What are the first things you do when you get up and going in the morning? There are so many possibilities! Showering, brushing the teeth, getting dressed, getting a cup of coffee or juice, maybe making a smoothie or energy drink, having breakfast, checking in on your phone for the latest emails and messages... Psalm 5 is a great reminder that we need to include quality time with the Lord every morning as part of how we begin our day. Like King David, there are times in my life when I have struggled to maintain that priority consistently.

I first heard Psalm 5:1-3 set to music, back around 1980, and it really struck a chord in my heart. It was a time when Donna and I were hurting, a time of uncertainty in our lives, a time of having to truly "wait upon the Lord". I decided to make this passage, this song, my morning anthem.

Each morning I would softly sing it and begin letting my heart out to God. I would read and meditate on a portion of His Word. I would direct my questions and concerns to Him (Phil. 4:6), then listen for His gentle replies in my spirit. What a difference this model from King David has made in my life throughout the years! In verses 1-7, David laments and agonizes over his situation. Is God going to answer him before he dies? In verse 8, there is a transition. God has truly heard his weeping and cries for mercy.

"Are you in soul trouble? Follow David's example. Talk with the Lord all the way through the night hours. It will not always be like this. Because of Jesus you know more about God than David did. You have an intercessor in your heart, the Holy Spirit. Take heart today, God has an answer." George O. Wood

DAY 5 JANUARY 9, 2020

GENESIS 11:1-13:4

Abraham certainly faced storms in his life. The passage for today is full of struggles, but it starts with a wonderful moment of calm in the midst of these storms. "The Lord was gracious to Sarah and did for Sarah what He had promised" (21:1). Like us, they had to wait a long time, but eventually God's promise was fulfilled. If you're like me, I dislike the waiting stage. And the challenge is to keep on trusting God no matter what. Abraham was about to face the biggest storm of his life: 'God tested Abraham' (22:1).

God sometimes allows us to be tested. Personally, I don't think God ever intended for a moment that Abraham would actually sacrifice his son Isaac. But, he wanted to check on Abraham's priorities. The New Testament reminds us that this test came after God's promise to Abraham about Isaac (Hebrews 11:17–19). So it was really a test of Abraham's faith and his priorities.

This was a test of faith, because it challenged him to trust that God would fulfill his promises about Isaac, even if Abraham was willing to sacrifice him. Abraham had to trust that no matter what happened... Isaac would be restored to him (v.19).

Yet it was also a test of Abraham's priorities. Our relationship with God is meant to be the number one priority of our life – above all other loves, the vision God has given you for your life and even above your closest relationships. Abraham was willing to obey God whatever the cost. His greatest strength was that he loved God more than anything or anyone.

Thankfully, God provided the sacrifice that was necessary (Genesis 22:8). As you think about how Abraham must have felt at the thought of sacrificing his son, you catch a glimpse of what it cost God to give His one and only Son for you and me (John 3:16).

Jesus is 'the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world' (John 1:29). If God provided the ultimate sacrifice to meet your greatest need, will He not also provide for all your other needs? May you never lose sight of that truth, because it is His character...

God is our provider. So often, I have found this to be true in my own life and in our community. God is true to his promise. As the apostle Paul put it, 'My God will meet all your needs according to his glorious riches in Christ Jesus' (Philippians 4:19).

As you pursue Him, remember that He is always your provider. God, give me the strength to trust you and to not be afraid. May you be the number one priority in my life.

"Why am I fasting? Why did I give up Thai? Isn't food and relaxing a good thing?" About one week into a fast I find myself asking myself this question, as if I can use Scripture to talk myself out of the rest of the fasting period or justify stopping my fast. My flesh is dying and screaming at me. It wants what it wants. "I know Jesus did these things and I want to be like Jesus so I try to incorporate the disciplines He would do.... But did I really hear God right?"

Have you ever been there? You felt like you heard from God, but now in the midst of having to commit to the decision you are wondering, "Did God really say...." (echoing those words of the crafty serpent in Genesis 3:1). Maybe you are forgetting WHY you are fasting and doubting your decision, like I did. You may wondering how withstanding from things like social media, food, etc.. is going to benefit your relationship with God and make you more like Jesus. Or maybe you made some special life resolutions for this year, but trials are already coming up making it feel impossible to keep this up another day or week, let alone for the whole year!

There are so many areas we can lack clarity and when motivation runs out we are left wondering why we ever agreed to take these steps of trusting the Lord. We start doubting ourselves. But Proverbs 3:5-6 reminds us that sometimes trusting God may not make sense in our own understanding. It is a step of faith, and an invitation to lean on God rather than yourself. When we take time to acknowledge God and invite him into our journey, He will make our paths straight. What a comfort!

Wherever you are at with your fast, the beginning of the year or life in general, remember to Trust in God and Acknowledge Him. Invite Him in. Then He will make your paths straight. Our understanding is fickle and when we fast or make decisions for the sake of our relationship and life with Christ, we are stepping into a Holy Invitation.... an invitation to lean on the wisdom and ways of God rather than our own.... trusting the One who sees all of eternity right in front of Him.

I'm a sinner... I'm sick... I'm a tax collector. I think Web MD is an interesting concept.

In a search bar you can give some basic information, give your symptoms, and almost instantly you have a potential list of what could be wrong with you, ranging from things like "you're dehydrated" to "you're probably going to die in 1 minute." While this is an obvious exaggeration, the idea of an impersonal doctor doesn't mean much to me. If my doctor refused to see me because I wasn't feeling well, I would be pretty mad. That's their job right? They took that position to help the sick, even if it meant being exposed to what they had, and not diagnose you from afar.

Thankfully Jesus is the doctor that is willing to work in close proximity to those who are "sick". Jesus spent His time with those who needed Him, not those who were 'perfect' and healthy. One of His close disciples was a tax collector, and another was the one who would eventually betray Him. Yet He chose to walk through life with them. In my "good" days and "bad" days I find comfort in knowing that God is here for me, because I am sick, not because I am perfectly healthy. The reality is, He is walking through life with you, even if you are a tax collector, sick, or a sinner.

There was a rhyme that made its way through the playgrounds of America when I was a kid. I mostly heard it from older cousins who liked having the psychological upper hand. It goes like this:

"I'm the boss applesauce. Understand rubber-band. Don't get wise bubble-eyes, or I'll knock you down to peanut-size."

I didn't understand all the name calling, but I did get the gist of the poetic point – I am not the boss here. I am not in control.

Anyone who has tried to get, gain or maintain control knows how this works. Maybe it's the same with our own wisdom. Sure, I have picked up a few tricks to fix things, given punny comebacks to awkward situations, and over-simplified colloquialisms to try to provide answers when people need help. All of them feel like knowledge-based solutions.

If wisdom is applied knowledge, then how do we get it? When an idea works for us once? When we've failed a hundred times? When we have come through pain, suffering or depression and have empathy? Do I allow God the freedom and access to lead me as He gives opportunities to gain wisdom? What if God uses experiences to teach us His ways, His will. Maybe wisdom is a process where we find out we are not in control, but He is and He is better at it.

One of the over-arching prayers among those who have gone through a 12-Step or rehab program is this:

God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change,

Courage to change the things I can,

And wisdom to know the difference.

Lord, may I release control and find healing and strength in my body.

Grief is a mandatory companion of loss. In Christ's time people were quick to seize the opportunity and generate a display. Jesus was ushered into just such a scene, deep in grief and fresh with loss. But oddly he did not join in. Even worse, Jesus' interpretation, calling death "sleep," turned mourners into irate mockers. You see, Jesus had a much bigger plan. He often does.

Has Jesus' response to your pain left you wanting more? Has he failed to add to the noise?

When Glenn and I experienced a loss and were frustrated that judgment and restitution did not fall from the sky, a much wiser person than myself revealed and reminded me of what God was up to – He was transforming me into the image of His Son. This is God's life-saving mercy and in this way, God is always at work in our lives.

The wonderful part of the Biblical story is that the child was raised up and restored.

The wonderful part of God's story today is that He transforms our dead and destructive ways, as well as our misplaced trust, and He restores to life those who are yielded, both here and now, and in eternity. Don't fight him when he shuts the door on the noise and invites you in for something more. Know that He has a really good plan!

Have you ever trusted someone and then they took advantage of you? Well, you are in good company! David had been anointed king of Israel, but now finds himself in a place where he is deeply discouraged and distraught because someone close to him has betrayed him. He even says that "those who are loyal have vanished from the human race".

A long time ago, I had a friend whom I trusted and shared my thoughts and secrets with. One day, we found ourselves on different sides of an issue that created a division between us.

(If we entertain our negative thoughts, seeds of betrayal can take root in our hearts).

As the situation unfolded, my friend shared her changed opinion of me, with an individual who had the power to levy a change in my life, that would redirect my path. My first response to this betrayal was to allow the wound to fester and grow. However, when I began to remember who God was, what He had led me through before, and how much He loved me, then I begin to gain the courage to move forward and thrive. Emotionally and mentally, I was freed from the crippling effects of betrayal! Eventually, the friend and I reconciled, and God led me into a season that was filled with unexpected joy!

David's prayer doesn't reflect Biblical truth, but rather his emotional state. Betrayal is a deep, throbbing wound that can bring us to the point where we don't trust anyone. As David processes who God is and His faithfulness, his emotional tenor begins to change. You can trust God to keep His word. His opinion of you will never change. He will always love you and never betray you. He is the ultimate, ever faithful loyal friend!

"SO EVERYONE WHO ACKNOWLEDGES ME BEFORE MEN, I ALSO WILL ACKNOWLEDGE BEFORE MY FATHER WHO IS IN HEAVEN, BUT WHOEVER DENIES ME BEFORE MEN, I ALSO WILL DENY BEFORE MY FATHER WHO IS IN HEAVEN."



The NKJV that I grew up with has "confess" instead of "acknowledge." As a new Christian, I ran across this passage and imagined a scenario of standing before a firing squad and being threatened with death if I didn't verbally renounce Jesus. Still riding the wave of enthusiasm that comes from recent conversion, I imagined myself bravely maintaining my confession of faith in God. In my mind, I satisfied my obligation concerning the passage, leaving God obligated to satisfy His.

That was a long time ago and my understanding of this passage has matured over the years. Where I once thought this passage only concerned a verbal confession, I now understand it to be broad enough to include a living confession as well. You see, there are many who make a verbal confession, but who simultaneously demonstrate a living denial of Jesus as Lord of their life. The fruit of their actions contradicts their profession of faith.

Have you ever heard of "stolen valor"? This means that someone has tried to make others believe that they've served in the military, when in reality they haven't. They will even wear a uniform, which often includes service patches and maybe even some medals, and they won't shy away from making a verbal confession when addressed in conversation.

Are we engaging in a type of spiritual stolen valor? Are we satisfied to think that we'll probably affirm Christ if put on the spot by a co-worker, yet live in a way that denies that verbal confession? Resolve this year to acknowledge Jesus not just in speech, but in action also... in word and in deed.

- 2 HE PUT THE MAIDS AND THEIR CHILDREN IN FRONT, AND LEAH AND HER CHILDREN NEXT, AND RACHEL AND JOSEPH LAST.
- 3 BUT HE HIMSELF PASSED ON AHEAD OF THEM AND BOWED DOWN TO THE GROUND SEVEN TIMES, UNTIL HE CAME NEAR TO HIS BROTHER.
- 4 THEN ESAU RAN TO MEET HIM AND EMBRACED HIM, AND FELL ON HIS NECK AND KISSED HIM, AND THEY WEPT.



Do we have fears and anxiety? The wealthy Jacob (a liar, cheat, and deceiver) was journeying back to Canaan. During this time, his brother Esau (his earliest 'victim') had become very powerful in his own right. Jacob was one who had talked with God and been led by angels.

Though he had a close relationship with God, still he was anxious about and even fearful of Esau. He sent expensive gifts to Esau as though he were a king. He bowed and worshipped him out of fear, not respect. It seems as though Jacob thought that everyone was like himself: lying, deceiving, and unforgiving. All of his preparations for reuniting with his brother came to naught, for when Esau welcomed him, he refused the gifts and revealed that he simply wanted a relationship with Jacob. Do we ignore God's promises, allowing fears and anxieties to take over our minds, thoughts, and actions?

So much time and effort can be spent on projecting our thoughts, feelings, and standards upon others. It interferes with our lives and relationships with people.

The Lord instructs us:

- 1. "Cast all your anxieties upon Him.." 1 Peter 5:7

How do you react when circumstances do not go the way you feel they should have gone? During these times do you complain about your circumstances? Maybe you fall into despair, feeling like you were abandoned by God.

After Joseph was wrongfully accused of seducing Potiphar's (Pharaoh's officer) wife, he lost his position as overseer of the officer's house and even worse, was thrown into prison! This must have been so difficult for Joseph to accept. But even in prison, God was faithful to Joseph and lifted him up as an overseer of all of the prisoners. God eventually went on to elevate Joseph's position to a place where he was given a measure of authority over all of the land of Egypt!

I believe God was not only producing humility in Joseph, but also patience. Ultimately, this was all in preparation for the task of being second in charge in Egypt. God is good and He is faithful. He who began a good work in you will bring it to completion (Phil 1:6), and even if we are faithless, He remains faithful (2 Tim 2:13). 

Did you know that some seeds require fire in order to germinate? The seeds of the lodgepole pine are surrounded by a resin that only melts away by the heat of fire, thus allowing the seeds to settle in the land and grow into the towering pines. Other seeds sit dormant for years, and growth is triggered by chemicals only released during a fire. For these special plants, the same thing that destroys them also brings new life, and it happens simultaneously.

We all walk through times when it seems like everything is burning down, times when dreams are dying all around us. In the midst of those seasons, it seems nearly impossible to hope. How can we even imagine a future filled with something other than devastation when we are doing our best just to survive? Imagine if, at the same time that we are walking through fire, seeds are awakening that would have otherwise lay dormant...silent...still, except for that fire. Imagine the beauty sitting just below the surface, waiting for the fire so it can bloom.

You may be in the middle of your own fire season right now. Joseph surely endured the fire! So let his story remind us that a time will come when we can look back and see how God was planting seeds of hope. He is bringing forth something that would have forever lay in waiting, and you will see His faithfulness through the fire.

20 AS FOR YOU, YOU MEANT EVIL AGAINST ME, BUT GOD MEANT IT FOR GOOD, TO BRING IT ABOUT THAT MANY PEOPLE SHOULD BE KEPT ALIVE, AS THEY ARE TODAY.

21 SO DO NOT FEAR; I WILL PROVIDE FOR YOU AND YOUR LITTLE ONES." THUS HE COMFORTED THEM AND **SPOKE KINDLY TO THEM.**

The fear in the hearts of Joseph's brothers was palpable. In spite of Joseph conveying to them that their evil plan to rid themselves of their younger brother was actually God's plan to save the nation of Israel (see Gen 45:5-8), and with dad out of the picture, they faced a new dilemma:

Do we trust...or do we doubt? Sometimes we are faced with the same dilemma and ask that same question. In spite of all the reassurances that God has given us... that He does not condemn us... that nothing can separate us from His love... doubt can still be a formidable opponent.

A few years ago, I struggled with doubt over a major decision I had to make about my vocation. Do I walk away from a career I loved in order to pursue a new avenue God placed in front of me? In my flesh, I could not comprehend how God could make the numbers work with a looming pay cut. My family would surely be disrupted and was I even sure God was really behind this new path? Within a few weeks, three different people – all unconnected – validated God's plan for me. Once I trusted and committed to that plan, all the concerns that drove my doubt were vanquished.

Friends, God is infinitely good to us. Unfortunately, most of us have experienced bad things in our lives that may cause us to fear... to doubt... or to mistrust. Perhaps the "bad" we experienced was intended by God for a greater purpose, one that could literally save the lives of many others.

I desire for myself and for you that our hearts declare, "Whatever happens today, God is at work!"
