#### **ONLINE PROGRAM**

Last summer, as it became clear that schools would need to pivot their entire learning model, we too saw that Academy 4 would have to look different this year. Our staff and volunteers spent the summer completely flipping our program to an online model. As you can imagine this was no small feat, requiring creativity and logistical work to ensure our mentors could still meet students in a safe and effective way. In all honesty, it was difficult and laborintensive, and we weren't even sure we would see a positive outcome. But, as always, our dedicated community came through and made online Academy 4 Fridays an amazing time of fun and connection.

Each Academy 4 Friday, mentors and 4th graders gathered on Zoom where they enjoyed the LEADERS Assembly and then met in groups of four for mentoring time. Students and mentors built real relationships and learned what it means to be a leader. Together they processed the hardships of the pandemic, the challenges of online learning, the effects of the Texas winter storm, and more. Through dedication and resilience, both students' and mentors' lives were changed for the better.



#### **SUPPORT FOR SCHOOLS**

This year, Academy 4 volunteers and partners recognized the unique difficulties that the pandemic brought to our partner schools. Together, we decided to not only support the social and emotional needs of teachers and students, but their physical needs as well.

#### **School Supplies**

Throughout the year, Academy 4 church partners stepped up to provide school supplies, snacks, individual water bottles, teachers' room supplies, and classroom supplies to our partner schools.



#### **Technology Donations**

At the beginning of the school year, many school districts were struggling to attain enough technology for the new online learning model which required every student to have a laptop. Thanks to the generosity of our donors, Academy 4 supplied over 300 laptops and headsets to our partner schools in Fort Worth.

Would they have much to talk about? And how in the world would he remain interesting the entire time? Luckily, today's leadership trait was Encourage.

Meanwhile, Chad's mentee, Hunter, was excited to experience his first Academy 4 Friday. He had heard so much about the program and how much fun he would have. Even so, just like Chad, Hunter was a bit anxious about meeting his mentor and how it might go. Little did Chad and Hunter know they were meant to connect.

As LEADERS Assembly ended and mentor time began, the pair began to make their way through their workbook together, and here came the question that made it all click: "When was a time you needed encouraging?" Chad thought for a minute and decided to take a risk and share something he had not shared with many people as an adult. He shared that he is dyslexic, and as a child, he struggled and needed a lot of encouragement from others. Immediately, Chad noticed Hunter's eyes lighting up on the screen. Hunter leaned forward and shared "I'm dyslexic too."

All apprehension melted away and the pair knew they were meant to be together this year! Chad began to share how encouragement helped him overcome his fears of being dyslexic and how taking advantage of various resources helped him. Hunter and Chad not only learned they shared a struggle in common, but they both walked away with changed lives, feeling encouraged and equipped to encourage others!


#### **Did You Know?**
