MISSIONS



A message from Pastor Bryan: Centerpoint has various mission partnerships, both local and global, who we regularly partner with by going to and serving alongside, in prayer, and monthly giving. While we can't partner during this time by going and serving, Centerpoint is still regularly giving to these ministries and we can still pray! Below is an update of each of our local and global mission partners, to help direct your prayer time.

Hope Alive! Uganda is under a daily curfew (7:00pm-6:30am), gatherings of no more than five are permitted, and all transportation except one-person motorcycles is shut down. Hope Alive!

is still able to provide essential supplies to Hope Alive! families, mentors are still checking in with their students, and Hope Alive! staff and mentors are still being fully paid.

YUGO: All mission teams scheduled to stay at YUGO facilities in Ensenada, Mexico have ceased, until further notice. Pray for YUGO as they evaluate where their funding will come from next year. They are dependent on visiting teams to pay for the national labor and subsidize the house-build cost.

Barry and Ronah Francolino: Missionaries to the Crimean Tatars of Romania, they are sheltering in place along with their neighbors.

Paul Schmidt: A Bible translation consultant with Wycliffe Bible Translators, Paul and his family are sheltering in place in Texas. His consultation visits to India, to help them finish their Bible translation work, have been canceled until further notice.

Al and Rosa Castro: Al and Rosa are sheltering in place with family in California. Their network of pastor training cohorts in Ensenada has paused during the coronavirus pandemic.

Samaritan's Purse: They have deployed two field hospitals: one to New York City and another to Milan, Italy.

Gathering Inn: They have established two permanent residences for the homeless in Roseville during the coronavirus pandemic. Churches still partner by providing meals for the homeless. Centerpoint is providing meals May 10 and May 31.

Crestmont Elementary School: Centerpoint's various forms of partnership with Crestmont ended with the shelter in place. Pray for the students and teachers as they teach and learn in a completely new environment.

San Francisco City Impact: Many of their programs ceased with the coronavirus outbreak. They are still feeding an average of 400 people daily, and the city of San Francisco has recently allowed them back into Single Resident Occupancy apartment buildings to allow them to care for the shut-ins and disabled.

Gleanings for the Hungry: They stopped hosting teams through the soup-mixing season. They are currently evaluating what their summer will look like. They are dependent on teams to help sort and dry the stone fruit that is donated during the summer months.

Sierra Pregnancy and Health: As a medical facility, SPH is able to stay open to provide their pregnancy resources to the community. They are taking extra precautions before and during appointments.

Campus Life at Eich Middle School: Campus Life programs have moved to Zoom. Many of the opportunities for engagement with Eich students ceased when in-person classes stopped. Pray for these Campus Life students and especially those who have difficult home lives.

Folsom Prison Ministry: Our volunteers who teach weekly at Folsom Prison haven't been able to visit the prison since mid-March. There are zero infected inmates at Folsom State Prison and only four Covid-positive staff members. The Community Resources Manager said that many of the inmate participants from the classes Centerpoint volunteers teach are finding each other, talking, and encouraging one another, a testament to the impact of the ministry!

Acres of Hope: A ministry committed to breaking the cycle of homelessness for women and children, they have been a closed campus since the shelter in place order. They are still able to care for and house their residents, but have incurred a 40% loss of income with the closure of their thrift store.

When that became too difficult we learned all the names of their dogs. We wave and say "good evening, Rover" as we walk in the neighborhood. Just the other day, I saw a neighbor unloading a large package containing many rolls of toilet paper. I said "WOW, can you spare a square?" Not long after Jackie, who heard my comment, rang the doorbell and left quickly. She had left four rolls of toilet paper on the porch. Our neighbor, John, saw me walking Sky, our black English Labrador. His wife, Diana, was walking Studley, their big black poodle. John asked: "Is there anything I can pick up at the store for you? Q: Is Centerpoint's mail being delivered?

Q: Is the Preschool continuing to hold classes?

A. The Centerpoint Preschool canceled classes as soon as Roseville City Schools canceled their classroom meetings.

Q: Will upcoming major church events still take place?

A. Upcoming events are being reviewed weekly by the staff (via Zoom) as to whether to have, postpone or cancel an event. Please watch for information on the web or church App regarding upcoming events, and remember that we will be following California guidelines.

God gave me an illustration back at the end of March in another way. We have a couple of pictures/plaques in our home that have Psalm 46:10: "Be still and know that I am God".

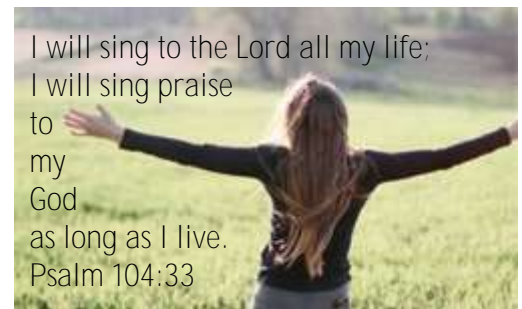

As we continue to stay at home for the foreseeable future, worship can be a challenge. I admit that I'm enjoying "going to church" any time I choose during the day, in my comfy clothes, and in my own home; but, I miss singing together, laughing at the pastor's jokes together, and seeing everyone on the courtyard. (For a recent family birthday, we were all on Zoom together and tried to sing "Happy Birthday" but there is enough of a delay on video conference, that it was a complete mess!) So until we can safely be together on campus again, here are a few ideas to help you worship everyday at home:

- If you're able, go for a walk and enjoy being outside. If I'm by myself, I like to listen to praise music while appreciating nature. Some of my favorites are the "This is Bethel" playlist on Spotify, and the "No Other Name" album from Hillsong.
- Watch the daily devotionals from our pastors each morning to start your day.
- Pray for the friends and family you are missing during this time apart. Check in on your people and make sure they're okay, or send them a link to a song that inspires you. Send an encouraging text letting someone know you're thinking about them and praying for them.
- I have a hard time remembering to do this, but when I do, it's amazing: have a *constant* conversation with God all day long. Include Him in whatever you're doing so that everything becomes an act of worship. For me, that might be while I'm working in the yard, cooking a meal, or reading a book.
- Find a quiet spot in your home or backyard, calm your heart, and be still. "Be still and know that I am God." Psalm 46:10
- Look around you and think about how you can make the day better for those you live with or near. How can you bless someone?
- Keep singing. I know it doesn't feel the same to sing our favorite praise songs and hymns with just a couple of us in our living room, but keep singing. Sing about what God has done, about who He is, and sing for joy. Psalm 104:33 says "I will sing to the Lord all my life; I will sing praise to my God as long as I live."

It has been many weeks since life came to an abrupt halt..."Stay Home...Save Lives" began. This season has been overwhelming and life-changing. I didn't know if I would ever be able to get back out into the fields of green with all the wildflowers coming up in nature and seeing God's timing in all this. God knew I needed a time of isolation, a time to get through a wilderness, but He also knew when it was time to bring me back into His glorious creation we call "nature." As I walked (with a mask on) among all the new spring growth I began to hear Him speak about something much deeper. I have never studied botany, but God put it on my heart to learn about His miracle of re-birth we call spring. Whether through rain, the right temperature, or a certain amount of sunshine, God orchestrates the entire miracle of Spring growth. Paul was so wise when he wrote in Colossians 2:6-7: "So then, just as you received Christ Jesus as Lord, continue to live in him, rooted and built up in him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and overflowing with thankfulness."

It is our spring now...God has nudged us into our new life...a life aware of COVID-19, but...

...we have rooted our faith.

...we study God's word and nurture our roots.

...we stay in fellowship with believers through new ways, and strengthen our roots.

...storms may come but we stay rooted deeply and weather the storms.

...it is time for our roots to signal the next step...to blossom, to fruit, to show the beauty of the Lord in everything we do, and trust God's wisdom in it all.

Life is hard. We may have that little mustard seed of faith, we sense our faith putting down its root into our lives, but when God nudges us to sprout new growth, we sometimes get stuck in our situation. I have to share I lost hope through some of these tough days. But, like a new shoot trying to break free of the earth searching out the sunshine I persevered. If the earth is too hard, too tough, too stomped on, the little tender shoot can't seem to break free. Am I like that sometimes? Or has our root of faith made us strong, resilient, and tough enough to break through the situation?

Let's see... some botanical thoughts. **Fertilizer**...yep, we need it to grow. God's word is our growth hormone so to speak. **Water**...we need it to soften the garden soil of our lives and nurture us. God is our living water. **Sunshine**...we need the warmth. God is our Sonshine...are we going to let Him shine?

Our root of faith is what holds us tight to the Lord no matter what life situations we go through—like a virus that we have never faced before. This Spring, let's focus on our re-birth and show the world the beauty of God's creation in us. 2 Corinthians 5:17 says, "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come!" I can't wait to see what God will bring about when these troubled times come to an end. — Pam Bowen

An Update on Small Groups from Pastor Nancy:

Even though our small groups have not been able to gather together during this time of sheltering in place, our groups are caring for each other in amazing ways. Some groups are checking in with each other through email, phone calls and ongoing text threads. One small group has a designated person who keeps everyone updated with their group's prayer requests. Another group's leader has challenged her members to keep a daily journal of what God is teaching them, and they look forward to sharing these once

they can gather together. Some of our groups are doing errands for members who have compromised health. One member is driving another member to daily chemo treatments.

Many of our small groups are meeting – at least occasionally – over Zoom, and have discovered that even those members who do not have computers can join with a phone call. Many groups are skipping their usual studies to focus on catching up with each other and praying together. Some groups are continuing their usual studies virtually, discussing the sermons or their chosen curriculum. One group actually decided to increase their meetings from twice a month to

weekly since their schedules now permit that! Our small groups are also continuing to serve together (while maintaining social distance)! One group has shared mask patterns and fabric with each other to sew masks for those who need them. Early during this time of sheltering in place, one small group dropped off a meal in the Centerpoint parking lot for The Gathering Inn when they stayed on our campus. This Sunday, now that The Gathering Inn has two semi-permanent sleeping locations in Roseville, three other small groups and a Mariner's ship are banding together to drop off food from a local restaurant for them. Our small groups are demonstrating what it means to be the body of Christ together. When one rejoices, all rejoice. When one suffers, all suffer. Our small groups are continuing to do life together even when they cannot gather together.
