress**.
 - a. He still fell. There were lapses in judgment; times when the flesh got the best of him.
 - b. As godly as he was, there were areas of holiness he struggled with.
 - c. Paul had to do what all of us do, repent & confess sin.
- 2. He wasn't perfect! // This side of heaven, no one is.
- 3. As long as we are in these bodies, living in a sin-cursed world, we'll stumble & fall.
- 4. We'll go through the process of repentance & forgiveness again & again.
- 5. Paul's admission here should be an encouragement to all of us.
 - a. When reading his letters it's easy to get the impression he lived on a spiritual plane unlike anything we could aspire to.
 - b. He wrote *THIS* to disabuse us of that thought.
 - c. Certainly his *calling* was unique.
 - d. His **background** gave him a unique perspective.
 - e. But when it came to the core realities of following Jesus, he was no different than us.
 - f. He struggled with temptation just like we do.
 - g. So we have a lot to learn from him.

- 6. Note his attitude toward the things he *still struggled with*.
 - a. He didn't get discouraged & think of quitting.
 - b. He didn't throw up his hands in frustration that after 30 years of walking with the Lord he still messed up.
- 7. On the contrary, he says,

<u>I press on</u>, that I may lay hold of that for which Christ Jesus has also laid hold of me.

- 8. He wasn't perfect, but instead of using that as an excuse to **stay broken**, he used it as a goad to move **toward** perfection.
 - a. Usually someone will say, "No one's perfect," as *an excuse* for sin.
 - b. Indeed No one is perfect.
 - c. But perfection is the ultimate promise of the believer.
 - d. We **ought** to move ever toward it.
- 9. That was Paul's perspective. He wanted to <u>lay hold of</u> everything faith in Jesus meant.
- 10. Picture a father who reaches down & lifts his little child up to a shelf covered with treasure.
 - a. That's the idea here.
 - b. Paul has been laid hold of by God for something marvelous.
 - c. So Paul doesn't want to leave his hands hanging idly at his sides.
 - d. He wants to grab all God is holding him for.
- 11. Christ laid hold of **you** for a reason.
 - a. God desires to do a marvelous work **both in & through** you.
 - b. Jesus didn't save you just to make you part of a *crowd*.
 - c. He laid hold of you because you have a unique role to play.
 - d. Your potential & destiny are mind-bendingly glorious!
 - e. God's got you in His grip, so reach out & lay hold of all He has for you.
- ¹³ Brethren,
- 12. See? Paul doesn't a super-spiritual status *above* them; he's one of them.
- 13. What he's about to say isn't just for super-saints. This ought to be the attitude of **all** of us.

I do not count myself to have apprehended; but one thing *I do*, forgetting those things which are behind and reaching forward to those things which are ahead, ¹⁴ I press toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus.

- 14. Paul knows there's a great goal to life, a glorious purpose behind it all.
- 15. The predominant religion of our time is Secular Humanism which says there's no meaning or purpose to life, not goal to aim at.
 - a. We're all just biological machines that came about by chance.
 - b. Molecules banged around together in space, made a gas-cloud that condensed into a planet just the right distance from a medium-sized star for liquid water to form.
 - c. Eventually some chemicals formed that combined to produce life.
 - d. Billions of years later homo sapiens formed brains big enough to figure out where they came from.
 - e. An now we know we're nothing more than a freakish combination of chemicals.
 - f. We're born, we live, we die nothing more.
- 15. That's what the philosophy of materialism & secular humanism believe.
- 16. But everything inside us **KNOWS intuitively** that's bunk.
 - a. We can't escape the sense there's a goal & purpose to life.
 - b. We possess an inner moral compass that tells us if we're headed in the right direction.
 - c. Life isn't just a long succession of days from birth to death.
 - d. We're consumed w/the sense our days ought to be spent in the pursuit of something.
- 17. That something, is a SomeOne *God*.
- 18. The theologian Augustine said, "Our heart is restless until it finds its rest in You, O God."
- 19. The problem is, sin **separated** God & man.
 - a. The Fall in Eden sidetracked our hearts.
 - b. Mankind has lost its way.
- 20. Jesus came to heal the breach & remove the barrier between God & man.
- 21. He restores us to the goal & purpose of life to know & love Him.

- 22. Now that Paul had been saved, he made it his aim to reach that goal with a single-minded determination.
- 23. He was all about ONE THING. But that 1 thing has 2 parts . . .
 - 1) He forsakes what's behind and -
 - 2) He presses on to what's ahead.
- 24. **First**: He forsakes what's behind.
- 13 forgetting those things which are behind
 - a. Behind Paul lay both success & failure.
 - b. Last week in vs. 4-6, Paul gave a list of his credentials, things the legalists considered bragging points.
 - c. But Paul said he counted them as *refuse* compared to trusting Christ.
 - d. Not only did he forsake his accomplishments *before* coming to Christ, he didn't hang on to all he'd done *FOR* Christ -
 - 1) The churches he'd planted,
 - 2) The people he'd won to faith,
 - 3) The letters he'd written that were being used far & wide as tools for growing in Faith.
 - e. Next to Jesus, Paul is the most prominent figure in the NT. His was an *epic life*!
 - f. But as he penned this to the Philippians from imprisonment in Rome, he wasn't resting on his laurels.
 - g. He looked at each new day as an opportunity to **start all over again** in giving all he had to know, love & serve God.
- 25. People who've walked with God for years can be tempted to look back with pride at all they've done for God.
 - a. They may say, "Wow, look how *far* I've come!"
 - b. It becomes easy to add, "I think I've come *far enough*! I'll camp here till Jesus comes back."
- 26. That wasn't Paul's mindset. "Far enough" for him was heaven.
- 27. He wasn't going to let past **failures** hinder him either.
 - a. He knew the past can't be changed but it can be forgiven.
 - b. Because God forgets what He forgives, Paul made a decision to forget it as well.
 - c. He couldn't erase it from his memory, but he wouldn't allow past failures to affect him.
- 28. Many are hindered from moving forward by their past.
 - a. They made a good start with Christ years ago, then did something foolish & think God has cast them off.
 - b. Paul could have thought that.
 - 1) He'd led the **persecution** of the followers of Jesus & presided at the **murder** of some.
 - 2) If anyone could think he'd blown it with God it was Paul.
 - c. But because he understood the greatness of God's grace he put the past behind him & made it his aim to press in to a great knowledge & love of Christ.
- 29. Christian, don't dwell on the past! Ask God to forgive, then forget it!
 - a. Each day that dawns is another gift He gives to live w/o the limitations of the past.
 - b. You don't need therapy. You need to believe God when He says His forgives you.
 - c. His grace is sufficient for you TODAY!
- 30. **Second**: Paul reached forward toward all God had in store for him.
 - a. Grace not only frees us from the past,
 - b. It fills the future with good.
- 31. That phrase "reaching forward" in v. 13 is what the runner does in a race.
 - a. As he/she nears the finish line, they lean forward to shave another thousandth of a second off their time.
 - b. It's a picture of *all out effort*.
- 32. Paul didn't have a laid back, casual attitude about following Christ. He was all out, all the time.
- 33. When Julius Caesar landed on the shores of Britain with his Roman legions, he took a bold step to ensure the success of his military venture.
 - a. He ordered his men to halt on the cliffs overlooking the galleys that had carried them from Gaul lying just offshore.
 - b. As the legionnaires watched, they saw the ships erupt in flames.

- c. Caesar had given the order for them to be torched, cutting off any possibility of retreat.
- d. There was nothing left for the legion to do but to advance & conquer.
- e. That's exactly what they did.
- 34. The path God has ordained for us is *forward*, not back.
- C. Vs. 15-16
- ¹⁵ Therefore let us, as many as are mature, have this mind; and if in anything you think otherwise, God will reveal even this to you. ¹⁶ Nevertheless, to *the degree* that we have already attained, let us walk by the same rule, let us be of the same mind.
- 1. Paul urges the spiritually mature to make sure they don't grow complacent.
- 2. Some of older believers are like Dorothy & her companions in the *Wizard of Oz* when they crossed the poppy field.
 - a. We've come a long way & overcome many obstacles on our way to the Kingdom of God.
 - b. But now that we're in sight of it we've grown drowsy.
 - c. Instead of pressing on to the heavenly city, we've lain down to a spiritual nap.
 - d. That's a dangerous place. Get up & press on!
- 3. I love what Paul says here in v. 16. To the degree you've already attained, **double it**.

III. CONCLUSION

A. Press On!

1. Some years ago, columnist Herb Caen wrote,

Every morning in Africa, a gazelle wakes up.

It knows it must run faster than the fastest lion or it will be killed.

Every morning a lion wakes up.

It knows it must outrun the slowest gazelle or it will starve to death.

It doesn't matter whether you are a lion or a gazelle;

when the sun comes up, you'd better be running.

- 2. James says the devil is like a lion on the prowl, seeking whom he may devour.
- 3. The best way to avoid the danger of the one who seeks to destroy you is to be pressing on after Christ.
- B. Fallen
- 1. Raymond Buker was in the 1924 Olympic Games, the same Olympics where Eric Liddell made his mark on athletic history, as portrayed in the movie *Chariots of Fire*.
- 2. A year before the Olympics, Buker was running in a mile race with Joey Ray and Ray Watson; 2 well known milers of the time.
- 3. Prior to that race, Ray & Watson both had better times in the mile than Buker.
- 4. But Buker thrived on competition & had never raced with someone of the caliber of these 2.
- 5. During the 2nd lap, while they were all together, Buker got knocked down.
 - a. He didn't know how it happened, but all of a sudden he was on the track.
 - b. For 2 or 3 seconds he couldn't think.
- 6. He got up, looked ahead to the other runners & had a split second to decide if he was going to quit or keep running. He decided to finish the race.
- 7. All he could think was, "I must keep going, even if I come in last; I must not quit."
- 8. So he took off once again, & guess what—he not only finished, he won!
- 9. Maybe you've fallen! Maybe your spiritual legs got knocked out from underneath you or you stumbled on some moral tripwire.
- 10. Stop looking at the past. You're not disqualified because of it.
- 11. Get back in the race Press on!
