Answer each of the following questions prompted by today's sermon.

1. What does it mean to you to say, "I vote Jesus for President."?
2. Read John 19: 10 – 11 and Romans 13: 1 - 2. What is God's perspective on earthly authority?
3. Why is it important for the Christian to remember that: "Win or lose...Jesus is still Lord, Lord of this earth, the universe and all things. If you win and your candidate gets elected - Jesus is still Lord. If your candidate loses - Jesus is still Lord."
4. What are we as Christians supposed to do when we see sin and injustice exposed in our government and its leaders?
5. Read each of the following Bible verses and as a group decide what each has to say about God's role/plan for government, our responsibility as Christ followers, or the comfort and reassurance God gives us through these sections of His word.

6. Do you agree or disagree with: “The danger of our lives increases according to the depth of our identification with Jesus.”?
7. Read Revelation 1: 1 - 3; 22: 7. How is it helpful to remember that the book of Revelation is not intended to promote hopeless speculation about times and events in the future. Rather, the book of Revelation is intended to fuel hopeful obedience amidst trials and temptations in the present?
8. React to: “Imagine you got the chance to spend 10 minutes with the newly elected or re-elected President come Jan 2021. Imagine that you were allowed to give him guidance on his role. What would you say? Maybe something like: *“Congratulations. It appears that God wanted you to be President. Let me tell you what His Word says. Did you know your authority comes from God Almighty who sits on His throne in heaven above? He has delegated responsibility to you in this area of His earth to rule rightly and morally. I will not agree with everything you do, but I will commit to pray for you weekly. You have one of the toughest jobs in human history. I pray that you will promote good and punish evil as God defines it. You are ultimately responsible to God and will be judged by Him. Be a wise president who fears God. I am thankful for you. May God Bless you and may God Bless America.”*

9. What would it be like to have Jesus as President?
10. Why would God decide to let men and women be in charge of this world as presidents, kings, and dictators?
11. What are some of the things we are to do as Christians to be a good citizen of the United States?

On your own...

Read the following Scripture verses and reminders about our responsibilities with regards to government this week and use them as your own personal devotional and meditation time.

12. Romans 14:1; 15: 5 – 6. Christians honor Christ by uniting around His Word and refusing to divide over non-essential differences in the world.
13. Romans 14: 23c. When God’s Word speaks clearly and essentially about an issue, obey the Word.
14. Romans 14: 5 – 8. God’s Word does not speak clearly and essentially about an issue, do what you believe best honors Jesus.
15. Romans 12: 9 - 10; 14:15. When others in the church have different convictions on decisions that are not clearly and essentially addressed in God’s Word, love them.
16. James 1:19; Ephesians 4: 1- 3. Listen to and respect others’ convictions.
17. Romans 14:1. Refuse to disparage or quarrel with one another.
18. Romans 14: 19. Build your relationships with others on what is clear and essential in God’s Word.
19. Romans 15: 1 – 3. Look for opportunities to please others in the church who have different convictions than you.
20. 1 Timothy 2: 1 – 6. Who do we pray for? Every kind of person and leaders in high positions. What do we pray for? The promotion of peace and the spread of salvation.
 - a) God desires the salvation of all peoples. 2 Peter 3:9; Ezekiel 33:11
 - b) God deserves the honor of all peoples. Isaiah 45: 21 - 22
 - c) Jesus died for the rescue of all peoples. Revelation 5: 9 - 10
