# Pastor Abe's Message

Dear Mānoa Valley Church,



You may know that our church has been actively engaged in a strategic planning process to discern God's will for our congregation in this next season. An integral part of this process has been providing opportunities for people to share their thoughts, ideas, and input with us. Though there are many important voices that we have heard, we have focused on three primary groups that impact our future: the MVC

congregation, the MVC leadership, and the Manoa Valley community. This, of course, is in the larger context of seeking the main voice our community longs to listen to—voice of the Triune God.

Three main sources of information and data in this process include:

- a congregational survey (administered at the end of 2020 57 participants).
- notes from discussions that occurred amongst MVC leaders during the 2021 MVC Leadership Retreat (January 2021 -25+ participants).
- and a community needs assessment survey of Mānoa Valley and beyond (administered by The Mānoa Stakeholders and SMS Consulting - 1300+ participants).

The hope is that this information will help our congregation listen and become more informed in at least the following areas:

- The Church Community Who is Manoa Valley Church? Who are the people who make up our congregation? What do we see God doing in our community?
- The Community of Mānoa Valley and Our Neighborhood Who are the people in our neighborhood? What are their needs?
- MVC's Missional Call Where does Manoa Valley Church's deep gladness intersect with the world's deep hunger? (Frederick Buechner)



The data collected has been compiled into a final assessment report that is now available to the MVC congregation. On behalf of the MVC leadership, I would like to invite you to read and reflect on this report and join us on Wednesday, July 21 for an open forum via Zoom video conference call. Through prayer, discussion, and dependence on the Holy Spirit, we will review and reflect on the information from this report to help inform our

ongoing Strategic Planning Process. We will be exploring key elements of Mānoa Valley Church (e.g. identity, purpose, mission, vision, values) and how they impact our church and its future direction and call.

#### Be Prepared: Hurricane Season is Here

Hurricane season in Hawaii lasts through November 30<sup>th</sup>. Although the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration predicts a 'near-or-below-normal' hurricane season, advance preparation will give us peace of mind and safety should disaster strike.

Now is the time to review your personal preparations highlighted in two previous newsletters <u>e-newsletterfinal-8-26-2020.pdf</u> (manoavalleychurch.org) and <u>e-newsletter-9-16-20-final.pdf</u> (manoavalleychurch.org)

- Prepare a Go-Kit with important items and documents. Keep a minimum of one gallon per person per day of water.
- Additionally, you need water for cleaning, bathing, and sanitation. A simple method is to use a stopper in your bath tub or laundry sink.
- Keep a three day supply of non-perishable food that does not need preparation.

#### News from the Council



Despite the limitations the pandemic has placed on the Church, our ministry is alive and well. Here's the latest news as reported at our Council meeting held on June 21.

• The *Missions Committee* has provided lunches twice this year for needy families in the Next Step Shelter program. In August we will be offering meals to families in the Family Promise program who are in need of housing. See page 4 for more information. The Committee and

the Council also approved a gift of \$10,000 from our Pandemic Relief Fund to assist families in the Family Promise program.

- The *Worship Committee* is working on improving and upgrading our AV system for our worship services. They recently met with consultants to discuss this project.
- The *Child Care and Christian Education Committees* are discussing the possibility of integrating our child care programs (Preschool and After School Care) with our Sunday School program. A lot of dialogue and research must happen but the process has started. The committees are working on a summer project, involving children in our Church families and those in our Child Care families, which centers on the message of being thankful to God for our many blessings.
- The Nominations Committee is on the move to fill many positions on our Church Council and Committees that will be available next year. God calls each of us to serve in some way. Contact Sam Browning at <a href="mailto:mrsammyjb@gmail.com">mrsammyjb@gmail.com</a> if you feel God calling you.
- Good news from the *Deacons Committee*! All current members have offered to continue their positions for next year.

## Trustees Report

At long last a four-year project has been completed. A trash enclosure has been constructed in the parking lot enabling the church to use a trash bin which will be serviced weekly by Honolulu Disposal Service. This service will start on Wednesday, July 7<sup>th</sup>.



The Reserve Study originally scheduled the repair of the Preschool roof for 2024. Due to concerns of excessive rainwater ponding on the walkway leading into the classrooms, the work has been moved up. The existing roofing material will be removed and a new design will direct the flow of the water toward larger drains. If materials can be obtained, the work will be done July 21-31.

The sanctuary will be fumigated for termites July 29-30. Due to safety concerns, the entire church campus will be closed.

## Keiki Enjoy Our Summer Fun Program

Children enrolled in our Summer Fun program don't have a chance to get bored. Director **Trisha Honda**, along with her 6 leaders and 8 junior leaders, has planned an exciting summer for the 55 children taking part in this year's program. After a somewhat confusing year of dealing with the pandemic, the keiki are enjoying activities such as cooking, art classes, crafts, table games, and blowing bubbles outside on the playground. Later this summer the keiki will have a guest speaker from the Hawaiian Humane Society to talk about caring for animals. To show their support of the animals the children are donating old towels to the HHS. They are also collecting canned goods to share with the food pantry at St Pius Church in Manoa for those in need.

MVC member **Cat Iwami** shares her knowledge of art with the children as she guides them through a drawing lesson.




Who doesn't remember the joy of blowing bubbles when we were kids? We don't need high tech devices to enjoy ourselves!



Children learn the fun of making bread as well as how to follow recipes and understand measurements. It's a learning experience with a yummy reward at the end.




# MVC Gives Meaningful Gifts to Graduates



#### Preschool News





It reveals the complexity and depth of issues concerning race, providing important insight during this time of Black Lives Matter. # Feed the Hungry: Family Promise Dinners in August



Jesus instructed us to feed the hungry and we have taken that to heart. MVC has had the privilege of sharing Jesus' love and care, especially with those who have been houseless. On Monday, August 2 and Wednesday, August 4, 2021 we will once again be providing dinners to the families in the Family Promise Program. MVC has partnered with this organization for several years to support families transitioning out of houselessness. Due to the pandemic, they no longer stay at the church, but instead temporarily live in a dormitory type of hotel. This means more children have a safe living situation and more families are able to find long term housing. It's exciting that MVC is a part of this community service!

We are asking those who are able to share a dish, multiple dishes, fruits, veggies, or even an entire meal, to please sign up using the links below. The number of guests can change quickly as families find housing or new families move in, so please recheck the sign up list prior to preparing your food. Pack your food in baggies or containers and label them with the matching room number. The families have microwaves and rice cookers so we are only providing the main dish, veggies, fruit and dessert (optional). Families can warm up their meals so you can pack the food cold if that's more convenient.


