From the Pastor

Even though "Baptism at the River" was last month, I can't get it out of my head because of an exciting detail I noticed there. Among the twenty-five people who were baptized, half were young adult men. That's something to pay attention to.

In modern America, young adult men are among the hardest demographics to reach with the gospel. I don't know all the reasons but suspect they have to do with our nation's disengagement with religion in general; a prevailing culture that isn't just thoroughly secular but often antagonistic toward the church; and, for many, the lack of a father to direct them toward spiritual maturity.

Yet on June 2 at the river, many from this group bucked the trend and made the courageous decision to publicly identify with Jesus through baptism. Single and married. Caucasian and African-American. Students and professionals. One by one they walked into the river, confessed that they had repented of sin and received Jesus as their personal Savior and were fully immersed in best Baptist fashion.

They'll not soon forget it. I was standing knee deep in the river and know first-hand how cold it was. Maybe the water had just been released from the base of the dam a few miles upriver. Maybe the summer sun hadn't yet warmed it up. Whatever the explanation, when those guys came up from the water, they were shivering and sputtering like they'd been plunged into an ice bath. As a Baptist preacher, I wouldn't have it any other way.

I was of course thrilled as their pastor. But on another level, I've been wondering ever since what led those young men to do something so counter-cultural. After talking with some other folks, I've come to several conclusions.

First, I think many young men today have a yearning for stability and permanence. I'm no psychologist, but I've talked to enough of them to realize how many have been wounded or abandoned by their fathers and how that experience could set them on a spiritual journey. They're in a better position than many to hear Jesus' promise, "Come to me all you who are weary and heavy-laden and I will give you rest." As I think back over those baptized at the river, I remember how several are from homes without dads.

Second, young men today hunger for community. Whether students or beginning their professional careers, they live in performance-driven worlds where the main thing is how well they fulfill someone else's standards. But like everyone else, they hunger for the kind of meaningful relationships only community can bring. It's no accident that almost all of the young men baptized at the river were either in a vibrant Sunday School class or in a close relationship with one of our staff ministers.

Third, I know personally from many conversations with some of these young men as well as many others, that they have little interest in shallowness--in their marriages, friendships or faith. They want to dig deep and find what's true, real and personal. That puts added pressure on congregations to invest in listening, coaching and teaching but when we do, we get to be a part of genuine life-change.

Stability. Community. Authenticity. What drew those young men to Jesus has a wider application, I think. Sure, their particular circumstances put them in position to hear from God in a special way. But they're not the only ones. The fact is that any church that will focus on those values--in service to the gospel--will likely bear spiritual fruit. It's not only what people want, it's what they need.



PLUG IN TO POWER UP!

This month, we will continue with our Power Up theme as we learn how Jesus gives us the power to love others – and not just the ones who are easy to love. No, this kind of power is what helps us love everyone! This powerful kind of love looks a lot like goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

Our hope is that in the midst of playing games and laughing, connecting with friends and spending time with small group leaders,

talking with parents at home and driving down the road, our preschoolers will learn how much Jesus wants to help them be all that God made them to be. Everything that Jesus is – love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control – is available to us. All we have to do is plug into the power source and POWER UP!





CHANGING THE WORLD AROUND US



In July, we are continuing to look at each Fruit of the Spirit and the way God uses them in us to change the world around us. We start the month in **James 1:17a**. Jesus' brother, James, shares a bit of wisdom that reminds us how everything that's good comes from God. It's true! Everything good in our lives is because of God. And the best gift that God gives is Jesus. Because of what Jesus did for us, we can show God's goodness to others.

Next, we discover how faithfulness shows up in an incredible moment that Luke records in **Acts 12:1-19**. Peter faithfully served God and preached the message of Jesus. The church faithfully prayed for Peter while he was in prison. God was faithful to Peter and sent an angel to help him escape. They could hardly believe what happened, but everyone praised God for his faithfulness. Faithfulness

will look different for each of us. Some of us will be faithful to family members who need encouragement. Others will faithfully help friends who struggle a bit. We hope kids learn that when they are faithful to others, God can do some amazing things through them.

Next, we head to **Mark 10:13-16** where Mark records a time when Jesus welcomed children, gave them His attention and blessed them. Back then no one thought very highly of children, and what Jesus did would have shocked many who were watching. Jesus displayed gentleness for us through this experience and set the example of how God can help us choose to be gentle.

In **James 3:3-10**, we're reminded that our words have power. James uses practical images like a horse bit, a ship's rudder and a flame to show us just how powerful they are. We can use words to encourage and help others, or we can use our words to hurt them. Self-control can be tricky, especially when we want something badly or when life doesn't go our way, but we know God can help us to have self-control over our words and other actions.

BEAR WITH ONE ANOTHER IN LOVE

Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace.

Ephesians 4:2-3

Since becoming a Sr. Adult pastor and seeing first-hand with my own parents all that is involved with caring for the elderly, I have a great respect for all who work daily in the health care industry with the elderly. When the Apostle Paul wrote these words to the church at Ephesus, I don't think he had caring for the aged in mind, but what a good word this is for what it takes to be a care-giver for others.

When I was growing up, I never heard of an illness called Alzheimer's Disease. I only heard of "hardening of the arteries" or "dementia." But the Alzheimer's Association has reported that 10% of adults in the U.S. over the age of 65 have Alzheimer's, and about 44 million

worldwide suffer from this malady. Actually, Alzheimer's was first diagnosed over 100 years ago. In 1907, a German psychiatrist named Alois Alzheimer, lectured about an autopsy of a 51-year-old woman named Auguste D. who died in 1906 after 5 years of a condition that affected her thinking, language and memory with behavioral issues including hallucinations, delusions, paranoia and aggressive behavior. In 1910, Emil Kraepelin (1856-1926) coined the term 'Alzheimer's disease' – the term used to this day. Here at LBC, in local care facilities, or in homes I have witnessed, many care-givers are living examples of Paul's words. The demands for a spouse or a child or a care-giver to meet the needs of those with dementia can be overwhelming. But I believe that the child of God tightly held by the Spirit's bond of peace can be equipped with the spiritual fruit of gentleness and patience to meet that challenge. Pray right now for someone you know who is living with memory loss, dementia or Alzheimer's and for those who are their care-givers.

FIRST IMPRESSIONS

"You never get a second chance to make a first impression." We have all heard and, probably, tried to live by this wise proverb. Being new here on staff, this saying has been very real in the life of my family. We have been welcomed in with open arms to the staff, the church and the mission of LBC. Being the Missions Associate for Church Planting, I have been able to see the heart for missions and the spreading of the gospel through our involvement in local mission opportunities, especially with FBC West Columbia. FBC West Columbia reached out to LBC for help and we have reciprocated by filling the pulpit and now that I'm here, giving some leadership a couple days a week as we follow God's calling. Since my first visit there several months ago, I've seen a change in that small congregation. It has changed from hopeless to hopeful. There was a feeling that the best days of that church were behind it, but not anymore. There is an expectancy for greater things in the future; more lives changed; more marriages restored; a greater impact in a rapidly changing urban environment.

There have been some big strides taken in that congregation in the past couple months but two of the biggest happened in the recent weeks. Usual attendance is in the mid-eighties on Sunday mornings. On Easter, there were about 170 people there! And there were 3 decisions to follow Jesus as well! Then on Bring the Tithe Sunday, the offering doubled the usual giving. Last, there was Baptism at the River.

I had the honor of baptizing my son and Patrick, a college student from FBCWC in the river. These baptisms are just the beginning of what God is doing down in West Columbia and it is the fruit of our leadership there giving some direction for that congregation. God promises that His word will not return empty (Isaiah 55:11) and we are already seeing this promise come to fruition.





While you don't get a second chance to make a first impression, we do get second chances.

That's what we are giving to our brothers and sisters at FBCWC, a second chance to see God do amazing things through that church again. So please join us in prayer for God to show us His way in this new exploration. THE MANY FACES OF MISSIONS

By the time this article and this month's Signal goes to press, I will have returned from Toronto. But as I write this article, I am sitting in an Airbnb in Newmarket, Canada where I am with a couple of other guys from LBC and we are working with a Church Planter that LBC partners with. As we were driving down the road where we were stopping at every street corner putting out yard signs advertising an event we are helping the Church Planter to have, a phrase came across my mind and heart and I just can't seem to get rid of it. The phrase is, "The many faces of Missions." Now the end goal of Missions is for people to hear about Jesus. That is, and always will be, our end goal which leads to Churches being planted. To get to that point of the gospel being shared and a church being planted, there are many different things that God uses to earn the right to share the gospel. For instance, today we put out yard signs for advertising. What does that have to do with sharing the Gospel? Great question! The answer is that God is always at work and even now, God is working in the hearts of the people of Newmarket. Most of them don't even know it, but the Bible says He is always working. So, He is working in the hearts of people here. As they drive by and see the signs, God uses the signs to inform them about the event. The Spirit of God then nudges folks to come to the event and while at the event, HE connects us with them and we have opportunity to share the Gospel. Some would be a little skeptical of that explanation. I really believe God works in the way I described. Believing that then gives such validity to putting yard signs out.

We have a group I met with to train a few days ago that is headed to Peru. After the training, they got in small groups and worked on the plans/directions the Church Planters in Peru gave us. They are leading soccer camps, crafts with women, VBS for preschoolers and family nights. All of these "many faces" are strategies for sharing the Gospel and Church Planting. At each of those events, the Gospel will be shared.

Herein lies the "many faces" of Missions. Medical teams, Scripture distributions, crafting, soccer - the list could go on. But please understand this is not simply for Mission trips. This is the goal for all we do locally in missions as well. The reason we have Backpack Ministry, Oil Change, Families of Hope, English as a Second Language, Arise, Prison Ministry, StreetSide, School Time Bible, Laces for Love, etc. All of these are the different faces of Missions. Thanks for being a part of the many faces! Thanks for letting

me lead Missions at LBC because everyone has a right to hear.



For the next several hours she interrogated him as to where he had been and who was he with. She wanted to know why he had ignored all of her calls and texts. She simply couldn't believe his actions. She repeatedly asked him what was he thinking? His response was the same over and over, "I wanted to go fishing by myself." This caused even more angst between the couple, for she wanted the whole family to go to the lake and fish. When his frustrated wife finally stopped yelling and asked, "How would you like to spend the next two days without seeing me." To that question the man replied, "That sounds great to me, right now." Well, Monday and Tuesday passed and just like the woman had promised he didn't see his wife either day. Then finally on Wednesday morning the swelling went down in both eyes and the man could finally see his wife again out of the corner of his eyes.

Now I'm not condoning violence, but I feel like the wife had every right to be upset with her husband. His antics were selfish and childish. The husband was thinking of himself and not his family. We have just finished a series of messages at LBC on Improving our Homes. One way to do that is to never look at your journey as a family as a burden. Don't look for ways to escape or see your circumstances as a hindrance. Cherish the moments you have and build memories because one day your kids will grow to be adults and those family moments get harder and harder to come by. Now don't misunderstand, everyone needs a break and husbands and wives need time to recharge and reload for the betterment of their homes. Communication and pre-planning can make these times happen. 
