Overcoming Depression

Depression has been called the common cold of emotional challenges. Even the saints of God get depressed. Anyone of us can fall prey to looking at life with a melancholy spirit because it's easy to see our circumstance from a negative viewpoint. Granted, some people are clinically depressed due to a chemical imbalance, but anyone who suffers under an extended period of physical and mental exhaustion mixed together with a real life crisis may suffer depression.



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For example, the prophet Elijah had been fearless for three years, even dealing a major defeat to the prophets of Baal on Mount Carmel (see 1 Kings 17-19). Yet he fell into a season of depression when his life was threatened by Queen Jezebel, a worshipper of pagan gods. Elijah became an emotional basket case, because he was physically and mentally depleted and began to view himself as a failure.

Emotional reasoning can be destructive because feelings are not always based on facts. We make a mistake in one area and feel like we are total failures because we exaggerate the negative. We can easily fall into the comparison trap by believing we should look like and perform like someone else, or we may take on false blame and assume responsibility for someone's else's feelings or someone else's decisions.

Overcoming the type of depression many people experience requires applying God's remedy to our whole person. First, take care of your physical needs with a healthy diet, regular exercise and sleep. Second, give your frustrations to God through worship, prayer and Bible reading. Thirdly, seek a healthy community to connect toon a regular basis.

God sent Elijah an Angel and after he had rested, the prophet got back to work. You may be the person God is sending to help someone dealing with depression or you may need to ask God to send someone to you. Remember, "The Lord is near to the brokenhearted and saves the crushed in spirit." Psalm 34:18.
