Wake Up! – Rev. 3:1-6

Read vs. • Sardis' History

- 1. Jesus' ltrs to the 7 churches in Rev. 2-3 each contain personalized tib-bits that the people of each church would hear & say, "Hey Jesus **knows** my city. He knows where I live & what's happened here."
- 2. That's especially true of THIS ltr to the Church at Sardis.
- 3. So, I want to share a little about the *history* of Sardis, because Jesus *uses* that in what He says to them.
- 4. Sardis was located in a perfect spot.
 - a. People of the ancient world looked for 3 things when starting a settlement:
 - 1) Plenty of fresh water.
 - 2) Good soil for crops.
 - 3) And place that was easy to defend against attack.
 - b. Sardis had all 3.
 - 1) The Pactolus River flows through –
 - 2) A wide, flat valley of rich fields.
 - 3) And a hill with steep sides & flat top provided a prime place for a refuge.
 - c. So Sardis became a prosperous city that dominated its region.
- 5. But what kicked it into high gear was when **gold** was found in the river.
 - a. It set off a boom that saw Sardis become fabulously rich.
 - b. The legend of *Midas*, the king whose touch turned things into gold, comes from Sardis.
 - c. It's King *Croesus* used the gold collected from the river to make Sardis a sumptuous center of luxury.
 - d. He also built massive walls all around the city; making it impregnable.
 - e. There was so much gold produced in Sardis they had to find a way to measure & transport it and came up with the idea of *coins*.
 - f. So, in a way, the concept of **money** started there at Sardis.
- 6. The Persian King Cyrus the Great conquered this region in the 6th C. BC.
 - a. When he arrived at Sardis, he laid in a siege.
 - b. 2 weeks later when it was clear Sardis would outlast the Persians besiegers Cyrus promised a huge reward to any soldier who could figure out a way to take the city.
 - c. A couple days later, a Persian ambitious for the reward was scouting the hillside for a way up.
 - d. It looked so steep it seemed to be a suicide mission to scale the hill.
 - e. The Sardian soldiers could just shoot arrows down on them as they climbed up.
 - f. But this Persian watched as one of the guards took off his helmet and set it on the wall.
 - 1) A bit later he accidentally bumped it & sent it over the wall, where it rolled down quite a ways behind some boulders.
 - 2) The guard looked over & watched it roll, noting where it ended up.
 - 3) Then he disappeared & was gone for a while.
 - 4) When he re-appeared at his post, low & behold, his helmet was on his head!
 - 5) The Persian watching all this realized there had to be **both** a secret door in the wall, as well as a path down, and so up, the hillside.
 - g. That night being a full moon, he gathered a small group of other soldiers and led them to the place where the helmet had rolled to.
 - 1) Sure enough, there was a little path leading up to the walls and a cleverly hidden door in the wall.
 - 2) They assumed it would be locked; the city being under siege and all.
 - 3) But as they pushed it, they found it open!
 - 4) They prepared to battle the guards that must be waiting just inside but as they slipped into the city, there was no one there.
 - 5) No one was guarding the door.
 - 6) And there didn't look to be anyone watching the walls.
 - h. So they quietly made their way through the streets to the front gate where they opened them to Cyrus & the waiting Persian army.
 - i. The City fell with little loss of blood or life.
- 7. The Sardians were so confident in their reputation as an unconquerable city, they hadn't bothered to post a

night guard.

- a. They assumed their walls and reputations was enough to protect them.
- b. And their immense wealth w/all the luxury it bought had **softened** them so they valued **sleep** more than safety.
- 8. Their defeat by the Persians was a major embarrassment.
- 9. But they soon got over it as they settled into a new routine under a new ruler.
- 10. And 200 years later, then the *Greeks* came through the area, it happened all over again.
 - a. The Greeks laid siege to the city.
 - b. And one night a Greek soldier who was scouting the hills found a path that led to a secret door.
 - c. There was no one watching the walls and Sardis again fell without much of a fight.
- 11. With that as our background, let's take a look at what Jesus says to this Church . . .

V1

- ¹ "And to the angel of the church in Sardis write, 'These things says He who has the 7 Spirits of God and the 7 stars:
- 1. Since the word angel means messenger, it's best to see this ltr as addressed to the pastor of the church at Sardis.
 - a. He'd read it to the congregation,
 - b. And be the one responsible for applying any instructions Jesus gives.
- 2. As in each of the 7 ltrs, Jesus identifies Himself by a part of the vision the Apostle John had had of Jesus in His glory in ch. 1.
- 3. Here, Jesus says He's the One in Whom dwells the **fullness of the Spirit**.
 - a. That stands in contrast to *this* church which *lacks* the Spirit.
- 4. And He's the one Who holds the 7 stars.
 - a. We'd best go back & read the last v. of ch. 1 to see what the 7 stars represent

Rev 1:20 • The mystery of the 7 stars which you saw in My right hand, & the 7 golden lampstands: The 7 stars are the angels of the 7 churches, and the 7 lampstands which you saw are the 7 churches.

- b. In the vision John had of Jesus, He saw Him walking in the midst of 7 golden lampstands which represent the 7 churches of chs2-3, & holding 7 stars, symbols of their 7 pastors.
- c. The idea is that Jesus in IN His church and knows what's going on.
- d. The pastors are His agents, bringing His message in The light of His Word.
- e. The pastor of the church at Sardis needed to be reminded that the Church belongs to Jesus and that he's there to do His Lord's bidding; not pursue his own agenda.
- 5. As we'll see, it Church at Sardis had forgotten all this.
- 6. They'd lost touch with the reality that *It's All About Jesus!*
- 7. Still in v1, Jesus launches into an analysis of the church. It's not pretty.

I know your works,

- a. In the previous 4 ltrs, Jesus commends something before getting to the correction.
 - 1) Years ago I attended a course when I was in restaurant management.
 - 2) It was how to give a performance appraisal.
 - 3) We were told to use the Hamburger method.
 - a) A hamburger has a bun w/a top & bottom and the meat in-between.
 - b) So, you start off with a review with something **positive** a **commendation**.
 - c) Then you get to the meat; where they're falling short, & what they need to improve.
 - d) And you finish w/another positive remark.
- b. Jesus doesn't use the hamburger method here.
- c. This is a burger protein style; No bun all meat.
- d. There's just **nothing** to commend here. It's . . .
- "I know your works, that you have a name that you are alive, but you are dead.
- 8. They had a *reputation* for being a good church, but that's *all* they had A Rep.
- 9. There was no substance, no reality behind the report.
- 10. Take note:
 - a. Jesus doesn't ding them for cooling their affection for Him as He did at Ephesus.
 - b. He doesn't dock them for moral & spiritual compromise as He had at Pergamos.

- c. He doesn't call them out for tolerating false teaching as at Thyatira.
- 11. This was a church that LOOKED good. >> But its *appearance* was *deceiving*.
- 12. Drive thru the area & take note of all the church buildings.
 - a. Cruise around & count how many little churches you find.
 - b. Seems like every street has at least a couple.
 - c. They all have signs out front; many with "Jesus" or "Christ" on them.
 - d. Jesus >> The One Who rose from the Dead to live forevermore. The giver of Eternal Life.
 - e. A church that takes *His name* as part of *their name* ought to be capital-A = Alive!
 - f. Some are! But a bunch aren't & haven't been for years.
 - 1) On a Sunday morning, no more than a dozen people are scattered across a room that seats a couple hundred.
 - 2) Then there's the church down the street that's *packed*.
 - a) The parking lot is full & the chairs are filled.
 - b) The music is pro & the message is thrilling.
 - c) But it's as **spiritually** dead as the place down the street with a dozen frozen chosen –
 - d) Because the Jesus that's on their sign is not IN their service.
- 13. I know this sounds harsh; but look at what Jesus said to the Church at Sardis

You have a name that you are alive, but you are dead.

- 14. Over the years at CCO, we've had a handful of people who've visited & then said we're a dead church.
 - a. When I ask why they think so, they say because the gifts of the Spirit aren't in operation.
 - b. They want to **see** people being slain in the spirit & **hear** people speaking in tongues & giving prophesies.
 - c. Because they don't see or hear these things, they say we're dead.
- 15. We believe in the gifts of the Spirit; and they are in operation, all the time.
 - a. But no, we don't turn our services over to them because we try to follow Paul's instructions in 1 Cor. 14 that all things ought to be done decently and in order.
 - b. And no we don't knock people down when praying for them because that isn't in the Word.
- 16. I know we're alive & Jesus IS in our service because lives are changed for the glory of God!
 - a. Lost souls are repenting of their sin & being saved.
 - b. Marriages are being put back together against all hope.
 - c. Broken relationships are being restored & broken hearts are being healed.
- 17. The Spirit IS here & working powerfully!
- 18. But what Jesus says here is STILL an important challenge for us.
- 19. And I believe it's an urgent caution for some of you.
 - a. In a church this size, there's a chance there's someone who thinks they're good w/God because they've always gone to church.
 - b. Or when the survey comes & they have to pick a religious affiliation, they tick "Christian", because, well they're not a Hindu, Buddhist, Muslim, & certainly not an atheist. So they're a Christian by process of elimination.
 - c. Or maybe you understand that religion plays an important part in the life of a good person; & you are so you go to church to pay your religious dues.
 - d. Or maybe you're in a program that **requires** you to go to church, & you figure, as long as you have to be here, you might as well smile & get along. It's less painful that way.
 - e. I could go on. But the point is this Is all this RELIGION to you, or RELATIONSHIP?
 - f. Is it about Church, or Jesus?
- 20. Collectively, I don't think Horizonte is Sardis. But it *could* be.
 - a. You see, the people of Sardis had it pretty good.
 - 1) They were affluent; & used to the good life their wealth bought them.
 - b. The people of the Church there weren't being persecuted.
 - c. Their Faith wasn't really costing them anything in terms of the culture.
 - d. It just wasn't difficult being a Christian in Sardis.
 - e. And the laid-back attitude of the CITY carried over into the Church.
- 21. There's something I haven't mentioned yet about Sardis.

- There was a huge temple to the goddess Artemis there. a.
- We already talked about the magnificent temple to Artemis in Ephesus. b.
- The 1 in Sardis wasn't as grand, but it played an **even more important** role in the life of the City. c.
- d. Artemis was their chief deity; the Mother Goddess they attributed their immense wealth to.
- To show their loyalty, every woman of the city had to dedicate herself for several months of her young adult life as a ritual prostitute.
- f. And it was the duty of all the men to visit them, paying the requisite fee to "worship" Artemis.
- Sardis was a sex-saturated society; rationalized & excused under the banner of being loyal.
- 22. In many ways, this society is a re-heated version of ancient Sardis.
 - We're affluent & being a Christian doesn't cost us much. a.
 - Hey, and we're served by a whole smorgasbord of church options. b.
 - If we don't like it here, we can go there, & try that for a while until we hear something we don't like, then we'll go someplace else.
 - And the culture is obsessed with sex.
 - Christians who desire to hold to a Biblical morality are pressed to be loyal to the liberal ideals of a false tolerance. The claim is, that's what's made our nation great.
 - It's gotten to the point now that refusing to go along with the world's crazy ideas about sex is seen as disloyal & dangerous to a free society!
- 23. Any church that capitulates to the culture forsakes its call to be holy.
- 24. The <u>Holy</u> Spirit won't stay in a church that doesn't want to be holy.
- 25. And when the Spirit leaves, death comes.
- 26. The parking lot & seats may be full but that church is dead, as far as Jesus is concerned.

V2

- 1. So Jesus says –
- ² Be watchful, & strengthen the things which remain, that are ready to die, for I have not found your works perfect before God.
- For the Sardians, those first 2 words *had to sting*.
 - They well-knew their history & the 2 times their city fell because no one was watching.
 - Jesus says the church has slipped into the same dangerous place.
- And as deplorable as their spiritual condition was, it wasn't **hopeless**. 3.
- 4. Things could still turn around, but they must act quickly. 5.
 - That word "perfect" means complete.
 - Jesus didn't demand *perfection*; that they be without flaw.
 - He means they hadn't set themselves to go on in grace INTO spiritual maturity. b.
- They saw their faith in Jesus as "fire insurance." 6.
 - They'd taken Him as Savior, but not Lord.
 - They'd been born-again, & were content to remain spiritual infants. b.
 - They'd gotten off to a good start, but stopped.
- Jesus' warning reveals an important axiom: If we aren't moving forward, we're drifting back. 7.
 - There's just no standing still in our walk w/God.
 - The HS is on mission in us to conform us to the image of Christ. b.
 - c. **WE** must <u>yield to the Spirit</u> to take us **into** that image.
 - If we **resist** Him, our old nature will reassert itself & take over.
- 8. Christian: Please hear this—Do you *long* to grow up in grace?
 - Do you ache to be more like Jesus? // Do you ask God to change you?
 - Or have you settled in where you are & decided you've gone as far as you want w/Jesus?
- At Sardis, the HS had convicted & won them to faith in Christ. They'd been born again.
- 10. They were going to get into heaven. But they balked at heaven getting into them.
- 11. And the HS was bummed. In Eph. 4:30 we read

Do not grieve the HS of God, by whom you were sealed for the day of redemption.

- 12. That's EXACTLY what they'd done in Sardis; grieved the Spirit.
- 13. Jesus' words prove it. They are dead; & the Spirit is about to go. So Jesus says

Strengthen the things which remain, that are ready to die

- 14. When we go back-packing, we try to light a campfire with a single match.
 - a. We gather pine needles & tiny twigs. Light the match & hope it catches.
 - b. But the air is thin and often times the kindling is damp.
 - c. The flame of the match catches, but after a first little flare, it drops to just a glowing ember & a lot of smoke.
 - d. But there's a trick to get it going: blow on it!
 - 1) Not hard because that puts the ember out.
 - 2) A gentle puff; enough to get a little more oxygen to that glowing ember.
- 15. That's the picture here. The fire has gone out in Sardis.
 - a. All that's left is a glowing ember & smoke.
 - b. They need Jesus to blow on them and rekindle their faith.
 - c. But they must want it. They must ask.

V3

- ^{3a} Remember therefore <u>how you have received and heard;</u> hold fast and repent.
- 1. They key to their turnaround is to **remember** how they got started.
 - a. They'd heard the Gospel, repented of their sin, & put their faith in Jesus.
 - b. Jesus is telling them to go back & renew THAT.
- 2. When married couples go through a rough patch, they often come out the other side w/a re-commitment to one another & the marriage.
 - a. To mark that they will often renew their vows.
 - b. Couples who've been married for yrs & things are great, renew their vows.
 - c. When they do, they go back in their memory to their wedding when they were younger.
- 3. THAT's what Jesus calls for here. Start again!
- 4. "Don't just keep playing this religious game. Make it real! Make it about Me" He says.
- ^{3b} Therefore if you will not watch, I will come upon you as a thief, & you will not know what hour I will come upon you.
- 5. He dings them yet again w/a reference to their embarrassing past & calls them to "Wake-up!"

V4

- ⁴ You have a few names even in Sardis who have not defiled their garments; & they shall walk w/Me in white, for they are worthy.
- 1. The pagans had a rule when they went to the temples of their idols
- 2. Wear your best & cleanest clothes // No one was admitted who wore dirty or ragged duds.
- 3. As Jesus examines His church in Sardis, while the people *look* good; spiritually, it's like they've just emerged from a muddy Rugby scrum.
 - a. What Jesus sees is embarrassing. They're a ragged mess!
 - b. And note this: While in the previous 2 churches, Pergamos & Thyatira, only a *minority* had erred,
 - c. In Sardis, it was only a few who *hadn't*.
 - d. All their religion was like spraying cologne on a corpse.
- 4. In Jude 23, a "defiled garment" is code for the sins of the flesh.
 - a. Their refusal to walk in the Spirit meant the Sardians were in the flesh.
 - b. And that meant capitulating to the world.
 - c. That accounts for why they weren't being persecuted;
 - d. For why the enemy wasn't harassing them with false teachers.
 - e. They presented no threat to him. Best to let the sleeping dog lie.
- 5. While the majority in the church there were clueless; *there were a few* who got it.
 - a. They walked in the Spirit. They yearned to go deeper in grace; further/Jesus.
 - b. THEY were the very ones most inclined to *hear & heed* these words from Jesus.
 - c. He knows who they are. And He sees their loyalty in the midst of a dead church.

Vs5-6

- ⁵ He who overcomes shall be clothed in white garments, & I will not blot out his name from the Book of Life; but I will confess his name before My Father & before His angels.
- 1. This promise is for those who overcome by following thru on what Jesus just said to do.

- 2. White meant 2 things; **Purity** & **Victory**. Both are in view here.
- 3. This promise of white garments is the promise of our **final victory over sin**.
- 4. Sin will be no more; neither it's deceptive appeal nor its bitter, death-dealing result.
- 5. And our names won't be expunged from the Book of Life.
 - a. That Book holds the names of all the saved, all those destined for eternal life.
 - b. Here's another passage that has to be understood in the light of that time.
 - 1) In the ancient world, *citizenship* wasn't based on your nation or kingdom; it was determined by your city. It's where the *word* comes from. [Is the word for citizenship & city similar in Spanish?]
 - 2) Every city kept a **registry** of its citizens.
 - 3) Their name in the book meant they had all the rights of citizenship in that city.
 - 4) But if someone did something dishonorable, something to bring shame on the city, their name was removed from the registry.
 - c. The reward for overcomers is **full citizenship** in heaven.
 - d. More than that: Jesus will **personally announce** our names in heaven to the Father & all the angels so they know we belong there.

⁶ "He who has an ear, let him hear what the Spirit says to the churches." '

- 6. We've covered a lot today.
- 7. All I can say is: This passage has challenged me in 2 ways . . .
 - 1) First; as a *pastor*.

The culture here and where I lie is an awful lot like that of ancient Sardis.

So I have to consider the very real possibility what Jesus said to Sardis may apply to our church in Oxnard & U need to consider of it applies here.

2) Second; this letter provokes me personally.

I never want to slide into spiritual autopilot.

There's heaven. I go to church & am a moral person. I can just coastCoast.
