A Message from our Shepherds

omorrow.... If only we knew what tomorrow has in store. Solomon said it best in our text for the year when he said for you do not know what a day may bring, Proverbs 27.1. Each year when we begin our planning we consider the needs of our congregation. Looking at everything we see happening around us we could not help but consider the concern and anxiety we all have for what lies ahead. For example, ...

Children wondering what the next day at school might be like. Husbands and wives worrying about the stability of their homes. Good employees concerned about losing their jobs or after being laid off wondering where they will find their next opportunity. Maybe it is coping with an illness or dealing with the reality we are running out of tomorrows. Even more sobering, what kind of country will we have 20 years from now. Could we lose our religious freedom? How will our families cope? How will we remain faithful in a world moving away from God?

These are questions we can't ignore. Tomorrow is unpredictable. It is ever-changing and full of unplanned events that can bring extreme joy or intense pain. Everybody's tomorrows are different. No two are exactly alike. James sums it up in James 4:14: yet you do not know what tomorrow will bring. What is your life? For you are a mist that appears for a little time and then vanishes. Life goes by so quickly.

We have some among us that are in their nineties. The 90 year old has experienced 32,850 tomorrows. Yet looking back they seem like just yesterday. The world is a different place today than it was 20, 30, 40, or 60 years ago. The challenges of tomorrow are much different than those of the past. It requires us to look forward in a more purposeful way. It requires self-evaluation of our current spiritual condition and

intentional planning for tomorrow's challenges.

A favorite verse of scripture is found in Solomon's writing in Ecclesiastes 9:11: Again I saw that under the sun the race is not to the swift, nor the battle to the strong, nor bread to the wise, nor riches to the intelligent, nor favor to those with knowledge, but time and chance happen to them all. Did you catch that? Time and chance happen to us all. There is no avoiding it. We will have good tomorrows and bad tomorrows. The question is how well will we cope with whatever tomorrow brings.

What is your spiritual plan for tomorrow? What is the plan for your family, or your role in this church family? How do you cope with the hard things tomorrow brings? How do you respond to tomorrow's successes?

Once we understand the uncertainty of tomorrow we can develop a life plan to deal with any situation that comes our way. The key is to plan rather than react. Paul said in Ephesians 4:13-14 until we all attain to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to mature manhood, to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ, so that we may no longer be children, tossed to and fro by the waves and carried about by every wind of doctrine, by human cunning, by craftiness in deceitful schemes.

Before we know it we will run out of tomorrows. What will we leave behind? How will we be remembered? What mark will we have left on this planet when tomorrow starts without us?

At the end of every day we look forward to the next. Let's plan this year for whatever tomorrow brings.

Moving Forward

uring our 2018 theme, we spent the year considering how *God Has a Plan for You*. Each quarter we considered our future and hope and the responsibility to seek it with all our hearts (Jeremiah 29.11, 13). During the first quarter, we considered God's eternal purpose for us and how He brought that to fulfillment by Jesus' death on the cross. In the second quarter, we stepped into a study of the role of the Church as a place of refuge, comfort and hope. As we went through the third quarter, we saw the need to deny self in order to allow God to reign in our lives. Lastly, we spoke about us grasping and taking hold of His eternal promises and the daily commitments needed to make heaven a reality.

We also saw 2018 as a turbulent year. In almost every 24-hour news cycle there was yet another story, news feed, or social media blog with more and more confusion, anger, hate, loss of life and destruction. We noticed an uptick in how our members were struggling with loss of employment, making ends meet, living paycheck-to-paycheck, and uncertainty. We heard the apprehension in the conversations of many with family members: pressures of abuse, children who are struggling, mental issues, and death of loved ones. We have single parent households, marriages under stress, and kids that are faced with violence all around them. Materialism is impacting families, we have grandparents raising their grandchildren, and the list goes on.

Anxiety is defined as feeling uneasy, tense or apprehensive in response to stressful or threatening circumstances. It is a normal reaction to stress. At times, it may actually help a person deal with tense situations and it may also help one to be more alert or careful. However, when anxiety becomes an excessive irrational dread of everyday situations, it becomes a disabling disorder. There is a great need for medical attention in dealing with stress, anxiety or PTSD. But, one means we often overlook is the Word of God and

the benefits of meditating and praying.

God said, through Paul, do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus, Philippians 4.6-7.

So, this year's theme is focused on studying "What about Tomorrow"? In many disciplines, you conduct a baseline study as a means to measure deviation. The purpose is to provide an information base against which to monitor and assess an activity's progress and effectiveness during implementation and after the activity is completed. This year, we will start the first quarter by establishing our spiritual baselines. During the second and third quarters, we will dive into seven core areas as we assess and look for ways to deepen our dependency on God and improve our spiritual relationship with our Savior. Finally, during the fourth quarter we will spend some time looking at what it means to have a spiritual legacy for those we leave behind.

And if it is evil in your eyes to serve the Lord, choose this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your fathers served in the region beyond the River, or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you dwell. But as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord, Joshua 24.15. Joshua had made up his mind. Knowing he was responsible to give an account of his life to God, he decided to serve the Lord. Furthermore, as head of his household, he set himself to the task of leading and influencing his family to do the same.

David said, *I will be careful to lead a blameless life.... in my house,* Psalm 101.2. Being blameless does not mean that David considered himself sinless; rather, it means that he was determined to be mature. He desired to grow up in God.

So as we conclude the year, our question for every member will be: what godly heritage are you leaving behind? Don't let the anxiety of today paralyze you. Start a godly heritage. Let it begin with you. Say, as Joshua said, as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord, Joshua 24.15.

Assessing Where You Are

Doing the right thing now, so you can prepare for tomorrow.

s we look around our nation we see distressing things.

Many Americans are anxious about their future, stressed out, and on edge. People can be very nice to us and in a moment's time, become unreasonably angry for the slightest word or mistake. Increasingly, people are being incited to violence over simple differences of opinion. Our families are not together like they once were and many children are almost raising themselves. Media and culture continually criticize Christianity and our values. Materialsm is being pushed down our throats. Many Christians are distracted like never before. We seem to have more things than we ever had and yet are less content.

While Christians obviously live in the world, we are not of the world. If you were of the world, the world would love you as its own; but because you are not of the world, but I chose you out of the world, therefore the world hates you, John 15.19. How is the world affecting you? How good are you at coping with your stress? Are you allowing it to derail your spiritual life? Your family life? Your peace of mind? How you answer these questions will ultimately depend on the amount of time you choose to spend in self-reflection.

Self-examination is a prominent theme in Scripture. God calls upon us to open our heart and mind to honest evaluation and make corrections where necessary. *Examine yourselves, to see whether you are in the faith. Test yourselves. Or do you not realize this about yourselves, that Jesus Christ is in you? -- unless you fail to meet the test, 2 Corinthians 13.5.*

How did you feel after you went through the examination on the previous two pages? Honest evaluation may bring to light some things you don't like. There may be matters you already knew about, but have been indefinitely putting off. Whatever it may be, it is important to build a plan to deepen your relationship with

God and harmonize your actions with His will. Planning is biblical and prudent. Proper stewardship of our physical life, financial life, and spiritual life is called for throughout God's word. *The heart of man plans his way, but the Lord establishes his steps,* Proverbs 16.9.

As we move through the winter, we will endeavor to cover the following three teaching objectives:

- 1. Learn why the topic we're studying this year is of such great importance.
- 2. Examine Biblical principles for self-examination and then look for ways to do so in a timely and practical manner.
- 3. Devise a spiritual life plan that will assist us in navigating our tumultous world and prepare for the life to come.

Addressing The Anxieties in Your Life

Becoming effective today so you can be prepared for tomorrow (part 1)

uring the first quarter we covered the need for self-examination and assessment. This is certainly a Biblical principle (2 Corinthians 13.5) and is absolutely necessary if we wish to chart our spiritual progress moving forward.

As we move into spring and summer, we will begin addressing each spiritual domain of operation. How much attention are you giving to incorporating God's word into daily life? Is the pursuit of spiritual knowledge an integral part of your life? Is this revealed in your participation in Bible class, teaching others, and in directing your day to day decisions?

Have you made time to think about and write down the spiritual gifts God has blessed you with? How are you currently employing those gifts? Are you living with the expectation of receiving more spiritual gifts as you labor every day in the kingdom? Who are some people in the family you can encourage? uring the spring we began to address each of the seven spiritual domains of life. During the third quarter, we will continue this pursuit. The sure way to become more confident about the future is to put wise measures in place today demonstrating trust that God's way is best.

This is certainly seen when we examine our faith in action. Many in our spiritual family have decades of experience in gaining knowledge about God's word. We regularly sit at the feet of mature Bible teachers who work hard to share their insights into God's word in a practical way. How adept are we in applying that knowledge into daily life? Are we implementing God's will into our daily choices and decisions? *In your thinking, be mature,* 1 Corinthians 14.20b.

As we think ahead to the future, how is the growth and well-being of the church on our mind? Are we prepared to explain from the Scriptures vital points on the uniqueness of God's church? If someone asked us about getting to know Jesus, could we, with confidence, explain the gospel of Christ? It was Paul who said, Walk in wisdom toward outsiders, making the best use of the time. Let your speech always be gracious, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how you ought to answer each person, Colossians 4.5-6.

We will also discuss the importance of private and corporate worship. How strong is our prayer life? What are some ways we can engage God more in prayer? How much alone time are we scheduling to be with God? Do we appreciate the time in communion with God during the Lord's Supper? When we come together for corporate worship, do we do so with a spirit of awe, reverence, and respect? O God, you are my God; earnestly I seek you; my soul thirsts for you; my flesh faints for you, as in a dry and weary land where there is no water. So I have looked upon you in the sanctuary, beholding your power and glory. Because your steadfast love

is better than life, my lips will praise you, Psalm 63.1-3.

During the summer quarter we will accomplish the following three teaching objectives:

- 1. Work on practical solutions that will help us put our faith in action on a daily basis.
- 2. Reignite our passion for church growth and evangelistic opportunties.
- 3. Strengthen our personal and corporate worship ties to our heavenly Father.

Understanding the reality of death

What is your life? For you are a mist that appears for a little time and then vanishes, James 4.14b. Some day we will reach the end of our journey here. Either the Lord will return or we will take our last breath and step into eternity. What will your destination be? What will you leave behind? How will you be remembered? Have you asked yourself those questions? It seems uncomfortable to think about our end of life scenario but it is a topic well worth our consideration.

First, how prepared are you to face eternity? Are you confident in your salvation? Has your life here been an illustration of a life lived for God? If tomorrow was to be your last day what would you do? What would you say to those you love? What actions would you take to take care of those things left undone? Are there wrongs that need to be corrected? How will you be remembered? This unknown author said it best.

Ready or not, some day it will all come to an end. There will be no more sunrises, no minutes, hours, days.

All the things you collected, whether treasured or forgotten, will pass to someone else. Your wealth, fame and temporal power will shrivel to irrelevance.

It will not matter what you owned or what you were owed. Your grudges, resentments, frustrations, and jealousies will finally disappear.

So, too, your hopes, ambitions, plans, and to-do lists will expire. The wins and losses that once seemed so important will fade away.

It won't matter where you came from, or on what side of the tracks you lived. At the end, whether you were beautiful or brilliant, male or female, even your skin color won't matter.

So what will matter? How will the value of your days be measured? What will matter is not what you bought, but what you built; not what you got, but what you gave.

What will matter is not your success, but your significance. What will matter is not what you learned, but what you taught. What will matter is every

act of integrity, compassion, courage or sacrifice that enriched, empowered or encouraged others. What will matter is not your competence, but your character. What will matter is not how many people you knew, but how many will feel a lasting loss when you're gone.

What will matter is not your memories, but the memories that live in those who loved you. Living a life that matters doesn't happen by accident. It's not a matter of circumstance but of choice. Choose to live a life that matters.

Oscar Arias lives in Villamaria, Caldas. Brother Arias has been preaching since 1999, and in Villamaria since 2011. Since 2013 Oscar has assisted with the new work taking place in Ecuador's Galapagos Islands.
