My wife, Karyssa, and I recently visited the

Mariposa Grove of Giant Sequoias in Yosemite

National Park. This area is located just past the southern entrance to Yosemite and is home to over 500 mature giant sequoias. Perhaps the most famous tree, the Grizzly Giant, is estimated to be 3,000 years old. This means it predates not only Christ's birth, but Israel's exile, as well!

I was reminded that my roots never cease to grow – I can always be growing stronger and firmer in my foundation in Christ. The Grizzly Giant, in particular, was a wonderful faith picture for me. I hope some day to have a firm, 3,000-year-old foundation that can survive the winds and fires of life. What a promise Christ gives us: a more firm foundation than the Grizzly Giant of Mariposa Grove!

for her where she can make her therapeutic practice a ministry to those who are hurting. Thank you, Katey, for your years of dedication to the families of Centerpoint. You will be missed!



We're so glad to welcome Joanie Rodewald to our Preschool as an aide in our Pre-K class, Monday through Friday. We recently found out that she has an interesting background and asked her to share her story. Here's what Joanie had to say:

"Hi, my name is Joanie Beardsley-Rodewald and I have 19 brothers and sisters. I

was born the youngest of 10 to Frank and Frances Beardsley. Our home was in Carmel and my dad was a Navy man. When I was six months old my mother died of undetected diabetes. My dad became a single father of 10, with the two youngest being 6 months (me!)

and 3 years old. My mother's best friend and husband were childless and offered to take my sister and me until my dad could get settled. A few months later, my dad met a woman named Helen North. She was a widow of a Navy pilot who crashed in a training operation. She had eight children and the youngest was a 1-year-


old. While enrolling her children in a Catholic grade school, the principal, who happened to be my aunt, told Helen about my father and the passing of his wife. Helen had a prayer card that had helped her with her grief and asked if she could send it to him.

Well, one thing led to another, they met, fell in love, and were married a few months later. My sister and I were reunited with our family, plus 8 more! At their wedding, there were 18 children present. About 3 years later, my younger brother, Joe, was born. Two years after that, my sister, Helen, was born. So that made 20! Ten were his, eight were hers, and two were theirs!
