It was very complicated to fly back to Uganda because of COVID restrictions. Praise the Lord—I got back to Uganda on December 9, 2020. I am so glad my sister was saved!

Our primary level 7 (P7) pupils have returned from Christmas break, so I am again teaching. Along with our national teachers, I am trying to prepare P7 to take their Primary Leaving Exam (PLE) in March. The big question is—when will the government open schools for the rest of the primary levels: 1-6? The government is afraid of COVID spiking if they open schools. I know you understand; you are facing similar COVID challenges. Please pray for us as we pray for you.

Despite COVID, 2021 has gotten off to a good start for me. I was able to minister to mothers and daughters in Nebbi Baptist Church January 18 - 23 before I had to start teaching again in our Christian school. This is a wonderful national church that I have had the privilege of ministering to since it first started back in 2003. It was planted by a national pastor, Onyutha Stanley, who wanted to see a church in his hometown. It took me over 8 hours of travel one way on very bad roads to reach there from Soroti. In my last prayer letter, I told you about teaching Biblical Principles of Marriage lessons to a small group of mothers and daughters in our church in Soroti. It was so well received, that I told Pastor Stanley about it. He wanted me to come and teach his ladies. The purpose was to get mothers and daughters communicating about this important topic from a biblical perspective.

The last day I taught in Nebbi, the pastor announced that the ladies had a presentation they wanted to make to me. I have been given different appreciation gifts in the past, but this was the best gift I have ever had! The ladies humbly handed me a piece of paper while a representative read it to me. The first part was an excellent summary of what I taught them. The second part was headed “Resolutions.” The ladies had made resolutions based on what I taught! The ladies had resolved to start a fellowship of mothers and daughters to meet at least twice a month so that they could continue to share “godly values with the daughters for their growth.” Wow, what a blessing for me!
