We all have a beginning and an end, but it is the journey that lies in between those two touchstone moments that define us as we travel life's path to the Lord's presence. Great literature, I always tell my



students, mirrors life – David Copperfield's famous line, "I record that I was born" – that is true of us all. And then later we read "I am Ishmael" as Melville's Moby Dick opens. We are named – we can put our own names into Ishmael's declaration. So here we are - we are born and we are named. Add that we are known, first by God and then by our parents, siblings, grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins, and friends in an everwidening circle of others as we live our life journeys.

I have to say that in reading the opening lines of Moby Dick I smile a bit at the irony embedded in Ishmael's reasoning for going to sea . . . .

"Some years ago—never mind how long precisely—having little or no money in my purse, and nothing particular to interest me on shore, I thought I would sail about a little and see the watery part of the world. It is a way I have of driving off the spleen and regulating the circulation. Whenever I find myself growing grim about the mouth; whenever it is a damp, drizzly November in my soul; . . . . and especially whenever my hypos get such an upper hand of me, that it requires a strong moral principle to prevent me from deliberately stepping into the street, and methodically knocking people's hats off—then, I account it high time to get to sea as soon as I can. . . . . I quietly take to the ship. There is nothing surprising in this. If they but knew it, almost all men in their degree, some time or other, cherish very nearly the same feelings towards the ocean with me."

Many of us can identify with Ishmael today – we find ourselves with a need to drive "off the spleen and regulate our circulation" because we are so very weary of Covid-19 and masks and rioting and being tense with our neighbors and watching wonderful businesses disappear under draconian executive orders. We want to knock off a hat or two, in spirit! We are supposed to keep ourselves safe from Covid-19, but governing authorities expect our school athletes to compete in high energy sports with masks covering their mouths and noses? Well, the kids might not

get Covid-19, but collapsing from oxygen-depravation is not a winning recipe either. Is the world going nuts? Does not a sea cruise sound good right about now? Oh, whoops! That is not a good option for us either. There is no taking to the sea! But we can identify with Ishmael, who frankly, did not get the relaxing "sail about" that he planned for. He did not see Moby Dick on the horizon or a Captain Ahab, who's obsession would lead to death and destruction. Nevertheless, this becomes reality for Ishmael, whose name means "God listens" And while Biblical Ishmael is miraculously saved from thirst in the desert, Melville's Ishmael is miraculously saved from drowning by grabbing onto a floating coffin – an interesting symbol of life and death.

Ultimately, our Libertas Christian School family is a bit like Moby Dick's Ishmael . . . . we had no idea of what 2020 would bring or may continue to bring. Instead, we sail, like Ishmael, into the days our Lord has ordained for us. Yes, ordained. That is a deep word, an old-fashioned word. It denotes appointment, establishment, a setting apart, and investment in a ministerial function (Webster's 1828). My soul is settled on Webster's definitions with a deep, abiding peace. Furthermore, John 15:16 reads, "You did not choose Me, but I chose you, and appointed



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you that you would go and bear fruit and that your fruit would remain . . ." These days afford us a perfect opportunity to consider our Savior's words, words that He spoke to His disciples, but that still apply to us in 2020. Jesus is our appointer, the captain and guardian of our souls. There are no surprises on His horizon. He knows what lies before us in His service!

A while back my husband remarked that he is sorry that our own kids and our Libertas ones, are experiencing these strange days. However, I told Randy and later the Upper School, during chapel, that I do not feel that way. I guess I am somewhat pragmatic. And at 65, I have seen lots of "curve balls" over the years, big and small. We can all make a list. However, I am bit of a realist. There will always be a curve ball that comes at us out of the blue. There will always be a new version of an old catastrophe that will show up without warning. Am I a fatalist? No! Instead, I hold in my heart, that it is exactly unusual and unexpected days that forge stout hearts and strong backbones for Christ! For Life! For the Gospel! His purposes and glory are revealed in such days if we turn to Him via prayer, via His Word regarding our circumstances.

Jesus leads us in days of both sunshine and shadow, as well. It was days of shadow that drove Ishmael to the sea, not days of sunshine, and normally he found refreshment on the great waters. The good news, at the end of Moby Dick, is that Ishmael lived – he was delivered. I often remind our Libertas kids that our precious Lord is no less present in days of shadow than in days of sunshine. In fact, it is often the seemingly dark days in which we detect His presence in new, refreshing ways that comfort, strengthen, purpose and direct us to live out John 15:16's fruit bearing purposes. Fruit requires a variety of conditions, does it not? There is sunshine and shadow - the perfect mix of light and dark - for fruit to come forth. John 15:16 also states as fruitbearers, Believers can ask the Father anything in Jesus' name and that the Father will answer. I just cannot get past asking for the ability to bear more fruit to His glory! Everything else falls into place for me from there. How about you?

And let us not forget that stout hearts and strong backbones equate to courage that is beyond ourselves, through the Lord's equipping. I recently asked our Libertas kids what they thought was more exciting. Walking around Jericho believing God was going to bring the walls down and being on the front row when

He did or sitting in the back of the crowd wondering if He would? This is a good question for us to ponder as we consider our personal galleries of the faith. I think of Jim Elliot and the other men who died on that Amazon sandbank for Christ and for the Auca Indians. Jim Elliot was told, by one of the missionary wives, the night before the men's fly-in, that they could all die. He replied that he was ready to die, but the Auca Indians were not. Think about it! Jim was only in his 20's when he made that statement. Deep was his heart and spirit in Christ! Next, I consider Daniel in the lion's den, and young Esther elevated to queen and deliverer of Israel "for such a time as this". I ponder young Mary, counted blessed by God to bear our Savior in the potential face of scandal. I think of young David up against Goliath; odds were certainly not in his favor and yet - - - Yes, front lines can be dangerous - they are also exciting, and in our Savior's care, the most secure places to be.

Furthermore, the idea of safety, of "Christian safety", is an interesting phenomenon. Now, I am not against being aware and informed. I am not against washing our hands and being wise. I am respectful of those who wear masks and of those who do not. However, when we believe that we ultimately "control" our safety, then this is a point for contemplative pause. Just how safe do we think we can keep ourselves? Psalm 139:16 tells me that "All the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be." What a comfort! What encouragement and solace is found in that verse! Instead, when we are about our Lord's purposes we can rest in that truth – "all the days ordained for me" the Lord has written in His book - Wow! Yes, we use the common sense the Lord has given us to be relatively safe. But note the word "relatively". It is a point to ponder. In prayer and the Word, we can chart these strange seas in His care to find direction, rest and comfort.

Meanwhile, who has time for fear? I absolutely do not, for I know that I need to "be about my Father's business!" Like Nehemiah, I do not consider that the Lord has shown us that we are to come down off the wall that is Libertas! It is an enlivening, exciting, exhilarating place to be! Are there clouds on the horizon? Yes. Are there days of sunshine on that same horizon – definitely. But He is on His throne in Heaven, Lord of all our horizons. My heart is settled in Him, on Him! May yours be as well! Amen!
