a. Physical Description





- God commands it to be built and describes it (Exodus 25:10-22)
- God appoints Oholiab & Bezalel to build it (Ex 31:1-11)
- Making the Ark (Exodus 37:1-9)
- Coming before the Ark happened once a year on the day of atonement (Lev. 16)
- Instructions for the Ark Numbers 4:16-20
- Levites carry the ark ahead of the people and God parts the Jordan (Joshua 3)
- The Ark is carried around Jericho in Joshua 6:4
- At Christ's death, the curtain separating the ark was torn (Mark 15:37-38)

c. Theological significance

19 Therefore, brothers, since we have confidence to enter the holy places by the blood of Jesus, 20 by the new and living way that he opened for us through the curtain, that is, through his flesh, 21 and since we have a great priest over the house of God, 22 let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water.

Laws Concerning Israel's Kings

14 "When you come to the land that the Lord your God is giving you, and you possess it and dwell in it and then say, 'I will set a king over me, like all the nations that are around me,' 15 you may indeed set a king over you whom the Lord your God will choose. One from among your brothers you shall set as king over you. You may not put a foreigner over you, who is not your brother. 16 Only he must not acquire many horses for himself or cause the people to return to Egypt in order to acquire many horses, since the Lord has said to you, 'You shall never return that way again.' 17 And he shall not acquire many wives for himself, lest his heart turn away, nor shall he acquire for himself excessive silver and gold. 18 "And when he sits on the throne of his kingdom, he shall write for himself in a book a copy of this law, approved by the Levitical priests. 19 And it shall be with him, and he shall read in it all the days of his life, that he may learn to fear the Lord his God by keeping all the

words of this law and these statutes, and doing them, 20 that his heart may not be lifted up above his brothers, and that he may not turn aside from the commandment, either to the right hand or to the left, so that he may continue long in his kingdom, he and his children, in Israel.





WHY WAS GOD SEVERE TO THOSE WHO LOOKED AT THE ARK? 4 This is the service of the sons of Kohath in the tent of meeting: the most holy things.... 15 And when Aaron and his sons have finished covering the sanctuary and all the furnishings of the sanctuary, as the camp sets out, after that the sons of Kohath shall come to carry these, but they must not touch the holy things, lest they die. These are the things of the tent of meeting that the sons of Kohath are to carry.... 20 but they shall not go in to look on the holy things even for a moment, lest they die."
