"Coming Down off the Mountain"

One of the most powerful things about the Bible is how it can inform how we live our lives. There are direct teachings (such as thou shalt not) and indirect teachings (such as honor one another), and metaphors that make sense of our experiences. If we face insurmountable odds, we can reflect on David and Goliath. If we face trials and temptations, we can ponder Shadrack, Meshack, and Abednego, and if we just had a tremendous experience and now we have to settle back to reality, we have the Mount of Transfiguration (Matthew 17, Mark 9, Luke 9) to draw on for guidance.

In each account, Jesus brings his closest disciples to the top of a mountain and is transfigured, where his clothes and appearance becomes blazing white, and Moses and Elijah appear with him. At the end, they disappear and they all walk back down the mountain and head into Jerusalem where Jesus will be betrayed, arrested, crucified, and after three days, resurrected.

I am reflecting on the story today because I believe we as a congregation are now walking down the mountain top to experience everyday life. We pooled so many resources, prayers, and efforts to bring our Navajo brothers and sisters here and we so enjoyed our time with them that it will feel like a let down for some time. As I reflect on the story, I find several suggestions from it, and I think one of these will speak to you, if not all of them.

First, when Peter said, "Let's build a tabernacle for you, Moses, and Elijah" he wanted to hold onto the experience. He is not criticized for wanting to hold on, but the voice from heaven makes it clear, that is not part of the plan. The plan is to go back down the mountain, because the work is in the valley, not on the mountain. The mountain top experience is to get us ready to live in the valley. In the same way, enjoying time with the Navajo is meant to strengthen us for ministry in our back yards, whether they are literal back yards or figurative back yards. Let the experience inspire you – don't let it stop you!

Second, it is an invitation to spiritual discipline. When they come down the mountain, the disciples encounter a boy whom they can't save from a fire, and when Jesus does, he says in essence, we must have more faith, and we must be in prayer and fasting more often. We have great and important work to do in the valley – the mountain top experience gives us hope that we can do it if we stay rooted in faith and prayer.

Third, in each of the stories, Jesus gives them an important teaching – he will be betrayed, because he is doing God's will. The disciples aren't ready to hear the Continued page 2

In much the same way, let me suggest that the Holy Spirit probably said something to each one of us during the VBS week that we need to remember. When you realize some time later that you learned the lesson during this time with the Navajos, don't feel bad about it – instead rejoice that you did get it! The Lord doesn't "fuss" at us because we are stupid, but because we are beloved. Show the same charity to those who persecute you as the Lord shows you.

Now that we are climbing back down the mountain, may we have new eyes to see, new ears to hear, new hearts to trust, and new spirits to follow the way that leads to life. We are travelling on new ground, but it is the same ground the disciples traveled years ago. It is my joy to continue serving this amazing family!

Food Pantry Second Quarter Update

In the months of April - June we were able to serve 146 households, a total of 464 people, 24 of theses were new households. We were able to distributed a total of 220 bags. We have had a 21% increase in households from the first half of 2021 (Jan - June) and the first half of 2022 (Jan-June), with a 25% increase of individuals during the same time period.

The chart details the volume of products purchased from the Food Bank and at the local supermarket, products Food Bank did not carry, and the expense for those products for the Second Quarter of 2022.

Joy in retelling the stories they heard about Jesus and about life of the Navajos. Joy especially as they sang "Jesus Loves Me" in the Navajo language. Joy so contagious that it spilled over to their families and VBS volunteers who sang along. May they continue to experience that joy as they learn about Jesus.

Joy in the volunteers, not only because they were enjoying their time with the children, but also because they witnessed that gift of the spirit in our Navajo brothers and sisters which spilled over to them. Joy also in working together as a team, experiencing what the body of Christ can do when all "members" do their particular job. Joy in sharing meals, from potlucks, to fish dinners, to Navajo tacos with the fry bread that is simple yet amazingly good. Joy in knowing that our church has received a special gift, a renewed awareness of just how the Holy Spirit moves us in worship and in love of one another.

Joy in our Navajo brothers and sisters. Joy in knowing that they have a gift to offer to our children and to us—sharing the love of Jesus with no bounds of race, color, or nation. Joy in receiving the gift of hospitality, not only from the families who gave them a place to sleep, but also from the welcomes they received from all they met, the interaction, the respect and honor as we recognized we are all God's beloved children.

Joy in worship. Filled with this fruit of the spirit, the atmosphere of worship changed, from the service on July 10, to the time of praise and worship on Monday night, to the testimonies during the service on July 17. The people of First UMC Fox Hill saw praise offered in song, the joyous uplifting of voices loud and clear, the tambourines and clapping, as the message of their songs permeated their entire bodies. Joy in the prayers, not only at times that we would expect, but the spontaneous outpouring of love and thanksgiving, the petitions for healing, for peace, for comfort—indeed, the invitation to and recognition of the Holy Spirit's presence and their knowing the Holy Spirit was there, leading them in worship.
