Core Values

As a church, we believe that Scripture reveals the following values as essential to our common life in Christ:

God – We believe in the only true and living God – Father, Son, and Holy Spirit – our Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer. Our hope, faith, and salvation are in Him alone.¹

Church Family – God calls people to belong to Jesus Christ, the head of the Church, and to join with one another as members of His household.²

People – All people matter to God, and He is seeking to reconcile them to Himself. As people of God and ambassadors for Christ, God calls us to love our neighbors as ourselves.³

Scripture – God has spoken and continues to speak in and through Scripture about Himself and His will for us. The Bible is our final authority for life and faith, teaching us the truth about God as Creator, our rebellion, His work to restore us, and our new life with Him now and forever.⁴

Gospel – The Good News of Jesus – His coming as Messiah; His death, burial and resurrection; and His return as Judge and Savior – is the only door through which we can enter into a relationship with God. God calls all people to repent and believe in His Son Jesus.⁵

Worship – God is worthy of our enthusiastic praise. As we come to know God, we are moved to display ever-increasing gratitude and love for Him by our words and our lives.⁶

Prayer – God hears and acts when we pray. He invites us to approach Him as children approach their father: in dependence and faith and with persistence.⁷

Priesthood of All Believers – God calls all Christians to draw near to Himself, to serve one another with our gifts, and to be His witnesses in the world around us in word and life.⁸

Maturity – God calls us to be fully devoted followers of Jesus. We seek to become people of Christlike integrity in our character and conduct.⁹

Unity and Diversity – God calls believers to be united in their faith, in their pursuit of Christ, and in their acceptance of all those whom God has accepted. “In essentials, unity. In nonessentials, diversity. In all things, charity.”¹⁰

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Mission

Forest Hills Bible Chapel exists to proclaim the excellencies of God, who called us out of the darkness into His wonderful light.¹¹

Vision

God is calling us to be . . . a priesthood of believers, reaching up to God, reaching inward to each other, and reaching out to our neighbors, both near and far.

Vision Introduced:

We believe God is calling us to a specific vision for our church family. While by His grace we are doing some things well, we recognize that God is always challenging us – asking us to boldly and faithfully follow Him wherever He leads. God has given us an idea of where He is taking us, and we greatly desire to go there with Him.

The concept of the priesthood of all believers provides a helpful framework for understanding our vision for our church. As a body of priests, we relate up to God the Father in Christ through the Holy Spirit, we minister to and intercede for one another in the body, and we reach out to the world around us as ambassadors for Christ and His kingdom.

In 1 Peter 2:4-5, the apostle Peter tells us, “As you come to him, a living stone rejected by men but in the sight of God chosen and precious, you yourselves like living stones are being built up as a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ.”

To explain how this concept of the church works, evangelical scholar Timothy George writes, “We stand before God and intercede for one another, we proclaim God’s Word to one another and we celebrate his presence among us in worship, praise, and fellowship. Moreover, our priestly ministry does not terminate upon ourselves. It propels us into the world in service and witness.”¹²

Upreach refers to the act of reaching up to God in worship, which is the very reason we live. We were created to glorify God (Isaiah 43:7), and God seeks worshipers to worship Him in spirit and truth (John 4:22-23). We exist to know and delight in the surpassing worth of God in Christ by the Spirit.

[We] worship by the Spirit of God and glory in Christ Jesus and put no confidence in the flesh.
(Philippians 3:3 ESV)

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Inreach refers to the act of reaching into the community of worshipers to bring every disciple of Christ to maturity in Christ.

Him we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone with all wisdom, that we may present everyone mature in Christ. (Colossians 1:28 ESV)

Outreach refers to our acts as ambassadors for Christ, articulating the Gospel explicitly in word and bearing its fruit in our relationships with people and creation. Our primary task in outreach is to proclaim Jesus as the only way of salvation. As we are transformed by the gospel and, in obedience, desire to see its implications realized, our secondary tasks in outreach are to seek the welfare of our neighbors and to care for God's creation.

Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. (Matthew 28:19-20)

He has told you, O man, what is good; and what does the LORD require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God? (Micah 6:8)

And God blessed them. And God said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth and subdue it, and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the heavens and over every living thing that moves on the earth." (Genesis 1:28)

Unpacking the Vision:

As we follow God, we envision Forest Hills Bible Chapel being . . .

. . . **a church that reaches up.**

. . . a God-honoring church family that is fully devoted to Him. Jesus taught us that a life of devotion is marked by love for God and a joyful and worshipful relationship with Him, and love for others and a merciful and compassionate relationship with them.

. . . a Christ-centered church family that passionately seeks and celebrates our relationship with Jesus. We want to trust Christ to be Lord and Savior in every sphere of our personal lives and corporate existence.

. . . a Spirit-filled church family that recognizes we can do nothing without His involvement and empowerment. We want to maintain hearts that are open to His leading, equipping, revealing, convicting, and counsel.

. . . a worshiping church family that lifts God's name high . We want to praise God in awe and reverence, both individually and corporately. We want our celebration of the Lord's Supper to center our services on Jesus Christ each week.

. . . a praying church family that approaches God as children approach their father: in dependence and faith and with persistence. We want to pray together: corporately and privately, as a church and in small groups, as families and as couples, as friends, and as individuals.

. . . a Scripture-anchored and Scripture-shaped church family that holds firmly to the Word regardless of the consequences. We want to equip and exhort families and individuals to engage with and be transformed by God's revelation in the Bible.



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. . . a church that reaches in.

. . . a shepherded church family in which the Elders will serve, teach, equip, guide, counsel, and discipline the body faithfully. The Elders will communicate clearly and consistently. The Elders will continue to raise up succeeding generations of shepherds and pass the torch to them.

. . . a participating church family that takes ownership of our distinctive practices. We want our teachers and leaders to explain the Scriptural roots of these practices, teach our members our particular way of practicing them, and provide opportunities to participate in them.

. . . a disciplined and discipling church family where each member is a disciple of Jesus, is following and learning from more mature members, and is leading and teaching less mature members to obey all that Jesus commanded us. We want our older fathers and mothers will teach and equip our younger fathers and mothers to lead and serve their families. We want to faithfully try to engage and guide our children and youth in discipling relationships.

. . . a grace-saturated church family in which all people are valued and shown Christlike love. We want to seek healing for those who are wounded and help those who are struggling with sin. We want to build relationships of trust where we can reveal our sins, weaknesses, and failures and find true healing. We want to accept, forgive, encourage, serve, and love one another. We want to heal broken relationships.

. . . an inclusive church family that cultivates unity, cooperation, and friendships within our church body across all inessential boundaries (age, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, family, etc.). We want to open our families and cliques to new relationships and to draw in both our new members and those on the fringes. We want to be hospitable to one another.

. . . an equipping church family that offers support and guidance to individuals and families through the teaching of Scripture, biblical counseling, strategic mentoring, seminars, and small group discussions.

. . . a serving church family where about 80% of our members are actively working toward the mission of the church while about 20% are being refreshed and restored. We want to encourage and equip our people to use the spiritual gifts God has given them so that we can flourish as a local instance of the body of Christ.

. . . an alert church family that recognizes our enemy in the schemes of Satan and the desires of our flesh. At this time we recognize accommodation to the world's presuppositions, pornography, entertainment, consumerism, disengagement from face-to-face relationships, and complacency in matters of mercy and justice as threats to the spiritual life and witness of our body. We want to address these issues head-on with truth and grace.

. . . a church that reaches out.

. . . a mission-directed church family that sends out members and outreach partners locally, nationally, and to the ends of the earth. We want to cultivate a culture of involvement in God's mission wherever He has placed us corporately and individually.

. . . a collaborative church family that builds long-term connections with other churches and ministries to proclaim and apply the Gospel. We want to build these relationships across as many inessential boundaries as we can. We want to encourage the existing ministry involvements of our members.



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. . . a proclamation-oriented church family focused on sharing the good news about Jesus, especially with those who live in Forest Hills and with children. We also want to encourage and equip families and individuals to practice hospitality and present God's love and truth in their personal spheres of influence. We want to nurture and cultivate our gift of evangelism and lift up our evangelists to lead us in our proclamation of the Gospel.

. . . a caring church family that extends mercy to and seeks justice for those who are suffering and oppressed, especially those who live in Forest Hills and children. We want to use our most common spiritual gift of helping to serve our neighbors and to be hospitable to them.

. . . a growing church family in which we regularly welcome a harvest of new believers who join our body as members. We will strive for congregational growth, acknowledging that regeneration is a work of the Spirit and that we must be faithful in our commitment to the Great Commission whether or not it results in numerical growth.

Definitions

- Mission – A brief, overarching statement that answers the question: “Why do we exist?” A tool to unite and direct the church.
- Core Values – Short explanations of the foundational things we value as a church. A tool to define and remind us of what is most important.
- Vision – A brief summary statement and detailed description of the answers to the questions: “What will the future look like as we fulfill our mission?” and “What will be different?” A tool to develop a common concept of where we are going and who we want to be. Flows from our Mission and Core Values.
- Core Activities – An organizational framework to direct the work of the Chapel members, especially our leaders, as we determine what we will do to carry out the mission and reach the vision. Will be applied and expanded as we attempt to implement the vision.
- Statement of Faith – Short explanations of the foundational things we believe as a church. A tool to help us define what doctrines are essential to our unity.



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DNA of Forest Hills Bible Chapel

DNA is a set of instructions encoded in each living cell that tells it what it is supposed to be and do. DNA makes us who we are.

As a local church, we want the DNA of Forest Hills Bible Chapel — our Core Values, Mission, Vision, Core Activities, and Statement of Faith — to serve as a governing code that helps to define who we are and what we do as a spiritual body. We understand that we do not have the authority to define our church because it belongs to Christ, who is the head of the Church (Colossians 1:18). Therefore documenting who we are and who we want to be as a church is an exercise in asking God for direction, seeking it in His Word, and following the Spirit.

This document is a reforming expression of our controlling conviction that we are under the authority of Christ. We fully acknowledge that we move forward as earthen vessels and learners with a sober realization that in some cases we will try, fail, revise, and try again. However, as we listen to Christ, endeavoring to discern the instruction and guidance of His Word and the Holy Spirit to us in these matters, we believe that Christ is calling us to be the church outlined in these Guiding Statements, and that as a particular local body of believers we are called to use the unique gifts God has given us to proclaim His Kingdom and bless His Church. We look to Christ because He is our Head, and as we hold fast to Him, our whole body will grow with a growth that is from God (Colossians 2:19).

Jesus said, “I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing” (John 15:5 ESV). Branches can only bear fruit by abiding in the Vine. May it be so of Forest Hills Bible Chapel.
